



The distribution by mail will be done from June through September 30, 2020 -- applications received after the deadline date of Wednesday, September 30th will not be accepted.

This year two participants can be included on one application as long as they live at the same address. EACH participant must complete their part of the application and BOTH signatures must be on the application, or it will not be processed. Proxy forms WILL NOT be required this year -- you will be allowed to have someone pick up your fruits and vegetables in your place with the vouchers. It is important that your name and address are printed clearly and legibly in order to expedite the process of sending out the vouchers.

PLEASE NOTE:

- 1) Each qualifying individual is allowed four (4) \$6 vouchers for a total SFMNP benefit of (\$24) <u>ONE TIME</u> per program year.
- 2) A person is not eligible if he/she resides in a nursing home, convent or residential facility where meals are prepared.

Walk-in or drop off applications will not be accepted because of social distancing restrictions.

Once the application is reviewed and approved, the (SFMNP) vouchers and pertinent information will be mailed to the participant. Please allow a few weeks for your application to be processed and for your checks to arrive in the mail.

July 4th festivities cancelled

The Wright Township supervisors voted at their last meeting to cancel the fireworks display the municipality annually sponsors on July 3. Supervisors weighed the pros and cons of holding the fireworks, including the possibility the county would be in the green stage by the end of June. Concerns over following state guidelines for green stage gatherings and the municipality's liability prompted the unanimous vote to cancel the event which draws thousands of spectators to the area. It also was pointed out that Wilkes-Barre City already cancelled its fireworks display.

Besides the cancellation of fireworks, the Mountain Top Area Community Association (MACA), which planned to conduct a parade in Wright Township, has decided that because of the Covid-19 virus it would be too risky to hold the parade. Mountain Top on the Move (MTOTM), previously announced it would not hold a parade, though it is hoping to have a Labor Day event. The two organizations split late last year as a result of a dispute over governance and policy. At one point after the split there were indications both organizations might hold a parade.

works or a parade this year in Mountain Top to celebrate America's Independence Day, the Mountain Top Area Community Association (MACA) is doing its best to make sure residents have the opportunity to express their patriotism.

Because of the Covid-19 pandemic, MACA decided to cancel this year's July 4 parade and festival. "While celebrating patriotism and American independence are at the forefront of everyone's minds this time of year, we must consider the health and safety of the community," MACA officials stated in a press release. They pointed out that though the governor has declared Luzerne County 'green' as of last Friday, the organization feels risks of large gatherings prohibit MACA from putting on the kind of event that Mountain Top has enjoyed in recent years.

However, in keeping with the community spirit of Independence Day, MACA is working with the Crestwood School District and WVIA to allow Mountain Top and surrounding communities to come together on the Fourth of July. Plans are in the works for Crestwood High School's marching band to play some patriotic songs which MACA plans to present to the public via Facebook Live beginning at 11:30 a.m. Then, at noon on July 4, WVIA has agreed to pause its normal broadcast to play the national anthem on 89.9 FM, followed by their own musical selections, according to MACA officials.

The community association invites everyone to tune in to 89.9 FM at noon and sing along to the national anthem and other familiar tunes. "Whether shopping around town or working in the front yard, we can all be together as a community to celebrate our nation's independence," the MACA release stated. "We hope everyone enjoys this very unique celebration. MACA looks forward to hosting next year's July 4th parade and festival and allowing everyone to celebrate the holiday as we have in the past."

Engler expressed his department members' shock and grief over Floyd's death. "I join all of you in my shock at the video of the death of George Floyd while in police custody in Minneapolis," the veteran chief stated. Police Department in no way instructs, utilizes, or condones the excessive use of force used by Derek Chauvin and the other three officers who contributed to Mr. Floyd's death," Engler said in his letter to the community. He emphasized the sevenmember department takes pride in its professionalism and close bond with the community. "Our department has and continues to build relationships that go beyond the uniform we wear," Engler related. "Our members serve as teachers, coaches, and are

community leaders. We organize fundraisers, are on boards, participate in community activities, and mentor children. We are part of this community in every sense of the word. In fact, 6 of our 7 officers are also residents of Mountain Top," he added.

Engler pointed out his

officers are trained by both experts in the field and inhouse instruction to ensure that they deal with any situation appropriately. "When met with resistance, there are levels of response, and every one of our officers is well-versed and trained in a variety of responses," he explained.

"Public safety is of utmost importance, and that includes the safety of individuals in our custody," Engler related. "If we do meet with resistance, we respond appropriately. Once an individual is in custody, it is our duty to keep them safe," he emphasized. He noted many of the officers have deep roots in the Mountain Top community. "It is an honor to serve Wright Township and the entire Mountain Top community, and we do not take it lightly," he stated.

