



Swank selected as honorary survivor at 2019 Komen Race for the Cure

in recognition of her determination to overcome breast cancer and her work to raise awareness and funds for research and support, Lael Swank has become known, as she describes it, "the breast cancer poster child."

This year, her efforts were recognized far beyond Mountain Top. Swank was selected as the honorary survivor at the 2019 Komen Greater Pennsylvania Race for the Cure held September 21 in Scranton.

Her recognition was welldeserved.

Swank was diagnosed with

Throughout Mountain Top, breast cancer in 2010 at age 39. She underwent a bilateral mastectomy, chemotherapy, and 25 rounds of radiation. She participated in a clinical trial and was cancer-free for eight years. Over that period, Swank devoted her time and energy to the Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure. Year after year, with the support of her husband, Randy, and sons Jason and Garrett, Swank organized a team to participate in the Race for the Cure and raised funds for the effort.

"The support has been overwhelming," she said. "It's been amazing."

A year ago, she learned the breast cancer had returned and over the past summer a scan showed it had spread to her liver.

The return of the cancer and her treatment regimen did not stop her. With the support of her family, friends and the community she organized a team to participate in the 2019 race and raised over \$12,000 for the fight against cancer.

"It was extremely important, especially right now," the 48-year-old Swank said of the work to participate in the race

and raise funds. "This time around, I think it's on a different level," she added.

Over the past several years Swank's Race for the Cure team was supported by the Ice House Pub. The business was sold this year and since she did not know the new owners, she reached out to Jim Foley, the owner of Cavanaugh's Grille.

"When I approached Jim, he immediately told me 'whatever you need'," she related. Cavanaugh's became the sponsor of this year's race team known as Cavanaugh's – Padre Pio's Racers. "He has been unbelievable," Swank said of Foley.

The team held two major fundraisers over the months leading up to the race. The first was a 5k run sponsored by The Fitness Place in Mountain Top. Following the race, Cavana-

ugh's hosted a breakfast buffet and Bloody Mary and mimosa bar for participants.

On September 7, Cavanaugh's hosted a Taco and Tap Takeover which was hugely successful. The event raised over \$6,000. "We couldn't have done as well without him (Foley)," she offered. Foley bought 200 t-shirts, paid for the beer and taco ingredients. Lael's husband Randy made the tacos along with volunteers Mark Hilpp, Luigi Carannante and Michelangelo DeRosa and Cavanaugh's staff.

"Jim and his staff and chefs worked their butts off," Swank

ditional support.she was able to locate a vein for a needle after several previous


unsuccessful attempts.



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
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Saving for College



Many families finance a college education with help from student loans and other types of financial aid such as grants and workstudy, private loans, current income, gifts from grandparents, and other creative cost-cutting measures. But savings are the cornerstone of any successful college financing plan.

College costs keep climbing

It's important to start a college fund as soon as possible, because next to buying a home, a college education might be the biggest purchase you ever make. According to the College Board, for the 2018/2019 school year, the average cost of one year at a fourvear public college for in-state students is \$25.890, while the average cost for one year at a four-year private college is \$52,500. Many private colleges cost substantially more.

Though no one can predict exactly what college might cost in 5, 10, or 15 years, annual price increases in the range of 3% to 6% would certainly be in keeping with historical trends.

This chart can give you an idea of what future costs might be. based on the most recent cost data and an average annual college inflation rate of 5%. (Source: College Board, Trends in College Pricing 2018)

College savings options

You're ready to start saving, but where should you put your money? It's smart to consider tax-advantaged strategies whenever possible. Here are some options.

529 plans

529 plans are one of the most popular tax-advantaged college savings options. Contributions accumulate tax deferred and withdrawals are tax free at the federal level if the money is used for qualified education expenses. States may also offer their own tax advantages. (For withdrawals not used for qualified expenses, earnings are subject to income tax and a 10% federal penalty.) 529 plans are open to anyone and lifetime contribution limits are high, typically \$350,000 and up (limits vary by state). In 2019, lump sum gifting up to \$75,000 is allowed (\$150,000 for joint gifts) with no gift tax implications if certain requirements are met.

