

# Mountain Top welcomes Tuskegee Airman Harvey home

Lt. Colonel James H. Harvey III, a graduate of the former Fairview High School, and one of the famed Tuskegee Airmen, spoke to students and faculty at Crestwood High School about his life growing up in Mountain Top and his military career.

Harvey, who was president and valedictorian of his graduating class, described for students the obstacles he faced in becoming a pilot. But he also encouraged the students never to let obstacles stand in their way.

"Don't let obstacles stop you in anything you want to do," the 95-year-old Harvey told students. "You can go over, under or through any obstacle," he offered.

The decorated pilot, who served in World War II and the Korean War, was met at the high school by a contingent of Air Force officers who offered their thanks for his service. State Representatives Eddie Day Pashinski and Gerald Mullery presented him with a commendation from the House of Representatives. He also received a commendation from the state senate sponsored by Senators John Yudichak and Lisa Baker.

Harvey's visit to northeastern Pennsylvania, his first extended stay since he was drafted into the military in 1943, was sponsored by Mountain Top on the Move. The organization's president, Dianne Hopersberger, was master of ceremonies at the high school presentation, assisted by financial secretary Katie Larsen-Lick. High school principal Peg Foster welcomed Harvey on behalf of the students and faculty.

Harvey was born in Montclair, NJ and in 1936 he and his family moved to Nuangola Station. Though he was the only African-American in his school, Harvey said he did not experience any segregation or discrimination. "I was just another guy," he told the students. A self-described perfectionist, he became captain of the school's basketball team and anchor on its tumbling team.

He was drafted into the Army in April of 1943 and at this

Harvey wanted to become a pilot and was assigned to the Army Air Corps, but as an engineer, rather than a pilot.

The biggest obstacle Harvey faced in his quest to become a pilot, he said, was the color of his skin. He pointed out that many Army officers, particularly those from the south, believed in the stereotypes perpetuated by the Army War College *Studies of the Negro*  produced in the previous decade and the War College Reports of 1936. The studies and reports were primarily unscientific surveys and interviews of white officers who commanded African-American troops in World War I. Harvey said the studies described African-American soldiers in a negative light, using such

terms as child-like, careless, shiftless, irresponsible, unmoral and untruthful. The African-American soldier was branded as a comic, emotionally unstable, musically inclined with good rhythm" and "if fed, loyal and compliant."

"Since every white commander had a copy of this report this is how they perceived us," Harvey explained.

Despite the obstacles, he persisted and eventually was accepted for flight training at Tuskegee, Alabama.

Harvey pointed out that during the early forties the wash out or failure rate for white aviation cadets was 63 percent. The wash out rate for the first cadet class at Tuskegee was just 40 percent. Army officials, Harvey said, would not accept

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arm's reach.

that rate and were determined to make sure the wash out rate at Tuskegee was 70 percent or higher. "We were washed out for anything," Harvey related. "It did not have anything to do with our flying." He pointed out that white pilots simply had to demonstrate they could take off and land safely. "Everything we did had to be done to perfection," he noted.

This "Tuskegee Experiment" or "Tuskegee Experience" as it was called, was designed to fail, according to Harvey. "We were out to prove them wrong," he stated. As a result of the demand for perfection, the commander of the Tuskegee Army Air Field told the commander of the white flying school at Montgomery, Alabama, "we wash out better pilots at Tuskegee than you graduate here at Montgomery."

He graduated from flying

school at Tuskegee Army Air Field as a second lieutenant. His unit's deployment to Europe, however, was put on hold in April of 1945 because the war was almost over. "Hitler heard I was on my way," he quipped.

Harvey was one of three members of the 332nd Fighter Group selected for the first ever USAF Weapons Meet (Top Gun) at Nellis Air Force Base, Las Vegas. His team placed first, achieving the first ever "Top Gun" honors. However, the men were not fully recognized for their accomplishment until 1995, when the Air Force archives were updated officially documenting their victory.

In May of 1949, respond-

ing to threatened lawsuits, the military officially ended segregation. The 99th Fighter Squadron was disbanded, and its members integrated fully into operational squadrons.

During the Korean War, Harvey became the military's first black jet fighter pilot to fly in Korean airspace. He flew 126 combat missions in Korea, providing support to ground troops. He earned the Distinguished Flying Cross and 11 Air Medals. In 2006, the Tuskegee Airmen were awarded the Congressional Gold Medal.

After the Korean War, he served as a flight commander, test pilot, assistant group operations officer, flight safety officer, and Battle Staff Training Officer for the Commanding General of NORAD. Harvey retired in 1965 after 22 years of service. He resides in Denver, Colorado.

