

South Main Road houses its very own Christmas Land

The sign in front of 257 S. Main Road in Wright Township reads "Christmas Land."

That's certainly not an exaggeration.

Driving by the home located just a short distance north of Nuangola Road, motorists often slow down to catch a better view of the scores of lighted Christmas decorations that cover the front and side yard of the home.

And that's just the outside. Inside are many more decorations including Christmas village buildings from around the world and a working American Flyer model train that is 71 years old.

The home, inside and out, is decorated each year by its owner John Glawe and 18-year-old Crestwood High School senior Austin Douglas

who refers to Glawe as "Uncle Doug."

Douglas, a former neighbor and a friend of Glawe, began decorating the home a few

years ago. "Uncle Doug doesn't explained. have any children, so I thought it would be nice to decorate his property to bring him some Christmas cheer," Douglas

"It takes me back to when I was a kid," Glawe said of the decorations. "My dad would

The display includes a life-size sleigh loaded with lighted gifts, Santa, snowmen and numerous blow-up figures, including Santa's reindeer and wooden soldiers.

"I don't have any kids, so Austin comes over and does all this." he said.

Dorrance Township approves budget

Dorrance Township supervisors approved the township's 2020 budget at their December 9 meeting.

The general fund budget calls for revenue and expenses totaling \$662,583. There will not be a tax increase for 2020. The property tax rate will remain at .75 mills.

Supervisors voted to enter into an online auction contract with Auctions International, Inc. for the sale of a 1986 Trail King trailer and a hopper spreader side tanks. The auction runs until December 31. Bids will be accepted or denied at the January 6 meeting.

Tax Collector Beverly Lukashewski informed supervisors she will be resigning at the beginning of the year due to

moving out of the township in 2020. She has two years left on her term. Kelly Haffner is deputy tax collector. Supervisors will need to appoint someone to complete the term.

Wright Township residents will see an increase in property taxes in 2020

Wright Township supervisors approved the township's \$2,495,924 budget for 2020 at a special meeting on December 19 and voted to raise property taxes for the first time in 10 years. The increase includes a .2 mill fire tax and an additional .0484 mill increase in the general fund property tax for a total increase of .2484 mills. Township property owners will pay 1 mill taxes in

2020. Supervisors Louis Welebob Jr. and Donald Zampetti voted against the budget and the tax hike.

The combined tax hike will mean a property tax increase next year of \$24.84 for every \$100,000 of assessed valuation. The 1 mil total tax rate means a home assessed at \$100,000 would pay a total of \$100 in property taxes in 2020.

Leaders of the township's volunteer fire department attended the special meeting and raised concerns about the impact of the fire tax on their ability to raise additional funds through fundraisers and donations.

"Why are you enacting a .2 mill fire tax?" fire chief Dave Pettit asked supervisors following their vote. "Our donation base is going to go to zero," he predicted. "What are we going

the cold!

to do when we lose our donation base?" he asked.

"This is probably going to kill our bazaar," Pettit predicted. "This is probably going to be the last one," he added.

Pettit told supervisors residents simply are not likely to make donations on top of the fire tax. "Nobody goes to the county or the school board and says, 'here's a \$50 or \$100 donation'," Pettit offered.

The .2 mill fire tax is expected to generate \$109,362 revenue in 2020, all of which will go directly to the fire department. The tax is intended to take the place of the township's annual contribution to the fire department which is approximately \$100,000. The 2020 budget calls for the township to also pay \$38,000 for fire hydrant costs and \$21,467 workman's compensation insurance, both required by law.

At the supervisors' October work session, fire department leaders asked them to consider

enacting the fire tax. However, the firefighters were seeking a higher tax that would allow the department to implement part-time paid firefighters beginning in the first quarter of 2020. Their plan is to staff the department with one firefighter on duty 12 hours a day, seven days a week in 2020. Beginning in 2021, the staffing would change to 24-hour coverage seven days a week with

two paid, part-time firefighters. The paid part-time staff would be supplemented with volunteers.

In order to cover all the department's operational costs and provide full coverage 24 hours a day, seven days a week, fire department officials estimated a fire tax of 1 mill to 1.1. mills would be required. That tax, they said, would cost each household an estimated \$146 to \$161 annually.

"This is not close to where

we need to be," Pettit said of the .2 mill fire tax.

Zampetti told Pettit the township has been very supportive of the fire department, pointing to the nearly \$100,000 donation in 2019. "We're supporting you the best way we can without killing our residents," he stated. He noted the fire department requested \$250,000 for 2020. "If we went to \$250,000 some of our residents would be losing their homes," Zampetti predicted.

Supervisor Matt Howton, a member of the fire department, pointed out to Pettit the fire tax gives the department a guaranteed income. "That's one of the reasons I voted for it." Howton stated. "It's a first step. It can be reviewed in a year," he added.

"This is a start," said board chairman Michael Marshall. "We had to start somewhere," he said

Township resident Patricia Davis, who is the township secretary/treasurer in nearby Dorrance Township, told supervisors she would not be likely to make an additional donation on top of the fire tax. "Some things I see (in the budget) don't make sense to me at all," she noted. She auestioned the need for a full-time township secretary/treasurer and a fulltime assistant. "I would rather see you give the fire department what they need to put on part-time firefighters 12 hour a day," she offered.

Supervisors also voted at their special meeting to purchase a 2020 Ford Interceptor police vehicle at a cost of \$47,442.83. The purchase will be financed through a loan from Fidelity Bank.





Families and friends also put wreaths on graves of those who gave the ultimate sacrifice.