There are two types of 529 plans: savings plans and prepaid tuition plans. A 529 savings plan is an individual investment merit. To determine financial need, the federal government account similar to a 401(k) plan where you direct your contributions to one or more of the plan's investment portfolios. Funds in the account can be used to pay tuition, fees, room and board, books, and supplies at any accredited college in the United States or abroad. Funds can also be used to pay K-12 tuition expenses, up to \$10,000 per year. By contrast, the less common 529 prepaid tuition plan allows you to purchase college tuition credits at today's prices for use in the future at a limited group of colleges that participate in the plan, typically



A Coverdell education savings account (ESA) is a taxadvantaged education savings vehicle that lets you contribute up to \$2,000 per year for a beneficiary's K-12 or college expenses. Your contributions grow tax deferred and earnings are tax free at the federal level if the money is used for qualified education expenses. You have complete control over the investments you hold in the account, but there are income restrictions on who can participate, and the \$2,000 annual contribution limit isn't likely to put much of a dent in college expenses.

Custodial account (UTMA/UGMA)

A custodial account allows a minor to hold investment assets in his or her own name with an adult as custodian. All contributions to the account are irrevocable gifts to your child, and assets in the account can be used to pay for college. When your child turns 18 or 21 (depending on state law), he or she will gain control of the account. Earnings and capital gains generated by the account are taxed to your child each year under the "kiddie tax" rules. Under the kiddie tax rules, a child's unearned income over a certain threshold (\$2,200 in 2019) is taxed using the trust and estate tax rates.

Roth IRA

Though technically not a college savings option, some parents use Roth IRAs to save and pay for college. Contributions to a Roth IRA can be withdrawn at any time and are always tax free. For parents age 59 1/2 and older, a withdrawal of earnings is also tax free if the account has been open for at least five years. For parents younger than 59 1/2, a withdrawal of earnings -□typically subject to income tax and a 10% premature distribution penalty —□is spared the 10% penalty if the withdrawal is used to pay for a child's college expenses.

A final word on financial aid

Many families rely on some form of financial aid to pay for college, which may include loans, grants, scholarships, and work-study. Financial aid can be based on financial need or on and colleges look primarily at your family's income, but other factors come into play, including your assets and how many children you'll have in college at the same time.

To get an idea of how much aid your child might be eligible for at a particular college, you can use a net price calculator, which is available on every college website. The bottom line, though, is to beware of too much borrowing. Excessive student loan debt —□and parent debt —□can negatively affect borrowers for years. The lesson? The more you save now, the less you and your child will need to fund later.

Leave cleanup will begin in Rice **Township**

It's that time of year when Mountain Top residents are faced with cleaning up and disposing of leaves.

In Rice Township, the annual leaf drop off will begin on Monday, October 14 and conclude on Friday, November 15. Pipech said residents can drop off leaves near the dumpster by the municipal building. Leaves must be in paper, compostable bags. Branches cut to a length of no more than three feet and no more than one inch in diameter may be left. Supervisors noted cameras record the area.

The Mountain Top Council of Governments composting facility in the Crestwood Industrial Park is open on Wednesdays and Saturdays for residents of Wright and Fairview Townships. Permits are required.

Voting places change in Mountain Top

Changes in voting districts made by Luzerne County Election Bureau will mean a change in polling places for some Mountain Top voters.

Fairview and Rice Townships will go from "at large" townships to having two voting districts while Wright Township will go from two to four districts.

In recent years, voters in Wright Township's two voting districts cast their ballots at the township municipal building. That will change for the November 6 general election. Voters in Wright Township's districts one and two will now vote at Wright Township Fire Department, 477 S. Main Road.

Voters in the township's third and fourth districts will vote at Mountain Top Family Church, 209 S. Mountain Boulevard.

In Fairview Township voters in district one will continue to vote at Mountain Top Hose Co. No. 1. 14 Woodlawn Avenue. Voters in district two will vote at the township's municipal building, 65 Shady Tree Drive.

Over in Rice Township, which also has been split into two districts, voters will no longer cast ballots at the municipal building. Voters in district one will vote at Cornerstone Christian Fellowship Church, 3577 Church Road (near Rice Elementary). Voters in district two will vote at American Legion Mountain Post 781, 1550 Henry Drive.

Election bureau officials relate that all voters will be receiving a new voter registration card with their polling place information regardless if they have been changed. Anyone who has any questions as to where they should be voting can check on the following link: https://www.pavoterservices.pa.gov/Pages/PollingPlaceInfo.aspx or call the election bureau at 570-825-1715.



Residents voice opposition to municipal stormwater sewer permits

At every meeting of the Fairview Township supervisors, there is a report on the status of the township's municipal stormwater sewer system (MS4) permit and an opportunity for citizens to comment on the project.

While township secretary/ treasurer Barbara Wasiakowski often reports on the status of the permit work, rarely is there any public comment, unless township business owner Gary Tredinnick is present.

Fairview Township is in its second five-year MS4 permit, a process that resulted from requirements of the Clean Water Act. The law dates to the Nixon administration, but it has only been in recent years that northeastern Pennsylvania residents have paid it

much attention.

