Junie G's Restaurant moves to new location with the same great food

More often than not, when you enter Junie G's you are greeted with the infectious laugh of June Bevan, owner and cook at Junie G's Restaurant. Junie G's Family Restaurant has been a very popular place to have breakfast and lunch in Mountain Top for over nine years at 12 South Mountain Boulevard. After all those years in the same location, they made the move to the old Tony's Restaurant just a hop, skip and jump away.

June Bevan and her partner of 11 years, Emil Guziejka purchased the property at 27 South Main Street at the beginning of the year. They have renovated the inside to accommodate June's style and the comfort of her customers. The

renovations and move took about eight weeks with the help of friends and employees, all the while working in the restaurant on South Mountain Blvd. On May 11, the Friday before Mother's Day, June and Emil opened the doors at their new location. Junie G's has always closed at 2 p.m., but with the opening of the new restaurant, June and Emil envisioned staying open for dinner. After a couple of setbacks, Emil's mother passed and a kitchen fire the morning of June 22 when Froggy 101 was there, the restaurant finally opened four nights a week to the delight of diners.

With new evening hours came a new and different dinner menu. Since June has been in the restaurant business in one facet or another since she was about 18, she has come up with some unique menu items for dinner which include calzones, stromboli, wings, specialty pizzas, pizza, June's eggplant stack and battered cheese curds both with homemade marinara sauce.

The breakfast and lunch menu remain the same; lunch

items such as sandwiches, burgers, salads, homemade soups, cheesesteaks, and more can be ordered for dinner as well. It was only natural to add pizzas, calzones and stromboli since there was a pizza oven already in the kitchen. Additions will be made to the dinner menu very soon and will include, but not limited to meat loaf, fried chicken and lasagna. Only fresh and quality ingredients are used in all the food that is prepared at the restaurant.

June and Emil employ five cooks who work throughout the week and a wait staff of six all of which are qualified and professional. Emil is the pizza chef, which is what he really enjoys doing.

News In Brief ...

Fairview receives plans for First Fidelity Bank

The Fairview Township planning commission has received the preliminary land development plan for construction of a First Fidelity Bank on a vacant parcel on the southwest corner of North Mountain Boulevard and Kirby Avenue, near the Turkey Hill Store. Tim Connelly of Tetra Tech, the project engineer, told commission members at their August 15 meeting that the parcel, which was owned by developer Joseph Thomas, has been sold to Carmine Development Co., which will lease the land to the bank. Connelly told commission members plans call for construction of a 2,600-squarefoot building with drive-thru banking. Entrance to the property will be from the private driveway which currently provides access to Turkey Hill. There will be a right-turn only exit onto Route 309. Commission members expressed concern about traffic attempting to enter the property "stacking" on the driveway and backing up onto the highway. Connelly said a traffic study will be done by the developer. There also was discussion about what, if any variances would be needed for the project.

Park security options being looked at

The Wright Township Recreation Board is looking at options to improve security at the township park. At its July meeting, board members heard a presentation from Brian McCann of Aegis Digital Systems on security camera options for the park. The splash pad and park bathrooms in the park have been vandalized several times this summer. Supervisor Matthew Howton, liaison to the board, said the he is looking into costs for a camera system and where funding might be obtained. He urged anyone who observes suspicious activity to call 911.

Pete Kohl honored for 40 years of service as MTHC fire chief

When Pete Kohl was elected chief of Mountain Top Hose Company No. 1 in 1978, just a month shy of his eighteenth birthday, little did he know that he would hold that position for four decades. In recognition of his years of service, the 57-year-old chief was honored by his fellow firefighters and community members at a gathering held on Monday, August 20 at Cavanaugh's Grille.

Rev. J. Duane Gavitt, the hose company's long-time chaplain, spoke on behalf of fire department officers and members and summed up the esteem in which the unassuming Kohl is held by the fire service community. "The likes of his sacrifice, we don't see any more," Father Gavitt stated. "We have 40 years of memories," said the former assistant pastor at St. Jude Parish. "Memories of sacrifice, wisdom, grace and patience. Pete created a space where everyone was respected."

His fellow firefighters presented Kohl with a plaque commemorating his service to the fire department and the community. "Pete Kohl is the fire company," hose company president David Hourigan said of his long-time friend. "He is respected by everyone." Hourigan noted the fire com pany's new rescue truck will be dedicated to Kohl in recognition of his 40 years of eadership.

Looking back on his 40 years as chief, Kohl reflected on how much the fire service has changed. "It has changed drastically," he offered. "Now we spend so much time on paperwork, liability, writing for grants. All that has contributed to our biggest problem, lack of members," he

noted.

Kohl pointed out that training is the area that has changed most. "When I first started, you showed up for Monday night drills. That was training. It's not like that anymore," he added.

Kohl's mother, Adele Kohl, his wife, Jina, his son, Sean, and daughters Rachael and Sydney, and his sister Carol Wells were present for the event. Another daughter, Annette Strasser, resides in South Bend, Indiana, and was unable to attend. Kohl and his wife also have five grandchildren.

His mother talked about how Kohl wanted to be a firefighter as a child. "He gave of himself even as a

little boy," she related. She noted there were times when his role as a firefighter were stressful to her. "It caused me a few grey hairs," she quipped.

"We're very proud of Pete," his sister Carol Wells commented. "Particularly his devotion to the community and the firefighters he has led.

Kohl's wife, Jina, described her husband as "very determined." "He is always thinking of others," she pointed

Kohl joined the fire company in 1976 at the age of He was elected assis-16. tant chief the following year and chief in 1978 when his predecessor left the area. At that time, the fire company had recently moved into its new facility and Kohl began to plan a strategy to expand and modernize the vehicles and equipment that the firefighters needed. The first new engine in 16 years was purchased in 1979. In the early 1980s Kohl recognized that a "Jaws of Life" system was needed for the Mountain Top area and he participated in a committee to raise the funds from the community

to purchase it.

In the early 1990s, the hose company was called upon frequently to perform rescue services and had outgrown its rescue vehicle. Under Kohl's leadership, a heavyduty rescue was purchased in 1992 and a rescue team was trained. He was a founding member of the Luzerne County Technical Rescue Task Force which consist of six rescue companies from across the county that are called in for specialized rescue operations such as trench rescue or confined space rescue.

Recognizing the need for education in firefighting, Kohl educated himself in the fire service and attained the status of a State Fire Instructor. He has taught firefighting courses locally and on the state level for several years.

Dorrance Township code inspection system changes

Supervisors announced at their August 13 meeting that the township was notified by Code Inspections Inc., on July 15 that it will no longer provide Uniform Construction Code Services within the township since supervisors decided to go with multiple third-party agencies.

At their June meeting, supervisors also approved a resolution establishing a third-party building inspector program. The system provides for six inspectors with their own fee schedules. Residents will have the option to choose any of the six. The inspectors are required to sign a contract and provide insurance and indemnify and hold the township harmless. The fee to the township will be 20% or \$50 whichever is greater.

Code Inspections will close out all open permits and applications within the township up to July 15. The township will now be responsible for doing the quarterly state fee reports required by the state Department of Community and Economic Development.
