UNTIL APRIL 8 FREE TAX PREPARATION ASSISTANCE

The AARP Foundation in cooperation with the Marian Sutherland Library in Mountain Top and the Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Wilkes-Barre will again provide free tax preparation and e-filing of federal, state and local income taxes as well as property tax/rent rebate for area residents. This service is available to all taxpayers with low and moderate incomes with special attention to those aged 60 and over. Taxpayers are not required to belong to AARP to be eligible for this service.

To assure that your tax forms are properly completed, you must bring with you photo ID, Social Security Cards for taxpayer, spouse and all dependents, a copy of your 2018 tax return, your social security statement, all 1099s, W-2 wage statements, interest or dividend statements, and your property tax receipts for 2019, if filing for Property Tax Rebate, and any other tax forms you received for the 2019 tax year. If you are filing a joint return, both taxpayers must be present to complete the return. Appointments are required.

At the Kirby Library, 35 Kirby Avenue in Mountain Top, tax assistance will be available on Wednesdays through April 8. Call 570-696-2935 and leave your name and phone number. You will be contacted to make an appointment. Do not call the library for an appointment.

At the Good Shepherd Church, 190 S. Main Street, Wilkes-Barre, tax assistance will be available on Tuesdays continuing through April 7.

Please call Lynn at 570-690-1418 between the hours of 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. Monday through Friday to make an appointment to have your taxes prepared at the Good Shepherd Church. Do not call the church for an appointment.

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

Wright Township supervisors voted at their January 13 meeting to continue the \$10 fee for Mountain Top Council of Governments (COG) compost site permits and to give any resident 65 or older a permit for free.

That motion, which passed by a 3-2 vote, could wind up costing the township money. That's because the COG governing board voted at its meeting a week later to set the cost for permits to use the facility at \$25.

Wright Township supervisor Louis Welebob Jr. brought up the issue at the board of supervisors February meeting. Welebob believes the COG action means the township is going to have to pay the difference in the cost for all permits it sells for \$10 and the entire \$25 cost for all permits given to seniors for free. He and supervisor Donald Zampetti voted against the January motion by supervisor Michael Marshall which set the fee to be charged by the township. Following a heated argument between Marshall and Zampetti at the supervisors February meeting, it was agreed that solicitor Jack Dean would review the COG's by-laws to determine if the COG governing board sets the fee or if individual townships can set the cost for permits.

The COG is made up of Wright, Fairview and Dorrance Townships. Each township has two members on the governing board. Supervisors Barry Jacob and Fred Rose represent Fairview Township while Marshall and Zampetti represent Wright Township. Dorrance Township is represented by Bill Wengrzynek and Gary Zane but does not participate in the operation of the compost facility. The COG governing board's articles of agreement appear to give the governing board the authority to set the fees.

Article 4, Section J of the articles of agreement state the governing board has the authority "To fix, alter, charge and collect fees, rates and other charges for work, services and publications it provides as it determines, for the purpose of providing for the payment of Mountain Top Area - COG's expenses and to fulfill the terms and provisions of any agreements made with its Members, and to determine the services and improvements

required to provide adequate, safe and reasonable service."

Fairview Township supervisor Michael Iorio agrees with Welebob's take on the issue.

"If Wright (Township) refuses to charge \$25, they are going to be responsible for the difference," Iorio responded when asked about the COG fee. "And they are going to be responsible for the entire cost of the permits they give to seniors for free," he added. Iorio does not represent Fairview Township on the COG board this year but was a member the last few years. He attended the January 20 meeting of the COG at which the permit fee was set.

Iorio pointed out the COG has \$8,400 in its treasury as of the January meeting. He pointed out the machine which grinds yard waste, leaves and small brush into compost, known

as The Beast, is broken. "It will cost \$10,400 just for the part to fix it," Iorio reported. "If we don't have any compost to sell, we won't make any money," he noted. He pointed out the COG's insurance will cost \$2,400 this year. In addition, it must pay for fuel and electricity and water for its new building.

State funding in the amount

of \$362,800 through the School Safety and Security Grant Program has been awarded to six local school districts, state Reps. Gerald Mullery and Eddie Day Pashinski, both D-Luzerne, announced.

Crestwood School District received a grant in the amount of \$40,000.

The funds can be used for a wide variety of programs that address school safety, including risk assessment and violence-prevention efforts, classroom management, conflict resolution or dispute management initiatives, and the installation or purchase of technology related to school and student safety.

Rice Township supervisors last month approved a new Geisinger health plan for township employees that is expected to save the municipality \$24,000 this year. 

The 2020 Census will provide a snapshot of our nation who we are, where we live, and so much more. The results of the 2020 Census will help determine how hundreds of billions of dollars in federal

funding flow into communities every year for the next decade. That funding shapes many different aspects of every community, no matter the size, no matter the location.

Over the next decade, lawmakers, business owners, and many others will use 2020 Census data to make critical decisions. The results will show where communities need new schools. new clinics. new roads, and more services for families, older adults, and children. Every year, billions of dollars in federal funding go to hospitals, fire departments, schools, roads, and other resources based on census data.

The results will also inform how hundreds of billions of dollars in federal funding are allocated to more than 100 programs, including Medicaid, Head Start, block grants for community mental health services, and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, also known as SNAP.

The results of this once-adecade count determine the number of seats each state has in the House of Representatives. They are also used to draw congressional and state legislative districts.



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