That's because U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) which is responsible for enforcing the law, instituted its Chesapeake Bay plan which requires states to reduce the amount of nutrients and sediment in waterways that feed into the bay.

In response, the state Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) is requiring all municipalities that drain water into the Susquehanna River basin to submit stormwater permit plans showing how they will reduce sediment 10 percent, phosphorus by 5 percent and nitrogen by 3 percent over the next five years.

The MS4 program requires permit-holders to complete a pollution reduction plan that will reduce the amount of

sediments, phosphorous and nitrogen in stormwater runoff. Municipalities face fines if they don't comply with the requirements, which include detailed maps of all stormwater systems and annual progress reports.

For more than 30 Wyoming Valley municipalities, the

requirements of the MS4 permit process are handled by the Wyoming Valley Sanitary Authority (WVSA) at an annual cost of \$8 million. To meet that expense, property owners in those municipalities have been assessed a stormwater fee. That fee, which can be substantial, has sparked outrage in many valley communities.

In Mountain Top, only one municipality – Fairview Township – has an MS4 and the community so far has handled the work and costs without any additional burden to taxpayers.

So, far, and that's what concerns Tredinnick. Describing the process as an unfunded federal mandate, Tredinnick, who owns a business in Fairview Township, has repeatedly

encouraged Fairview Township officials to send letters of protest to county, state and federal officials. He has made the same request to officials of Wright Township where he resides.

While officials of those municipalities share his feelings about the unfunded mandate, neither community has penned a letter in opposition to the requirements.

At the September meeting of Fairview Township supervisors, Tredinnick told officials he is concerned about the amount of money being spent by local communities to meet MS4 requirements. He asked them to go on record in opposition to the requirements. At that meeting, he was joined by township resident Jeff Betashick who

expressed his concerns about the MS4 permit process and asked township officials to take a stand against it.

Supervisor Robert Orloski told Tredinnick legislators have promised they are going to look into a solution, but there has not been much movement. "I don't think it's appropriate yet to announce our opposition," Orloski stated.

Orloski said the township has reluctantly done what it must do to stay compliant. "We do what we have to do without going overboard so it doesn't affect the taxpayers of Fairview Township," Orloski stated. "We are proactive. We did the right thing," Orloski said of the township's MS4 permit process. "Other dragged their feet. We chose not to."

Supervisor Michael Iorio said he feels state and federal legislators are afraid to touch the issue. He pointed out that he has attended meetings of the Mountain Top Area Joint Sanitary Authority whose members have not indicated an inclination to take on the permit process as has WVSA.

Iorio went further to describe the fees as illegal. "It's an unfunded mandate. They are calling it a fee," Iorio stated.

Meanwhile, Wright Township supervisors are following through on a recommendation from its Environmental Advocacy Council (EAC) to seek a waiver of an MS4 permit.

Supervisors voted at their June meeting to hire LVIC Civil engineers, Selinsgrove, to prepare an MS4 waiver application at a cost of \$2,950. That waiver application has been submitted to DEP.

Supervisors voted at their April meeting to table action on a proposed pollution reduction

plan prepared by Borton-Lawson Engineering. The action came after the board reviewed the extensive comments on the plan from the township's Environmental Advocacy Committee (EAC) which suggested the township investigate seeking a waiver from the state Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). The township's proposed five-year pollution reduction plan to meet federal Clean Water Act requirements would cost the township more than \$1 million to implement, money the township does not

Over the last few months, Tredinnick also has encouraged Wright Township supervisors to move forward with seeking the appeal, as well as putting county, state and federal officials on notice of their opposition to the unfunded mandate imposed on munici-

palities by the Clean Water Act.

"This is an unfunded mandate," Tredinnick has told supervisors. "I hope the township will not continue to spend money on this." He urged officials to contact Congressman Daniel Meuser and state Rep. Aaron Kaufer who have taken positions opposing the requirements of the act. Supervisor Matthew Howton told Tredinnick he "has been completely opposed to this from day one." He noted that all work the township has done so far has been done in-house.

Rep. Meuser recently reported that he met with Cosmo Servidio, EPA Regional Administrator and other EPA officials regarding MS4 and stormwater management in Pennsylvania. "I expressed the deep concerns and grievances from

the people of the Ninth District and how inequitable this stormwater situation seems to be all over the state and basin. This initiative must be transparent and equitable before constituents are asked to pay a fee," Meuser stated in a press release. "We asked that the EPA reevaluate the current guidelines, review the costs being required by municipalities to achieve compliance, and work to find a way to act environmentally consciously while also not being financially burdensome to the people."

