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# Nine Yurkanin brothers served in the United States military

Veteran's Day means a lot to Andrew Yurkanin. And for good reason.

The Mountain Top resident is one of nine brothers who served in the United States military.

The 94-year-old Army veteran served in World War II along with five of his brothers. Three younger siblings, Patrick, August and Thomas joined the military shortly after the end of the war and served during the Korean Conflict era.

Born in the small town of Treskow just south of Hazleton in Carbon County, Yurkanin

was one of 15 children – nine boys and six girls. "Large families were not uncommon in

those days," said the veteran, recalling his youth. "We weren't even the largest in town," he quipped.

By the time he started high school at West Hazleton in the early 1940s, his four older brothers, John, George, Joseph and Frank, already had been drafted and were serving in the U. S. Army. With his brothers away in the service Yurkanin left school in his junior year at age 17 to work in a knitting mill. Though he was working to help support the large family, there was little doubt what Andrew would do when he turned 18. Rather than wait to be drafted, he enlisted in the Army Air Corps in 1943. A younger brother Michael followed him into the military a short time later.

Yurkanin entered pilot training, but never got to fly planes in the war. He was injured in training and was unable to serve overseas. As a result, he was assigned to the Air Corps training command, working with bomber groups until his discharge in April of 1946.

Meanwhile, John, George, Joseph, Frank and Michael all

fortunately only Joseph was injured, sustaining wounds from shrapnel.

"At that age, you think you are immortal," Yurkanin commented. "You never think about being killed." While all his brothers survived World War II, he did have some friends who lost their lives.

It is estimated 16 million men and women fought in World War II. Yurkanin is one of only about 500,000 veterans of the "Great War" who are still alive. His brother Tom is still alive, along with two sisters.

His three younger brothers, Patrick, Tom and August, enlisted in the military, but did

not serve during World War II. "At one time, all nine of us were in the service," Yurkanin noted proudly. Besides his brothers, two of Yurkanin's grandsons also have served in the military.

Following his discharge, Yurkanin earned his high school diploma and then enrolled at the University of Scranton. He received a bachelor's degree from the University of Scranton and then matriculated to Columbia University where he earned a master's degree in clinical social work. After finishing his education, Yurkanin worked for a few years for the Veterans Administration and later Luzerne County Child Welfare Bureau. He left social services in 1963 when he started the first Mountain Top newspaper called the Mountain View, it was eventually sold and Andy maintained a commercial printing business with the same name.

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# 403(b) Plans

A 403(b) plan is an employer-sponsored retirement plan for certain employees of public schools, tax-exempt [501(c)(3)] organizations, and churches. The employer can purchase annuity contracts for eligible employees, or establish custodial accounts to be invested in mutual funds or other investments. In the case of annuity contracts, a 403(b) plan is sometimes referred to as a tax-sheltered annuity (TSA) plan. (Church plans are subject to several special rules not covered here.)

#### How does a 403(b) plan work?

Depending on the specific type of 403(b) plan, contributions may be made by the employee, the employer, or both the employee and employer. Many 403(b) plans are similar to 401(k) plans: you elect either to receive cash payments (wages) from your employer immediately, or to defer receipt of all or part of that income to your 403(b) account. The amount you defer (called an "elective deferral") can be either pre-tax or, if your plan permits, after-tax Roth contributions.

Employer contributions, if made, may be a fixed percentage of your compensation, or may match a specified percentage of your contribution, or may be discretionary on the part of the employer. One unique characteristic of 403(b) plans is that your employer is allowed to make contributions to your account for up to five years after you terminate employment.

#### Who can participate?

In general, if any employee is eligible to make elective deferrals, then all employees must be allowed to do so. This is called the "universal availability rule." However, your employer can exclude certain groups of employees from participation (for example, employees who normally work less than 20 hours per week, or who are eligible under another deferral plan - for example, a 401(k) plan - of the employer). Your employer may also require that you attain age 21 and/or complete up to two years of service before you're eligible for employer contributions.

