



## **Appeal briefs** filed for Dorrance **Township**

**Dorrance Township solicitor** Donald Karpowich told supervisors at their August meeting that the Blue Ridge Trail Planned Residential Development (PRD) appeal briefs have been filed by the township with the court of common pleas.

Following the recommendation of the township planning commission, Dorrance Township supervisors denied approval of the proposed PRD last December following nearly two years of hearings and meetings on the project.

The township's planning commission cited several deficiencies in the plan in their recommendation to supervisors to deny approval. The area for which the PRD is planned is zoned conservation. A PRD is a permitted use in that district, however the developer needed to obtain conditional use approval from the township. In August 2017 supervisors gave

conditional approval to allow the project on a 2-1 vote. The developer had 12 months to submit a site design plan to the township for review to determine if it meets all requirements for a PRD. It was that plan which the supervisors decided not to approve.

# Proposed ordinance banning feeding of stray and feral cats put on hold in Fairview

A proposed ordinance that would ban feeding of stray and feral cats in Fairview Township was put on hold at the supervisors' August 6 meeting after they heard from nearly a dozen residents opposed to the proposal.

Nearly 20 residents turned out for the meeting, filling the municipal building meeting room. After listening to the residents who opposed the measure, and one resident who supported it, supervisor Mike Iorio said he would move to table the ordinance until the board's September meeting.

"We will table this for 30 days," Iorio stated. "I expect a group of people to come to us with a plan to control (the feral and stray cats). Come to us with a plan and we will look at it," he added. "If not, we will vote on it," he said of the

proposed ordinance. Iorio and supervisor Fred Rose voted to table the amendment to the code of ordinances. Supervisor Robert Orloski Jr. was absent.

While describing himself as neither an animal lover nor an animal hater, Iorio told residents he would put the concerns of a township resident over animals. "When it comes to a choice between a resident living in the township or animals, the resident will win," Iorio stated.

The proposed amendment states that "No person shall feed or in any manner provide or place food or water for any feral or stray cat which is not

under the ownership or legal possession of such person on any public or private property."

It came about after Forest Road resident Mike Daikon told supervisors at their June meeting that a neighbor is feeding cats which are defecating on his property, in his shrub bed, and making a mess of his grass. He asked the supervisors if they could pass an ordinance to make it illegal to feed stray or feral cats.

Daikon spoke at Tuesday's session and was the only person to speak in favor of the

## Wapwallopen man wants to open micro-brewery in Mountain Top

George Merenich is hoping to open a micro-brewery and locate the facility in the former Geisinger clinic at 12 Kirby Avenue, Fairview Township. Before he can move forward with his plans, however, Merenich must receive approval from the township's zoning hearing board. The property, at the corner of Kirby Avenue and North Main Street, is in a Highway Commercial (HC) zone. Micro-breweries are a permitted use in an HC zone,

only if the zoning hearing board grants a special exception.

Fairview Township zoning hearing board did approve a special exception request for Lanahu Ales to operate the micro-brewery. George Merenich, owner of Lanahu Ales, told the zoning hearing board the business will be closed on Sundays and Mondays with hours of 4-9 p.m. Tuesday through Friday and noon to 9 p.m. on Saturday. He also plans to have a food truck in the parking lot.

The board's approval was conditioned on the hours of operation set forth by Merenich. Additionally, only one food truck will be allowed on the property at one time and the trucks must connect to the building's electrical power, rather than a generator.

## **New zoning** company in Wright **Township soon**

There soon will be a new company handling zoning issues, code enforcement and building permits in Wright Township.

At their August 13 meeting, supervisors accepted the resignation of Strategic Municipal Group as its zoning and code enforcement officer effective August 31. Township secretary Pam Heard said the company indicated in its resignation letter that the job requirements take more time that is allotted in its contract. The company has performed zoning and code enforcement for the township for about five years.

After accepting the resignation, supervisors voted to hire Barry Isett & Associates as its new zoning and code enforcement firm. The firm will be paid \$10,000 annually, prorated on a monthly basis. The contract calls for Isett & Associates to have a representative in the municipal building one day a week for two hours.