In an interview about the MS4 permit issue, Tredinnick repeated his concerns about the unfunded mandate. "The government plays too many roles in our lives," he commented. "It's time to stop big government spending and excessive regulations," he offered. "At some point this is going to impact everyone," he

predicted.

He noted that municipal leaders have expressed their concerns about federal fines if they do not comply with the mandate. "It everyone stands together, the fines will go away," he predicted.

Tredinnick suggested residents educate themselves about the MS4 permit process; go to their local government meetings to voice their opposition; join with others who have opposed the mandate; and for municipal leaders to go

on record in opposition to the permit process.

Meanwhile, Rice Township has successfully obtained a waiver of the five-year MS4 permit. Whether the township will be able to secure a second waiver remains to be seen.

Nuangola Borough has filed an application for a waiver of the MS4 permit requirement. Borough officials contend the majority, if not all, of the municipality's stormwater runoff ends up in Nuangola Lake or the surrounding

wetlands, which constitutes "best management practice." The borough contends this is a best management practice any contaminated water settles through the lake or wetlands and only the filtered water gets to a stream, unlike stormwater runoff that dumps directly into a stream, like the Little Wapwallopen or Big Wapwallopen Creeks.

Officials of Dorrance and Slocum Townships indicated they have no requirements under the MS4 permit process.

Several residents of Wilderness Drive complained about the condition of the road at the September meeting of township supervisors.

Supervisor Bob Pipech acknowledged there is a section of the road that is in bad shape and discussed the problems with the project. He said township secretary/treasurer Jeff Beck spoke with the company's regional manager several times to let the firm know that supervisors want to work with Atlantic Broadband to keep costs down and to make sure the contractor complies with the township's road cut ordinance.

Pipech pointed out that if Atlantic Broadband had reached out to the township early in the process problems could have been avoided. He pointed to work being planned at Laurel Lakes by Verizon which has been in regular contact with supervisors. Supervisor Rick Arnold said he felt the cable provider's subcontractor created the problem with shoddy work.

Supervisors also heard comments about the tar and chip work on Henry Drive. The township hired Pocono Spray to apply the tar and chips to Henry Drive and Prospect Road. Resident Karl Kaminski complained the road is bumpy and feared the work will not hold up. Arnold assured residents that while the road may

be bumpy, supervisors are confident the surface will wear well.

Supervisors voted to hire Chemung Supply to install a guide rail on the south side of Wevhenmeyer Road bridge and along the west side of Henry Drive across from the lower Ice Lake culvert at a total cost of \$2.925.

Rice supervisors give conditional approval to Dollar General

Rice Township supervisors

at a special meeting on September 17 gave conditional approval to the first step in what could mean the construction of a Dollar General Store along Nuangola Road near the

Nuangola exit of Interstate 81.

The proposed developer of the discount store, Mountain Top/Nuangola DG, LLC, asked the supervisors to grant a conditional use for the project which is located in a B-2 (commercial zone). The property is

owned by David Coleman.

While the business is a permitted use in the B-2 zone, the conditional use approval is required because the township Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance (SALDO), requires that any land disturbance exceeding 80,000 square feet and any building/impervious area exceeding 20,000 square feet obtain

Supervisors granted the conditional use approval but denied a request by the developer to waive requirement for an environmental impact study. Rather, supervisors set as a condition of their approval

the requirement the developer present a complete environmental impact study to the township planning commission as part of its land development plan presentation.

Additional conditions included are that the developer comply with all land development requirements, obtain

any necessary variances and required subdivision approval.

Prior to the hearing, township solicitor Jack Dean emphasized the session was not a land development proceeding. That step will be conducted by the township planning commission at a future date.

About 20 people attended the hearing, including Nuangola Borough Council member Joseph Tucker and several other borough residents.

Justin Ross of LIVIC Civil, the engineering firm representing the developer, told supervisors the land disturbance will total approximately 87,000 square feet. While the building itself will be only 9,300 square feet, he said a bulk of the land disturbance will be for detention basins to handle stormwater

runoff. He noted the state Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) and Luzerne County Conservation District have strict rules for stormwater management.

He described plans for ingress and egress off Nuangola Road. He also said current plans call for an on-site sewage disposal system. He said if the developer is able to connect with a public sewer system,

it will

Ross said the parcel is six acres and Coleman will submit a subdivision proposal for a 2.4 acres lot for the Dollar General project. He also said the developer will request a waiver from the zoning hearing board to reduce the number of parking places from the required 46 to 30. He said the request will be based on minimizing stormwater runoff.



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