Some 403(b) plans provide for automatic enrollment once vou've satisfied the plan's eligibility requirements. For example, the plan might provide that you'll be automatically enrolled at a 3% pre-tax contribution rate (or some other percentage) unless you elect a different deferral percentage, or choose not to participate at all. If you've been automatically enrolled in your 403(b) plan, make sure that your assigned contribution rate and investments are appropriate for your circumstances.

#### What are the contribution limits?

You can defer up to \$19,000 of your pay to a 403(b) plan in 2019. If your plan allows Roth contributions, you can split your contribution between pre-tax and Roth contributions any way you wish. Unlike 401(k) plans, employee elective deferrals to 403(b) plans aren't subject even if they match your Roth contributions. That is, your employer's to discrimination testing (which in 401(k) plans can often significantly limit the amount higher-paid employees can defer).

If your plan permits, you may also be able to make "catch-up" contributions to your account. You can contribute up to an additional \$6,000 in 2019 if you'll be age 50 or older by the end of the year. If you to a 10% early distribution penalty, unless an exception applies.

have 15 years of service with your employer (even if you haven't attained age 50) a special Section 403(b) rule may also allow you to make annual catch-up contributions of \$3,000, up to \$15,000 lifetime. If you're eligible for both rules, then any catch-up contributions you make count first against your 15-year \$15,000 lifetime limit.

If you also contribute to a 401(k), 403(b), SIMPLE, or SARSEP plan maintained by the same or a different employer, then your total elective deferrals to all of these plans - both pre-tax and Roth can't exceed \$19,000 in 2019, plus catch-up contributions. It's up to you to make sure you don't exceed the limits if you contribute to plans of more than one employer. Total contributions to your 403(b) account

both yours and your employer's - can't exceed \$56,000 in 2019 (or 100% of your compensation, if less). Age 50 catch-up contributions are not included in this limit, but special Section 403(b) catch-up contributions are. (Aggregation rules may apply if you also participate in a qualified retirement plan.)

#### Can I also contribute to an IRA?

Your participation in a 403(b) plan has no impact on your ability to contribute to an IRA. You can contribute up to \$6,000 to an IRA in 2019, \$7,000 if you'll be age 50 or older by the end of the year (or, if less, 100% of your taxable compensation). However, depending on your income level, your ability to make deductible contributions to a traditional IRA may be limited if you contribute to a 403(b) plan. (Your income level and tax filing status may also impact your ability to contribute to a Roth IRA.)1

#### Income tax considerations

When you make pre-tax 403(b) contributions, you don't pay current income taxes on those dollars (which means more take-home pay compared to an after-tax contribution of the same amount). But your contributions and investment earnings are fully taxable when you receive a distribution from the plan.

In contrast, your after-tax Roth 403(b) contributions are subject to income taxes up front, but are tax free when distributed to you from the plan. And, if your distribution is qualified, then any earnings are also tax free

In general, a distribution from your Roth 403(b) account is gualified only if it's made after the end of a five-year waiting period, and the payment is made after you turn 59 1/2, become disabled, or die.

If your distribution is nonqualified, then you're deemed to receive a pro-rata portion of your tax-free Roth contributions and your taxable earnings.

Your employer's contributions are always made on a pre-tax basis, contributions, and any investment earnings on those contributions, are always taxable to you when you receive a distribution from the plan.

If you receive a payment from your 403(b) account before you turn 59 1/2 (50 or 55 in certain cases), the taxable portion may also be subject

#### When can I access my money?

In general, you can't withdraw your elective deferrals from your 403(b) until you reach age 59 1/2, become disabled, or terminate employment (deferrals to annuity contracts prior to 1989 aren't subject to these restrictions). Some plans allow you to make a withdrawal if you have an immediate and heavy financial need ("hardship"), but this should be a last resort. Your withdrawal will be subject to regular income taxes and a possible 10% penalty tax. If vour plan allows after-tax (non-Roth) contributions, your plan can let you withdraw these dollars at any time.