## Fairview to participate in electronics recycling

Fairview Township supervisors announced at their May 7 meeting that the township will hold a joint electronic recycling event with Wright Township on Saturday, June 15, from 2 to 5 p.m. at the Wright Township recycling center.

The event is for residents of Fairview and Wright Townships only. Permits will be \$10 per car and will be available at both municipal buildings for residents of the respective municipalities. Proof of residency is required. Items that can be recycled for the \$10 fee include desktop and laptop computers and accessories; cell phone and laptop batteries, calculators, DVD players and VCRs, gaming systems, telephones and cell phones, audio visual equipment, toner and ink cartridges.

There will be an additional fee payable to the recycler for monitors, televisions, floor copiers, and console stereos. The fee schedule is available on the Wright Township web site. The recycler is Responsible Recycling Services.

The two townships will split the cost of the event and share in reimbursement from Luzerne County.

### Other township business ...

Supervisors approved a zoning change for a property at 140 N. Main Street from medium density residential to neighborhood commercial. The property had been commercial prior to the townshipwide rezoning in 2003.

Supervisors awarded a contract for paving of Shady Tree Drive to American Asphalt Paving Co. at a cost of \$128,880 pending approval of the engineer. American Asphalt was the lowest of four bidders.

They accepted the resignation of police officer Joseph Benson and voted to hire one full-time and one part-time officer.

They also announced they are seeking residents to serve on the zoning hearing board. There is one permanent vacancy and one alternate vacancy. Terms are for five years. Zoning officer John Doddo said the board meets on the second Wednesday of the month at 6:30 p.m. only when there are items on the agenda. The board usually meets no more than five or six times a year.

Doddo also reminded residents that the township ordinance requires grass be cut to a height of no more than six inches. He said the ordinance will be enforced.

Supervisors voted to install a generator at the municipal

building at a cost of \$10,780.

## Rice trying to find contractor to complete dam project

Rice Township is going to try a second time to find a contractor to complete the Ice Lakes dam outlet repair project. The township advertised for bids last month, but no bids were received by the April 30 deadline. At their May 7 meeting, supervisors voted to re-advertise for bids for the long-delayed repairs.

In March, supervisors voted to file a lawsuit against A.R. Popple Construction, Inc. and its bond company, Philadelphia Indemnity Insurance Co. to recover costs associated with the outlet project.

In December 2017, supervisors awarded AR Popple a \$179,500 contract for repairs the dam. In late February 2018, the contractor started the process of lowering the water level in the lake to allow access to a pipe in the dam wall. By early March, Pasonick reported Popple had completed about 25 percent of the de-watering process needed to construct a coffer dam. However, in mid-May, the contractor halted work on the project, leaving behind a muddy lake bed.

Township officials have been dealing with the Ice Lake dam issue for three years. In late summer of 2015, property owners around the lake notified the township, which owns the lake, that the water level was dropping. At the time, engineers determined the problem was a valve in a drain pipe in the dam.

#### Other township business ...

Rice Township supervisors also voted at their May meeting to apply for a \$243,946 grant from the state Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) Greenways, Trails and Recreation program for construction of a soccer field. The township will commit \$43,049 from the general fund and/or recreation fund as local match. Barry Isett Engineers is the project engineer. The soccer field is part of the township's park master plan.

As a result of seeking proposals for insurance coverage, the township expects to save approximately \$26,000

## Rice Township puts gaming grant to good use

It didn't take Rice Township long to put its \$150,000 Local Shares Account (gaming) grant to use.

Supervisor Bob Pipech, the township's road master, said the township has placed an order for a JCB 4CX15 HFCE Super backhoe. The backhoe will come equipped with 96-inch front bucket; a 24-inch hoe bucket; a 94-inch sweeper collection system with sprinkler kit; and a patch planer. The hoe will extend to allow a digging depth of 20 feet. Pipech said the equipment will allow township road crews to perform street maintenance work for which it previously had to hire contractors, including small paving projects. The backhoe will replace a 1992 backhoe currently in use.

# Nuangola receives grant for pole barn

Nuangola Borough councilman Joseph Tucker, the township's road master, is ecstatic over the \$63,833 gaming grant the borough received for construction of a pole barn garage. The 36-50-foot garage will be used to house the borough's public works trucks, including a 2019 GMC Sierra



3500 extended-cab one-ton dump truck purchased with a \$63,800 gaming grant received previously.

The councilman said he is hopeful the building will be completed by the end of summer.

## Many candidates vying for school board seats

The May 21 Primary Election is just a few days away and while there are only a handful of candidates for municipal offices, there are plenty of candidates for seats on the Crestwood school board.