Engler pointed out that when an incident like the one in Minneapolis occurs, it casts a dark shadow on professional police officers everywhere who have dedicated their lives to protecting and serving others. "It means we must work harder to retain your trust in the Wright Township Police Department," he stated. "I, along with Sergeant (Scott) Rozitski, have worked hard to keep strong, open lines of communication. We are constantly working to better our service," he offered.

Engler closed his letter by promising his department will continue to work hard, better the agency and engage in active communication with all the people of Wright Township. He promised his department will continue to serve the Mountain Top community with the respect and dignity that it deserves.

Wright Township reschedules clean up Wright Township supervi-

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sors decided that the annual cleanup, usually held in the spring, will be held later in the year, most likely early in October. There was no decision on whether an electronics recycling would be held.

Supervisors voted to award a contract in the amount of \$350,637.90 to Barletta Materials and Construction for paving of roads in Walden Park. The project includes paving of Yorktown Road from Hitching Post Road to the southerly end; Red Coat Lane from Walden Drive up to dead end just past Colonels Ridge Road; the northerly portion of Rebel Hill Road. Supervisors decided not to include paving of Fawn Court and White Tail Drive from South Main Road to Deer Run Drive in Deerfield Acres which would have cost an additional \$50,000.

The scope of work includes to-inch milling of existing roadway surface; base repair where directed; two-inch binder course structural overlay; one and one-half wearing course overlay; and shoulder back-up material where required along both sides of the road.

State Liquid Fuels funds will be used for the project. Supervisor Louis Welebob voted against awarding the pact. He expressed concern that once additional engineering fees associated with the work are paid, that would not allow enough money remaining in the Liquid Fuels fund to pay for street lighting and winter snow and ice removal in the next winter. The fund has a balance of \$412,365 as of the end of May. Welebob suggested waiting until the engineering costs are determined before awarding the bid.

Supervisor Donald Zampetti abstained. He complained that he had not received information on the bids prior to the meeting and did not feel he had enough information to vote.

After putting off a decision for a few months, supervisors voted 4-1 to accept a fourtenths of a mile portion of Morio Road from the Mountain Top Area Joint Sanitary Authority. The township already owns most of the road for which it receives Liquid Fuels funds. Welebob, who voted no, expressed concern that the township would be accepting a road that does not meet current construction specifications.

Supervisors approved a toyear extended warranty contract for police department radio at a cost of \$2,580.

Dorrance recycling re-opens

Dorrance Township recycling center re-opened recently. The center is open Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Anyone is welcome to drop off recyclables, even those who aren't township residents.

Drivers are asked to stay in their vehicles and township employees will retrieve the recyclables from the vehicles. Masks must be worn and social distancing observed if you leave your vehicle.

Plastics, aluminum, cardboard, paper, tin cans and similar goods are accepted.

the Crestwood Industrial park was open less than four hours when someone dumped some pieces of steel rebar mixed in with yard waste. Wright Township supervisor Donald Zampetti, COG president, said material could have put the COG's yard waste grinder known as The Beast, out of commission had it gone through the machine.

"It cost over \$10,000 just for the parts to repair The Beast last month," Zampetti said. "The COG doesn't have that kind of money to fix it again," he related. "If it breaks down again, we will have to shut down the compost site," he warned.

Zampetti urged residents using the facility to be careful not to dump construction material or any other debris other than leaves and yard waste. He also asked that people using the site notify the attendant if they see material other than yard waste being dumped.

Pickleball court completed

The Rice Township pickleball court finally has been completed and is ready for play. The township received a grant last year for the court which is the first outdoor pickleball court on the east side of the Susquehanna River. Supervisor Bob Pipech said the bulk of the work, including excavating, drainage and painting was completed by township public works employees. He noted lights will be installed soon. The court is located adjacent to the township tennis courts which also are open. Pipech said the township park's softball fields and walking trail are open, but the children's playground equipment remains closed for safety reasons.

An official ribbon cutting will be held June 27 at 10 a.m.

At this point the Pastoral Council has decided that you can only sign up for one weekend Mass a month. Remember, this plan is for the present. In the future it will change. Reservations will be taken for those in your household only.

Those on the list will come to the front door of the church. You are to take a seat at the blue tape (with the tape in front of you so that both hands can be on either side of the tape.) This will ensure proper social distancing. Families may sit together. Anyone who comes into the church must wear a mask. There will be a sanitizing station at the entrance and exit of the church. They ask that you sanitize your hands