Employer contributions to 403(b) custodial accounts are subject to similar withdrawal restrictions. But employer contributions and pre-1989 deferrals to 403(b) annuity contracts are subject to somewhat more lenient distribution rules. Check with your plan administrator for your plan's specific rules.

If your plan permits loans, you may be able to borrow up to one-half of your vested 403(b) account balance (to a maximum of \$50,000) if you need the money.

#### What happens when I terminate

#### employment?

Generally, you forfeit all employer contributions that haven't vested. "Vesting" means that you own the contributions. Your plan may require up to six years of service before you're fully vested in employer contributions, although some plans have much faster vesting schedules. (Your own contributions are always 100% vested.) You can generally leave your money in your 403(b) account, transfer it to a new 403(b) account, roll your dollars over to an IRA or to another employer's retirement plan, or take a distribution.2

#### What else do I need to know?

- You must begin taking distributions ("required minimum distributions," or RMDs) from your 403(b) account after you reach age 70 1/2 (or after you terminate employment, if later). (The RMD rules don't apply to contributions made prior to 1987.)
- · If your employer offers 403(b)s from various vendors, you may be able to transfer your assets from one contract to another while you're still employed. This can be helpful if you're dissatisfied with a particular vendor's investment offerings.
- · Your 403(b) account is fully protected from creditors under federal law in the event of your bankruptcy. If your plan is covered by ERISA, then your account is generally protected from all of your creditors' claims.

### **Cost of recycling**

nearly doubles The cost of disposing of recyclable materials has nearly doubled this year for Dorrance Township.

Supervisors learned at their October meeting that Northeast Cartage increased the cost to haul recycling to \$155 per dumpster.

The hike was the second this year. The township began the year paying \$80 per dumpster. Northeast Cartage increased the rate to \$120 in May and to \$155 September 1.

#### **Hearing on PRD** scheduled

The proposed Preserve at Blue Ridge Trail planned residential development (PRD) in Dorrance Township is scheduled for a hearing on November 4 in Luzerne County Court.

Township solicitor Donald Karpowich told supervisors at their October meeting that a senior judge will be assigned to hear arguments. The township's insurance carrier will provide an attorney to handle the case.

Supervisors denied approval of the proposed PRD on December 10, 2018 following nearly two years of hearings and meetings on the project. The township planning commission had recommended the proposal be denied.

The developer, TFP Limited, wants to construct the PRD near the Blue Ridge Trail Golf Course. The area for which the PRD is planned is zoned conservation. A PRD is a permitted use in that district, however the developer needed to obtain conditional use approval from the township.

The township planning commission cited several deficiencies in the plan in their recommendation to supervisors. They included issues with the storm water management plan; boundaries do not clearly define the golf course; lack of evidence the developer has permission to cross the state right-of-way to connect to the sewer system; and the water source is not offsite.

The developer appealed the township's decision to Luzerne County court.

#### In other business ...

Supervisors accepted the resignation of Duane Seltzer from the township road department. Seltzer will retire on November 15. Supervisor Kevin Gallagher, township roadmaster, praised Seltzer for his work for the township, describing him as an asset to the road department. Supervisors hired Christopher Anthony as a road department employee effective October 21. His starting salary will be \$17 per hour. Gallagher also commended the road department for its work on the pipe installation on Eroh Road and laying asphalt where it was needed.

Supervisors voted to advertise for bids for a CPA to perform the 2019 audit in place of auditors.

The next supervisors regular meeting will be held on Tuesday, November 12, at 7 p.m. due to the Veteran's Day holiday.

#### **Cable installation** continues to cause concerns

The Atlantic Broadband cable installation project in Wilderness Estates continues to cause concern among residents of the Rice Township development.