There are five seats up for election on the Crestwood School Board. Incumbents Anna M. Hollock Bibla, Joseph Kaminski, Bill Thomas and Bill Jones have all cross-filed for Democratic and Republican nominations for re-election. Incumbent Ron Sturgeon is running for re-election as an Independent. Four people have formed the United for Change team seeking elec-

## Smolenak to participate in short-term study abroad experience in Greece

Sixteen King's College students, including Mountain Top resident Alexandria Smolenak, and one faculty member will travel to Greece as part of a three-week intensive study-abroad experience titled, Philosophy as a Way of Life: The Sacred Spaces of Greece.

In Rice Township incumbent Bob Pipech is the lone candidate for the Democratic nomination for a six-year term as supervisor. Pipech is the cur-

rent chairman of the board. There are no Republican candidates on the ballot.

He learned the profession from his grandfather and worked alongside him until his passing in 1968. The business subsequently became known as Frankenfield's Barber Shop.

When the 79-year-old Frankenfield decided to retire in 2018, it signified the closing of what many Mountain Top historians believe was the longest continually operated business in the area. The shop was started by Moyer in 1926.

Frankenfield's wife, Audrey, said she was pleased he was selected to lead the parade and quite proud of him. "I think he has really earned it," she remarked. "He has been known as the Mayor of Mountain Top for a long time."

The couple has three chil-

dren, David, who resides in Camp Hill; John, Apex, NC; and Elaine, who resides in Mountain Top and Venice, Florida. He expects David and Elaine to attend the parade.

## Public works departments acknowledged during week of May 19-25

When the snow flies, they are the men and women who head for their trucks to keep our roads open and safe.

When wind and rain cause flooding and downed tree

They are the men and women of our local public works departments, the oftenunsung heroes of our society, the professionals who serve the public good every day. The

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week of May 19-25 has been designated National Public Works Week, a perfect opportunity to celebrate the men and women who keep townships and boroughs running all year long.

Public works crews across Mountain Top range from a four-person road crew in Wright Township to a part-time department in Nuangola. No matter what their size, their responsibilities remain the same, keeping roads safe and infrastructures reliable.

"Our road department is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week to meet the needs of our residents," said Wright Township road master Michael Marshall. "They are out there plowing and cindering in the winter. They respond to water problems, fallen trees and fix-

ing potholes. They do whatever it takes to get our residents home safe," he added. Marshall noted that sometimes road crews get a bad rap for problems that are not their

responsibility. "Besides our township roads, we have state and county roads in the township," he explained. "Sometimes people don't know whose responsibility it is to maintain the different roads."

In Wright Township, the four-person crew, headed by foreman Matthew Howton, who is also a township supervisor, has over 100 years of experience. The department is responsible for a myriad of duties, not the least of which is maintaining the 40 miles of township roadways. Besides plowing and salting and patching potholes, the department maintains swales to ensure storm water runs smoothly. The workers pick up leaves throughout the township in the fall and spring; conduct the township's annual weeklong spring cleanup and oneday electronic recycling. They maintain the busy recycling center and the township park; erect signs throughout the township; repair storm water piping and culverts. Recently, the crew replaced a 36-inch storm water drain pipe under Glen Summit spur and has been cutting down dead and diseased trees in the township park.

Rice Township has a threeperson road crew under the direction of road master Bob Pipech. Like Wright Township, the crew is responsible for plowing and cindering throughout the winter and patching potholes throughout the year. The township is responsible for maintaining 24 miles of roads. Pipech pointed out the crews also operate the township recycling center, cut brush along the roads and address drainage problems. The township recently placed an order to purchase a back

hoe with equipment that will allow township employees to perform some road paving projects that it previously hired contractors for.

"We have a great crew," Pipech said of his three-person department. "They handle so many things that people don't realize."

Nuangola Borough has seven miles of roads for which it is responsible. Councilman Joseph Tucker, the borough's road master, pointed out that while there are only seven miles of borough roads, most are steep hills that require lots of attention during winter months. He noted that he and Francis Suhoski, the borough's long-time road department worker, carry fire and ambulance pagers. "If there is an ambulance call by the lake during the winter, we try to get there to plow and salt to

make sure the ambulance can get in and out," Tucker related. "We're often there before the ambulance," he added.

Besides winter road maintenance, the road department is responsible for signs, brush cutting and maintaining drainage ditches. Suhoski, who has worked for the borough since 1993, is on call 24 hours a day.

Tucker pointed out that the borough recently purchased a 2019 GMC Sierra one-ton dump truck. The borough received a \$63,800 grant to buy the truck and another \$63,833 gaming grant to erect a pole barn. He expects the pole barn to be erected by the end of summer. "We have two new trucks. We are in the best shape we've ever been in as far as equipment," Tucker commented.
