



Feral cat ordinance put on hold

Cat ordinance Fairview Township residents who enjoy feeding stray or feral cats won't have to worry about running afoul of the law – at least until next October.

Township supervisors voted at their October 1 meeting to table for one year a vote on a proposed ordinance that would have prohibited feeding stray felines.

The ordinance, introduced at the board's August meeting, states that "No person shall feed or in any manner provide or place food or water for any feral or stray cat which is not under the ownership or legal possession of such person on any public or private property."

It came about after a Forest Road resident complained to supervisors at their June meeting that a neighbor was feeding cats which were defecating and urinating on his property. He asked the supervisors if they could pass an ordinance to make it illegal to feed stray or feral cats.

Nearly 20 residents turned out for the August meeting. Nearly a dozen spoke out against the proposed ordinance, saying it would not solve the problem, was inhumane, and unenforceable. After listening to the residents who opposed the measure, and one resident who supported it,

supervisors tabled action until their September meeting.

At the September meeting, after hearing from residents who presented a trap, neuter, release (TNR) plan to deal with stray and feral cats, and an organization that promised to work with residents, supervisors once again put off voting on the measure.

One of those residents, Gail Snyder, attended the October 1 supervisors meeting. She told supervisors seven cats were trapped, neutered, vaccinated and released in September, bringing to 11 the total number of animals she and her neighbors have trapped. Snyder promised to make monthly reports to supervisors on the progress of the project.

Resident Jeff Betashick told supervisors he has seen an impact from the TNR efforts. "It's working," Betashick told supervisors. "It's gone from 25

cats (in his neighborhood) to one. Whatever they are doing it's working. My hat is off to them "

In other business ...

Prior to the October 1 meeting, supervisors swore in Robert Valatka as a full-time police officer. His addition brings the department to seven full-time officers.

Supervisors awarded a contract to Sledziewski Trucking to furnish equipment for winter snow removal. The firm was the only bidder.

They also approved a request from Lindsey Higgins to teach a yoga class at Fairview Park on the weekend of October 26 or November 3. Higgins said she would donate any proceeds to the fire department.

Dominos Pizza may soon deliver in Mountain Top

Dominos Pizza may soon be delivering in Mountain Top. Rumor has it the pizza chain is looking at a location along South Mountain Boulevard for an outlet to serve Mountain Top.

Questions and concerns about the Atlantic Broadband cable installation project in Wilderness Estates dominated public comment at the October 1 Rice Township board of supervisors meeting.

The company began installation of cable to provide high speed internet service over the summer. Supervisors reported at their September meeting that the project was begun without the knowledge of township officials and without a permit.

At the October meeting, residents report the project has stalled, leaving Wilderness Drive in need of repairs.

The utility has installed cable

on a section of Wilderness Drive but has not completed the installation. One resident told supervisors he heard the company was weighing whether to complete the project on Wilderness Drive. Resident Bob Smith expressed concern that the driveway cuts made on Wilderness Drive be properly filled in before winter sets in. Supervisor Bob Pipech said the contractor should repair the

closing these facilities would create unnecessary and devastating emotional and financial duress."

House Bill 1918 would enact a moratorium on the closing of both White Haven and Polk state centers until Pennsylvania is better prepared to respond to the impending fallout. It has bipartisan support with co-prime sponsors Rep. Tarah Toohil, R-Luzerne, and Rep. R. Lee James, R-Venango/ Butler.

"The residents of these

centers have been receiving outstanding care for many years from dedicated employees who treat them like family. Their lives have now been turned upside down by the governor's heartbreaking decision," Toohil said. "When the closure announcement was made, all of us pledged to do everything within our power to help. House Bill 1918 is another step in that process."

"I am committed to giving a voice to these residents and their families," James said. "Make no mistake about it, these are folks who require roundthe-clock care and will not survive in community homes."

Hearings were held regarding the Department of Human Services' proposed closure of the centers to hear testimony from interested parties. Mullery took the lead in those proceedings.

"The recent hearing conducted by the Senate Human Services Committee revealed that the decision to close these facilities was made without any stakeholder input," Mullery said. "Moreover, Secretary Miller was unable to provide adequate responses to the simplest of questions posed by state lawmakers.

"The hearing established one uncontroverted fact. This decision was not properly vetted, well-planned or well-executed. As such, the decision to uproot our most vulnerable constituents should be reversed and future discussion should be completely transparent," Mullery said.