Isett & Associates also will handle building code inspection duties which also had been performed by Code ularly those with industrial Inspection Inc

Supervisors also voted to adopt a new fee schedule for residential and commercial structures pursuant to the Pennsylvania Uniform Construction Code. The resolution to adopt the new fee structure indicates the action is necessary to defray expenses incurred by the township in connection with various applications and permits for which the Isett firm is compensated as inspector under the Uniform Construction Code.

Supervisor Don Zampetti said the new fee schedule will bring the township in line with other municipalities, particparks.

## In other business ...

Officials also took action to limit the number of animals for which the township will pay for residents to drop off at the SPCA. Supervisors passed a motion to limit residents to a maximum of three animals per year. Residents may drop off more than three animals at the SPCA, but they will be responsible for the fee.

Township secretary Pamela Heard reported the MS4 waiver application is complete and will be submitted to the state Department of Environmental prepared by LVIC Civil engineers, Selinsgrove, at a cost of \$2,950.


Supervisors earlier this year tabled action on a proposed MS4 pollution reduction plan prepared by Borton-Lawson Engineering. The action came after the board reviewed the extensive comments on the plan from the township's Environmental Advocacy Committee (EAC) which suggested the

township investigate seeking a waiver from DEP. The township's proposed five-year pollution reduction plan to meet federal Clean Water Act requirements would cost the township more than \$1 million to implement, money the township does not have.

## **Wright Township** votes to extend KOZ exemption

Wright Township supervisors voted at their August 12 meeting to extend until 2029 the Keystone Opportunity Zone tax exemption for the former Poseidon Pool property in the Crestwood Industrial Park, a move that could open the way for construction of a large industrial building on the site.

The KOZ designation, if approved by Luzerne County Council and Crestwood School Board, would exempt the property owner from municipal, school and county property taxes for 10 years. Supervisors noted the township currently does not receive any tax revenue from the property. While it would not receive property taxes for the length of the KOZ designation, the township would receive tax revenue from people who may become employed there.

Luzerne County Council is expected to address the

request at its August 27 meeting. Crestwood School Board has yet to vote on it.

Developer Rob Mericle and Wico van Genderen, president of the Wilkes-Barre Chamber of Commerce, addressed supervisors at their work session prior to the regular meeting. Mericle outlined his plans to build a 217,000-square foot industrial building on the 27-acre site. He said the development would result in about 174 new jobs. The developer said his company and the chamber are working to meet requirements of Pennsylvania Act 2 which Mericle said deals with cleanup of environmentally challenged properties. Should the plan go through, Mericle would pay back taxes amounting to approximately \$20,000, according to township officials.

The Greater Wilkes-Barre Industrial Fund, a subsidiary of the chamber, assumed control of the property after Poseidon Pools closed and filed for bankruptcy in 1998.

Following the supervisors meeting, Mericle said if the other taxing bodies approve the KOZ extension, it would still take about two years to meet the requirements of Act 2 and another six to nine months to construct a building.

Wright Township resident Gary Tredinnick questioned what would happen if the plan goes through and a company who moves into the building leaves after the expiration of the KOZ. Representatives of the Mericle firm said as the owner of the building, they would be responsible for paying the taxes.

# Fairview police department receives state-of-the-art license plate reader

The Fairview Township police department has a new state-of-the-art tool to help officers detect stolen vehicles as well as those with expired or suspended registrations.

The device, a Genetec automatic license plate recognition (ALPR) system recently was installed on one of the department's vehicles. The system, which includes two plate readers, cost \$16,000 and was funded through a Local Shares Account (gaming) grant.

Police Chief Phil Holbrook said since the state no longer issues registration stickers for license plates, the system quickly helps officers identify expired or suspended registrations as well as stolen vehicles. The system consists of two readers mounted on the vehicle's light bar. One faces the front of the vehicle and the other the rear. Holbrook explained that the readers constantly scans for registration plates. When it identifies a plate, the plate and vehicle are displayed on a computer screen in the vehicle. If the plate is registered to a stolen vehicle, a red border appears around the screen. If the plate is expired, a yellow border appears. A blue border means the plate is suspended.

