# Wright Township hoping to get new leaf collection truck

Wright Township officials are hoping a state recycling grant will help them purchase a new leaf collection truck.

Supervisors voted at their

March meeting to apply for a state Department of Environmental Protection recycling grant. Officials said the grant application will request approximately \$250,000 to be used to purchase the truck and signs for the recycling center. The grant required a 10 per-

cent local match.

Wright Township is the only Mountain Top municipality that collects leaves from residential properties. Each year in the spring and fall township public works crews go through neighborhoods collecting leaves residents rake to the edge of the road. The machine currently in use requires a driver and at least one other worker to operate the leaf vacuum. The truck the township hopes to purchase with the grant would allow

the operation to be performed by one person. The vehicle's driver can operate the leaf vacuum using a "joystick" type device. One official described the truck as similar to those used by a local waste hauler which allows the driver to pick up trash bins and empty them into the truck using a control in the truck's cab.

Some of the funds would be used to purchase signs for the recycling center. Supervisor Matthew Howton noted that it is important for residents to clean recyclable materials before depositing them at the recycling center. He pointed out that the township's recycler charges a fee for removal of dirty or non-recyclable materials. He said the township will no longer accept material in plastic bags. During the first two months of the year, the township recycled over 28 tons of plastic, glass, cardboard, tin and aluminum.



to obtain permits to move forward with the project and the financial institution is merging with Suntrust Bank. Last fall, BB&T closed its branch on South Mountain Boulevard near Dollar General.

### *In other news ...*

Borton Lawson Engineering was named design consultant for the state Department of Community and Natural Resources grant for phase 3 of the Memorial Park project. The township received a \$50,000 DCNR grant which requires a \$20,000 township match. Phase 3 of the park improvement project includes a walking trail.

Supervisors voted to direct the township engineer to prepare and advertise bids for the Gracedale Avenue drainage project. The work will be done with a grant from the Luzerne Conservation District.

Supervisors also voted to advertise for a generator for the municipal building under two separate bids. One bid will be for a three-phase generator since there is a threephase service in the building. The other option is for bids to change the three-phase to a single-phase service with a single-phase generator.

### **Wright Township** looking at grant opportunities

At a recent work session of the Wright Township supervisors, a discussion was held on possible grant opportunities for 2019. One of the projects discussed was applying for a Local Shares Account (gaming) grant to purchase a new leaf collection truck. Wright Township road foreman Matthew Howton, who is also a supervisor pointed out that there are vehicles available that can make leaf collection a oneperson operation.

Supervisors did not decide on whether to apply for the grant, leaving it on the table for further discussion.

Wright supervisors also discussed applying for a state Department of Community and Economic Development Greenways Grant to be used for removal of dead trees in the township park. Forester John Hopkins identified nearly 1.000 dead trees which need to be cut down and removed. It is estimated it will cost anywhere from \$60,000 to \$100,000 to cut down the trees.

Wright supervisors also discussed applying for a Luzerne County recycling grant to educate residents about recycling. Over the last year, local communities have gone from making a small profit on recycling to having to pay haulers to remove recyclable materials. Two factors play into this turnaround. There has been a decline in the demand of foreign countries for our recyclables and, much of the material must be sent to landfills because it is contaminated or unusable. Officials said consumers are not cleaning their bottles and cans before tossing them into recycling bins, making them useless for recycling. Additionally, consumers are mixing in material not suitable for recycling. This issue came up at a meeting of Dorrance Township supervisors this month. Officials warned that the future of recycling is

The Wright Township recreation board reported construction of a foot bridge is all that remains for completion of phase one of the dog park. The bridge is expected to be completed as soon as weather improves, and the park's official grand opening will be held in the spring.

### Rice supervisors vote to file lawsuit

After nearly eight months of negotiations, Rice Township supervisors voted at their

March 5 meeting to file a lawsuit against AR Popple Construction, Inc. and its bond company, Philadelphia Indemnity Insurance Co. to recover costs associated with the longdelayed Ice Pond dam outlet project.

Supervisors directed their special counsel, Raymond Wendelowski, to proceed with the lawsuit to recover costs associate with re-bidding the

project; work done by Popple that must be redone because the township claims Popple failed to meet project goals; and cost overruns.

They also authorized township engineer Andrew Pasonick of Penn Eastern Engineers to begin the bid process to engage a "capable contractor" to complete the project.

In December 2017, supervisors awarded AR Popple a \$179,500 contract for repairs to the dam. In late February 2018, the contractor started the process of lowering the water level in the lake to allow access to a pipe in the dam wall. By early March, Pasonick reported Popple had completed about 25 percent of the de-watering process needed to construct a coffer dam. However, in mid-May, the contrac-

tor halted work on the project, leaving behind a muddy lake

At their August 2018 meeting, supervisors refused to pay a \$33,345 bill submitted by AR Popple for work on the Ice Lakes dam project. They subsequently hired Wendelowski to negotiate a settlement with Popple's bonding company. That negotiation did not bring about an agreement, prompting supervisors to file the lawsuit.

Township officials have been dealing with the Ice Lake dam issue for three years. In late summer of 2015, property owners around the lake notified the township, which owns the lake, that the water level was dropping. At the time, engineers determined the problem was a valve in a drain pipe in the dam.

The township received a Local Shares Account (gaming) grant and a grant from the state Department of Community and Economic Development to be used for the project. Supervisors voted to request extensions of those grants to June 30, 2020.

### In other news ...

Secretary/Treasurer Jeff Beck reported the township received its 2019 Liquid Fuels Account reimbursement from the state totaling \$135,543.38. Supervisors reported he township's 2018 audit was completed by Grevera & Associates with no negative findings.