Yellow Ribbon Club to prevent teen suicide. After graduating in 2007 from Kenyon College, she was a community organizer in Philadelphia for Working America. She tirelessly worked in the field of health insurance reform, first for the support and passage of the ACA with the Philadelphia Unemployment Project, then as the statewide advocacy director for the Pennsylvania Health Action Network. Ford died in 2016 as a result of complications sustained in an automobile collision where she was a seat-belted passenger and suffered a traumatic brain injury. In addition to honoring Ford's memory at MMI, Kenyon College awarded her its most prestigious honor, the Kenyon Alumni Council Humanitarian Service Award, and the Keystone Research Project permanently named their annual Citizen Activist Award after her. Her legacy will not be forgotten, as she will continue to inspire MMI students to a life of service through this fund.

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

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

Misericordia University recently recognized the second class of students to receive the full-tuition Sister Mary Glennon '62 Scholarships during a reception in the Catherine Evans McGowan Room of the Mary Kintz Bevevino Library.

The 2019 Glennon Scholarships recipients and academic majors are: Brooke Chronister, Casey Franzreb, Cecelia Heidelberger, Caitlyn Henry, Peyton Kimmel and Patrick Rother of Mountain Top.

The merit-based scholarship program awards six competitive scholarships annually to qualified incoming first-year students. Every first-time, full-time student who is admitted by January 1, 2020 to the private, four-year Catholic institution is eligible for the scholarship program that covers four years of tuition as long as the students meet established academic criteria.

Students who apply to the University and meet or exceed eligibility criteria (1250 SAT or 26 ACT and 3.7 GPA or 1250 SAT or 26 ACT and top 5 percent of their graduating class) will be invited to participate in

the competitive selection process. The University invites eligible applicants to participate in a tour of campus, have lunch with faculty and students in their field of study, and to write an essay.

A five-member committee reviews the completed essays and narrows the field to about 12 students. Committee members interview finalists and make scholarship offers to students who plan to major in academic programs available in each of the University's three colleges – College

of Arts and Sciences, College of Business and College of Health Sciences and Education. Overall, the program will award no more than three scholarships to any one college and not less than one each.

The essay writing dates for students interested in the 2020 Glennon Scholarships program are Wednesdays, January 22, 29 and February 5. The finalists will interview with committee members on Monday, February 17. Scholarship recipients will receive notification prior to March 1.



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Spotted Lanternfly workshop to be held October 18 in Butler Township

What's going on with spotted lanternflies? What do we need to know? Can they do damage?

To find out more, attend the workshop on Friday, October 18, Butler Township Municipal Building, 83 Corporate Drive, Drums.

The program begins at 9:50 a.m. and ends at noon. Admission is free. Refreshments will be provided. Register online at pnercd.org or call 570-234-3577. Registration beforehand is encouraged. Walk-ins are welcomed.

The Spotted Lanternfly is an invasive species native to Southeast Asia. In 2014 it was found in Pennsylvania, and has since spread to 14 counties which are now quarantined.

The Spotted Lanternfly presents a significant threat to Penn-

sylvania agriculture, including the grape, tree-fruit, hardwood and nursery industries. Learn the history, economic danger, current quarantine area, and life cycle of this invader. Learn about controls, herbicide treatments, and 'trap' trees.

The program is being offered by Pocono Northeast Resource Conservation & Development Council (PNERCD) and Luzerne Conservation District. This workshop is funded by USDA National Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) and sponsored by Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture.

PNERCD has been in operation for more than forty years, carrying out many environmentally-related projects. Current projects include:

- Contracts with the US National Resources Conservation Center (NRCS) to carry out a variety of tasks in the environmental field, related to water quality and soil health.
 - Educating and providing

technical assistance through six partner organizations to Pennsylvania-based watershed and conservation organizations.

- A renewable energy project which showed how warm season grasses could be used by farmers for their own heating needs.
- Educational workshops for the public on environmental issues. During 2019 PNERCD has already held a workshops on bats and another on warblers. Each of these species have been experiencing major decreases in population in Pennsylvania. This will be the third workshop for 2019.

The Council covers a 10-county region in northeastern Pennsylvania, including Carbon, Columbia, Lackawanna, Luzerne, Monroe, Montour, Northumberland, Pike, Schuylkill, and Wayne. It is a non-profit

charitable organization composed of community leaders who have worked with renewable energy, land conservation, water management and environmental enhancement, and accepts tax-deductible contributions.

The Luzerne Conservation District is a local agency with the mission of conserving land and water resources in Luzerne County by promoting public awareness, providing technical assistance, and encouraging regulatory compliance.