Holbrook said on a recent eight-hour shift, the reader scanned nearly 800 vehicles. It "hit" on 21 plates that were either suspended for lack of insurance or expired. He emphasized that not all those operators received a citation. "We use discretion," he emphasized. "If a plate recently expired, we may issue a warning,"

The chief said when a "hit" appears on a license plate, officers verify the information

by either running it on their onboard computer system or through Luzerne County commended township supervisors for their foresight in applying for the grant. "It's a tremendous help," he noted.

# Camp Cadet is a learning experience for over eighty area young adults

Camp Cadet is a law enforcement academy program for area youth held every summer at Camp Kresge in White Haven.

Over eighty young adults from Luzerne, Wyoming, Sullivan and Bradford Counties attended the week-long free camp. The cadets had to write an essay and complete an application process in order to be chosen to attend. The camp is free because of the Pennsylvania State Police Troop "P" Camp Cadet Board of Directors yearlong fundraising efforts.

The Camp started on Sunday, August 4 and concluded on Friday, August 9. On Thursday, August 8 from 12:30 to 2:30 p.m. the camp held media day where members of the media could experience Camp Cadet life with the Troop "P" cadets.

This year on media day one of several Pennsylvania State Police helicopters landed in the sports field and the cadets were given the opportunity to see and ask questions on the role of the helicopters and the pilots who fly them.

Camp Cadet develops respect and discipline in the cadets through actual training that simulates the same courses Pennsylvania troopers are required to complete before they serve the public. They experienced a brief study of the physical training, self-discipline and courtesy each male and female trooper undertake in one week. Each cadet was instructed by the finest men and women in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, troopers from their respective headquarters who know the value of reinforcing good choices and giving direction to those who choose the right path to follow.

There was also a hands-on class study of many of the sciences involved in police work. The dynamics of how the law enforcement world evolves and the necessary means of cause and effect. From the human sciences of team work to the dangerous world of drug consumption and abuse. Not everything is work; the cadets swim and do other activities for fun. No cell phones or other electronics are allowed during the week.

amendment. "If it's not happening to you, it's not a big deal," Daikon said of the problem which he described as toxic. A cat owner himself, Daikon said he keeps his animals indoors. He said he purchased a natural cat repellent to keep the cats away, but it did not deter the animals from urinating and defecating on his

The residents who spoke out against the proposed ordinance described it as inhumane, and unenforceable. They suggested the township look at other options to deal with the issue.

property.

"How is this (amendment) going to solve the problem? How is it going to be enforced?" asked resident Toni Loftus. She questioned if the ordinance is based on evidence that it is the

best way to deal with feral cats.

"I am very upset," said resident Marie Ryan. "It is inhumane and evil," she added. She described the proposed ordinance as an overreaction to a problem. "I don't want to feel like I'm living in a police state," she added. She recommended the ordinance be tabled to allow time for a better solution

Several residents told supervisors there are more humane ways to deal with the feral and stray cat issue. They suggested trap, neuter and release programs.

Township solicitor Donald Karpowich, who drafted the ordinance, noted that other communities who enacted a no feed ordinance wound up going to a trap, neuter and release program. Karpowich recommended residents examine the trap, neuter and release program adopted in Conyn-

gham Borough where he is solicitor. He offered to provide residents with contact information for the person running the program in that community.

Prior to the end of the meeting, residents collected telephone numbers of persons interested in becoming involved in a trap, neuter and release program.

# Politicians issue statements about closing of White Haven Center

## Mullery opposed to White Haven closure

State Rep. Gerald Mullerv is opposed to the closure of the White Haven Center, as announced recently by the state Department of Human Services.

"On behalf of the residents, their families and the more than 400 caregivers at the White Haven Center, I am strongly against closing the facility. This is the only home many of the residents have ever known, and while some argue community care is more cost effective, it certainly won't be the same," Mullery said.

The department noted the declining census and cost per resident as key factors in the closure. Mullery contends both statistics are "artificial"

and "self-serving."

"For years, the department has fought tooth and nail against admissions into our State Centers despite tens of thousands on the waiting list for care," Mullery said. "To turn around and cite a low census and cost-per-resident figures is disingenuous at best and fraudulent at worst.