The company began instal-

lation of cable to provide high speed internet service over the summer. Supervisors reported at their September meeting that the project was begun without the knowledge of township officials and without a permit. At the October meeting, residents report the project has stalled, leaving Wilderness Drive in need of repairs. The utility has installed cable on a section of Wilderness Drive but has not completed the installation.

Responding to an inquiry, township secretary/treasurer Jeff Beck said grant money is not available to be used to pay expenses incurred by a for-profit company.

Supervisors did vote to repair a section Wilderness Drive by Sealmasters at a cost of \$3,100.

The work was done on a section of the road that had deteriorated and was not connected with the Atlantic Broadband project.

#### In other business ...

Township engineer Andrew Pasonick reported net posts at the pickleball court were set and Smith's Blacktopping is scheduled to pave the courts. Pipech discussed work on the pickleball court performed by the public works crew. He said once the courts are paved the asphalt will be allowed to cure the winter and painting will be done in the spring. He said the fence and lighting can be installed during the fall-winter timeframe.

Pasonick reported that he was working on bids for the demoli-

### Changes listed for township meetings

The General Election and Veteran's Day have caused changes in meeting dates for some municipalities. Fairview Township supervisors will meet Wednesday, November 6 at 7:30 p.m. instead of Tuesday. The change is necessary because the municipal building is now one of two polling places in the township.

Rice Township supervisors have moved their meeting back to Tuesday, November 5 at 7 p.m. The meeting was originally scheduled for Wednesday, November 6, but because the township's polling place was moved from the municipal building, there was no need to change the date.

Because of Veteran's Day, both Dorrance and Wright Townships have moved their meeting date to Tuesday, November 12 at 7 p.m.

### Wright Township seeking grant

Wright Township is seeking a PennDOT grant for multi-modal roadway improvement grant to make improvements to township roads. Officials voted last month to apply for a grant not to exceed \$700,000. Township secretary/treasurer Pamela Heard explained the grant could be used for road improvements if signs for pedestrian and bicycle use are included.

### Wright Township leaf collection changes

Wright Township will be collecting leaves this fall, but it will be up to residents to put the leaves in bags for pickup. In previous years, township crews collected leaves that were raked to the edge of the road using a vacuum machine. Because of mechanical problems the machine it is not available this year.

Supervisors said residents who want the township to pick up their leaves should put them in biodegradable paper bags and place them at the edge of the right-of-way. They emphasized plastic bags will not be collected and there is a weight limit of 60 pounds per bag. Paper bags, officials noted, are available at most hardware and home improvement stores.

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#### Controversy continues over dirt bike track

The Luzerne County Common Pleas Court has ruled in favor of Wright Township in an ongoing controversy over the operation of a dirt bike track in a rural area of the township.

Township solicitor Jack Dean reported at the October 14 meeting of township supervisors that Judge Fred Pierantoni determined the township's zoning hearing board made an error in its decision regarding the case. The judge sent the matter back to the zoning hearing board.

The controversy began in the summer of 2016 when former township zoning officer Andrew Holter sent Mick and Melissa Gentilesco a violation letter for operating a private recreational facility on their property. The letter was sent after Holter received complaints from neighbors about noise and dirt pollution emitting from a dirt bike/ATV track on the Gentliesco's property.

The zoning board originally

advertised that it would hold a hearing on April 9, 2018 on an application by the Gentilescos for a special exception to operate a private recreational facility on their property located in a conservation zoning district. However, the hearing never took place.

At that session, attorney Mark McNelis, representing the Gentilescos, took the position that the

hearing was not about an application for special exception, but rather an appeal of the zoning officer's letter. He claimed they had appealed the zoning officer's violation letter and were entitled to a hearing. He insisted the township had the burden of proving the violation, rather than his client presenting the case for a special exception.

The zoning hearing board decided the Gentilescos were entitled to an appeal of the zoning officer's violation letter. The board held hearings and voted 3-0 on July 17, 2018 to dismiss a notice of violation letter issued by Holter. The board decided the track, located on Yeager Road, does not constitute a private recreational facility, which would be a violation of the township's zoning ordinance.