In other action, supervisors gave approval to Mountain Top men's softball league, Mountain Top Little League and Mountain Top Youth Soccer to use township fields this year. They approved a \$150 donation to Crestwood High School PTSA for the senior lock-in.

They also expressed thanks to Frank Pedriani and Matt McGowan of Hallmark Homes and Danielle Sciandra of Clean Force 1 for donating over \$500 each for a popshield for the police department.

### **Dorrance Township** fire department looking for volunteers

The Dorrance Township Volunteer Fire Department notified supervisors that the township's \$20,000 contribution for 2018 was used for debt reduction, new heating units in the engine room building, vehicle maintenance and personnel training.

Fire department treasurer Valerie Zane and fire department member Jeff Kotarsky told supervisors the department is facing a manpower crisis. The department needs volunteers in order to respond to emergencies.

Supervisors gave permission to the fire department to participate in non-emergency events as approved by the fire chief or assistants. # Resident aims to educate public on little known facts about buying tires

mended shelf life of tires is no more than six years?

Did you know that the date your tires were manufactured is stamped on the tire?

Like most people, Bill LaVigna of Mountain Top wasn't aware of these facts until he took an AARP Smart Driver class. After taking the course, LaVigna decided to check the manufacture date on the tires he purchased a few

Did you know that the recommonths earlier. To his shock, he learned the tires he thought were new were manufactured three years earlier.

> "The tires came with a fiveyear/60,000-mile limited warranty," LaVigna related. He pointed out that the five-year warranty began the date the tires were manufactured. "When they put the tires on my car, three years of the five-year warranty were already up," he noted.

Upset by what he learned, LaVigna tried to contact the dealer for a refund. When he got no response, he filed a civil action against the dealer with Magisterial District Judge Ferris Webby Sr. While his civil action sought a refund, LaVigna said his main reason for the action was to let other motorists know that aging tires can be dangerous.

LaVigna was not successful in his civil action (the dealer did offer to replace the tires), but that has not deterred him from continuing his campaign to make motorists aware of the danger of aging tires. His goal is to make people aware of three main safety points.

Firstly, he points out, tires age from the moment they are manufactured. "The aging is caused by the process of oxidation," he explained. He pointed out an article on the Tire Safety Group (TSG) website which states tires expire in six years. "Older tires are substantially more likely to fail than newer tires," the article states. "This is because tires are made mostly of rubber, and rubber degrades with age. Sunlight, heat, ice and general wear and tear can accelerate the breakdown of a tire," according to

Because of oxidation, the article points out, the flexible components of a tire harden and become brittle. "Over time, the tire will simply fall apart under normal stress, just like an old rubber band," according to the TSG story. Importantly, as LaVigna noted, the article points out that the oxidation process occurs naturally and it does not matter if it is being used, stored as a spare, or simply waiting on a store shelf.

LaVigna points out that motorists can determine the date of manufacture of their tires by checking the sidewall of the tire. Federal rules require that the tire's 11-digit D.O.T. code be imprinted on the side of each

tire. The last four digits indicate the week and year the tire was manufactured. So, a code with "2615" means the tire was manufactured the 26th week of 2015. If you purchased that tire today, it would be almost four years old.

Finally, LaVigna reminds tire purchasers to make sure they request a copy of the manufacturer's warranty from tire dealers when purchasing new tires. He points out this information contains important information about the length of the warranty and what it covers. The documentation he received notes that the five-year warranty on his tires began the date of manufacture. "If you do not receive a copy of this document, you never know about the warranty and what it covers," he cautioned.

LaVigna notes that several automobile manufacturers, including Ford, GMC, Jeep, BMW, and Chrysler, have begun advising purchasers to replace tires and spare after six years, regardless of remaining tread.

There are some steps, LaVigna notes, that can be taken to help consumers make sure their tires are safe. He suggests tire dealers carefully check tires for cracks when they are doing a tire rotation, particularly on tires that are five or six years old.

He also suggests that when vehicles undergo their annual safety inspection, in addition to checking tread depth, the mechanics also make note of the age of the tire, not as part of the inspection pass/fail, but simply to inform the vehicle owner of the remaining life of the tire. He has made this suggestion to State Senator Lisa Baker and State Rep. Gerald Mullery. "Our legislators could help make our highways safer if they would have this procedure done," he






entity. The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) has established "Safe2Say Something" and will manage and maintain the program. The OAG is organizing the program in partnership with Sandy Hook Promise, a leader in anonymous reporting systems, who is building out the app, website, and PA-based 24/7 Crisis Center platform.

Safe2Say Something is a life-saving and life-changing school safety program that teaches students, educators, and administrators how to recognize the signs and signals ¬ - especially within social media - of individuals who may be at risk of hurting themselves or others and anonymously report this information through the Safe2Say Something app, website, or 24/7 Crisis Center Hotline.

MMI began the process of implementing this program last December when a group of faculty and administrators attended a Safe2Say Something training.

The Safe2Say Something program works to take every sign and signal seriously and encourages students to act quickly to get help by talking to a trusted adult. The program includes five steps. First, a tip is submitted via mobile app, website, or by calling the PA-based 24/7 Crisis Center. The tip is then triaged by the Crisis Center and, if needed, it is delivered to the impacted school's Safe2Say team. Local law enforcement is contacted, as needed. Following that, the school's team assesses and intervenes with the at-risk individual and closes out the tip and reports actions taken as a record for their school.

Students, educators, and administrators will be trained to recognize the signs and signals of individuals who may be at risk of hurting themselves or others, along with how to use the program's anonymous reporting system to submit tips of the signs and signals they observe