"This decision, made by a lame duck governor, not only will impact the most vulnerable residents of our commonwealth and their families, but will also dramatically affect the Greater White Haven community. Many of the small, family-owned businesses in the area rely upon the patronage of the center's employees.

"A few years ago, when the state Department of Corrections announced it planned

to close SCI-Retreat, SCI-Frackville and SCI-Waymart, the communities rallied and were successful in showing state officials that we needed to keep the facilities open. It's my hope that we will be able to redouble those efforts and maintain the services provided at White Haven Center for years to come," he said.

## **Senator Baker** comments on planned closure of **White Haven Center**

Sen. Lisa Baker, R-20th, offered the following statement regarding Gov. Tom Wolf's decision to begin the process to close two state centers for severely disabled residents, including the one in

White Haven:

"The decision by the Wolf Administration to close White Haven and Polk Centers will have a dramatic effect on residents and their families - taking and removing some individuals from the only home they've ever known, and forcing families dependent upon state centers to find new

accommodations.

This will create great angst and concern for this vulnerable population and those employees who serve them. Due to their location, there will be questions about the economic consequences as well as about the assurances

of equivalent care being available within the community, as most residents are classified profoundly disabled and in need of skilled care.

Local officials, workers, residents and families will need to fully participate in the public hearing and push to ensure that families have choices about where their loved ones are being served, including allowing their loved ones to remain in a state center if they choose."

## **Toohil issues** statement on pending closure of **White Haven Center**

Rep. Tarah Toohil (R-Luzerne) issued the following statement in response to today's announcement by the Pennsylvania Department of Human

Services that the White Haven Center will close in 2022. The decision affects 429 employees and 112 residents, who will be moved into communitybased settings.

"I am a longtime proponent of the White Haven Center, which has provided outstanding care to the most severely disabled members of our community for more than 60 years.

"I am heartbroken and disappointed by the crushing news that it will close, resulting in

difficult, life-altering changes for the hundreds of men and women who live and work there.

"The center is much more than an institution. It is the only home many residents have ever known. They and their families now face uncertainty in making the transition to living situations in the community.

"That is why we are not going accept this decision and take every measure possible to get a reversal by the governor and Department of Human Services."





graves. These soldiers and their families paid a very high price for the freedoms we enjoy. It is a disservice to them to try to censor people.

The group involved here appears to be open to anyone in the area to discuss things about the area, and specifically mentioned was information about safety issues. So again, posting speedtraps also complies with this group's stated purpose. Police operations are a safety issue. Any

police activity in public is free to be watched, recorded, and discussed. Posting such info is not meant to degrade police in any way, and the police said they were fine with posting their activity. One chief noted this is actually required for DUI checkpoints. So as long as posters comply with the website's terms and posts fall within the bounds of the stated purpose of the group, all should be fine.

I am very encouraged that one police department has a policy to issue a lot of warnings, but this raises another question. If many people are being pulled over, then it proves that the speed limits are likely not in compliance with the 85th percentile speeds of the roads, and need to be raised. Properly posted speed limits see few violators, we are much safer, and the police are not needed to enforce the limits.

Speeding was shown to cause 1.6% of crashes (barely above zero), per data submitted to the federal government by half the states. Most reputable studies show it at under 5%. The real crisis is the lack of properly posted speed limits. Few people realize this. When you stand by

the road, it looks like all cars are flying by. Back up 200 feet and the same cars would have appeared much slower, due to your point of reference changing. Visual estimation of speed will not be accurate in either case.

Regarding drivers obeying some new stop signs, that is always a problem at first, until people get used to the new signs being up. That is why the state typically employs flashing lights and other things to alert people to new stop signs being present.

Regarding the letter in the last issue, some very large PA cit-

ies were mentioned. Any problems there are likely due to the anti-driver policies being implemented in the cities. PennDOT data has shown that the roads over the past few years in the state are the safest they have ever been, despite more miles being driven. So no, there is no safety crisis here.

I have many ideas of things area municipalities can easily do to improve safety, but this letter just addresses the topics from the last newspaper issue.