The township subsequently voted to appeal its zoning board decision.

Dean explained that the court's decision means it will be up to the Gentilescos to file an application for a special exception to use their property as a private recreational facility. In that case, Dean emphasized, it will be up to the applicant to prove their case to the board to grant the special exception.

#### WTVFD asks township to consider fire tax

Wright Township Volunteer Fire Company has asked township supervisors to consider enacting a fire tax to help fund its operations and implementation of part-time paid firefighters.

In making their case for paid part-time staff and the fire tax, at the supervisors October 14 work session, fire department officials outlined the problems the volunteer organization faces.

They told supervisors there has been a significant decline in volunteers coupled with an increased demand for services. The department, they reported, responded to over 400 calls for service in 2018, the most in its history.

Besides the increased demand for services, the department faces an increased demand for community involvement; organizing and implementing fund drives; maintenance of its building and equipment; and administrative functions. They pointed out the annual fund drive requires significant manhours with just a 30 percent return averaging about \$35,000 annually. They noted the department's annual bazaar also requires numerous manhours.

The department officials outlined for supervisors the ongoing efforts to attract volunteers and the various strategies they have tried. "Efforts to retain and recruit volunteers is falling short," they stated. One barrier to recruiting new volunteers is the lengthy and rigorous training required by the state.

In order to meet the demand of providing fire service to Wright Township, the department is proposing the implementation of part-time paid firefighters beginning in the first quarter of 2020. Their plan is to staff the department with one firefighter on duty 12 hours a day, seven days a week in 2020.

Beginning in 2021, the staffing would change to 24-hour coverage seven days a week

with two paid, part-time firefighters. The paid part-time staff would be supplemented with volunteers. Fire Chief Dave Pettit noted many departments in the area, including Hanover Township and Hazleton City, use this model effectively.

Fire department officials estimate the annual cost for 2020 would be approximately \$230,000, plus the cost of

insurance. For 2021, the cost to operate the department with two paid part-time firefighters would be approximately \$428,000. Currently, the township donates approximately \$100,000 annually.

To pay for the part-time paid firefighters and fund the department's operations, the department proposed a fire tax. In order to cover all the department's operational costs and provide full coverage 24 hours

a day, seven days a week, they estimated a fire tax of 1. to 1.1. mils would be required. That tax, they said, would cost each household an estimated \$146 to \$161 annually.

"We're not here to make money. We're here to provide services," Fire Chief Dave Pettit told supervisors.

The fire tax, fire department officials stated, would provide numerous benefits to the community. Among those listed by the firefighters, are improved public safety, better response times with a fully staffed departance costs for residents; more time for firefighters to focus on training.

Pettit, in an email following the meeting, emphasized that the 1 or 1.1 mil fire tax is department officials' best estimate. based on information available. He said that tax would generate enough revenue to fund the department, in their projections, for a foreseeable 20-year period, assuming most things do not change drastically besides normal cost increases.

"We are not in a bad spot as it stands, however the future is not looking favorable for volunteers and fundraising," he noted. "Also, costs continue to rise, and we do not want to be at the point where it is not recoverable and too drastic."

The fire chief noted the proposed part-time paid firefighters plan has come up before. "This is not new to them (supervisors)," he stated in his email. "We have been asking for many, many years for consideration of part-time staff and ways to generate funds but it is normally set aside. The volunteer service is in a bind and will not get any better moving forward without plans. That is the main reason we decided to move forward with this."

While supervisors did not respond to the proposal, they did complement the department officials for their comprehensive presentation. The supervisors will hold budget planning meetings on November 4 and 18.

Fairview Township, at the request of Mountain Top Hose Co. No. 1, enacted a .0003 mil fire tax to support the department's operation. The fire department, which utilizes all volunteers, received \$111,801 in 2018 from the fire tax revenue.
