


Andrew Barno was recently named Senior Student of the Quarter by the Crestwood Education Association. Andrew has applied to several excellent schools and will major in Engineering.



News in Brief ...

Rice finishes 2019 with surplus funds

Rice Township officials and residents received some good financial news at the board of supervisors first meeting of 2020. The township ended 2019 with an unofficial unexpected surplus of just under \$60,000, according to secretary/treasurer Jeffrey Beck.

Beck reported that while the township's real estate transfer sale tax was about \$26,000 less than anticipated, some other revenues were up and expenses down. He told officials earned income revenue was up by about \$60,000, most likely due to a catch up from 2018. The township realized about \$25,000 in savings in

insurance costs. The result was the approximate \$60,000 surplus.

> Supervisor Rick Arnold thanked Beck for his work on the dental plan saving \$2,000 for the township while increasing benefit coverage for employees.

In other business ...

Engineer Andrew Pasonick reported that work on the pickleball court was on hold due to the weather, and the demolition of the fire hall was awaiting historical commission clearance. Board chairman Bob Pipech asked Pasonick to be ready to advertise for its demolition when the clearances are received.

Supervisors granted final approval for Woodberry Manor

phase 3 as recommended by the planning commission.

COG sticker to be waived for residents 65 and over

Wright Township residents who utilize the Mountain Top Council of Governments (COG) compost facility in the Crestwood Industrial Park will get a break this year. Supervisors voted at their January 13 meeting to waive the \$10 COG sticker fee for township residents age 65 and over. To qualify for the waiver, proof of age and residency will be required. In other business ...

The township received some good financial news from the state Department of Environ-

mental Protection. The agency awarded a \$197,038 grant to the township for purchase of a new leaf vacuum and some security cameras. The township was forced to suspend its leaf collection last fall because its current machine was not operable. Supervisors approved spending up to \$2,000 for repair of the old machine.

Wright Township police department's new police vehicle has arrived. Supervisors voted at their year-end special meeting to purchase a 2020 Ford Interceptor police vehicle at a cost of \$47,442.83.

Supervisors approved the appointment of Gene Haverlak, to the Mountain Top Area Joint Sanitary Authority and Katina Humen to the township's Environmental Advisory Council.

Dorrance to appeal county court ruling

Dorrance Township will appeal a ruling by Luzerne County Court that reversed a decision by the township's board of supervisors denying the application for tentative approval of a planned residential development for The Preserve at Blue Ridge.

Supervisors voted unanimously to appeal the decision following an executive session prior to their January 6 meeting. Judge Kenneth Seamons, specially presiding, issued the



According to statistics provided by the FBI, 106 law enforcement officers were killed in the line of duty in incidents in 2018. Of these, 55 officers died as a result of felonious acts and 51 officers died in accidents. Comprehensive data tables about these incidents and brief narratives describing the fatal attacks are included in the sections of Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted in 2018.

Kotowski says, "Police officers are mothers, fathers, brothers, sisters and so on and \$600 is not worth a life. You can always earn back that money, but you can never get a life back."



ruling on December 12, 2019. Various briefs and oral argument were held on December 5.

The judge ruled the planned residential development could move forward conditioned on approvals of various regulatory agencies. The township's insurance company attorneys will handle the appeal and township solicitor Donald Karpowich will assist.

On August 7, 2018, the Preserve at Blue Ridge, LLC filed an application for approval of its plan to construct a PRD on 451 acres of land in a C-1 (Conservation) district located primarily in Dorrance Township and partially in Rice Township. The firm, headed by Robert Tamburro, wants to build 134 residential units in four phases. Supervisors voted at their

December 10, 2018 meeting to deny the application following public hearings on the tentative plan held on October 1, 2018 and November 12, 2018 and the township's planning commission recommendation that supervisors deny approval.

In other business ...

Dorrance supervisors approved a request from Mountaintop Youth Soccer Association requesting use of the fields for spring and fall seasons. Arrangements will be made to coordinate with fall baseball leagues and lacrosse. Proof of insurance will be provided. The approval will be contingent on trash being properly disposed of and parking in designated areas only.

Crestwood School District receives two grants

The Pennsylvania Department of Education on January 6 awarded the Crestwood, Greater Nanticoke and Hanover Area school districts \$25,000 each in Teacher in the Workplace grants, according to state Rep. Gerald Mullery, D-Luzerne.

The funding will be utilized by teachers to visit local employers to learn skills and business trends to strengthen their classroom instruction and boost student learning and readiness for the workforce. "This funding will allow our hardworking teachers to have direct contact with our local businesses and take that information back to the classroom," Mullery said. "This program educates our educators in the latest in-demand careers and will help today's students be better prepared for tomorrow."

These are part of \$2.2 million in Teacher in the Workforce grants awarded to 92 school districts and education agencies. The grants from PDE are funded through federal money made available through Title II, Part A, of the Every Student Succeeds Act and from the Department of Labor and Industry through the Workforce Innovation and Opportunities Act.

Mullery also announced a \$35,000 PAsmart grant has been awarded to the Crestwood School District.

"Job opportunities in tech

and computer science fields are in high demand to ensure our local, state, and national economies continue to prosper," Mullery said. "I am pleased to see Crestwood recognizing this critical need and taking steps to prepare our students of today for their future tomorrow."

Crestwood School District will use the grant to expand its computer science classes and provide educators from pre-K through grade 12 training to teach those courses.

The new PAsmart targeted grants were awarded to 163 school districts, charter schools and intermediate units across the commonwealth. All of them have prioritized expanding access to computer science for underrepresented students, such as students of color, girls, low-income students and students in rural communities.



tives today in a vote of 139-55, according to Rep. Tarah Toohil (R-Luzerne), who spoke in support of the measure.

Senate Bill 906, sponsored by Sen. John Yudichak (I-14), garnered bipartisan support and now heads back to the Senate for a vote on amendments made by the House.

"Today's vote is a huge victory for the White Haven Center and its residents, some of whom have lived there for 40 or 50 years," said Toohil. "These individuals and their families deserve to have a state center safety net. The intellectually disabled deserve a choice in the type of care and housing they are afforded."

The bill would create the Task Force on the Closure of

State Facilities to analyze and manage the shutdown of any state center and prevents its closure for a minimum of five years.






