Rice Township gets grant to repair the Ice Lakes dam

The \$508,833 grant funded by the H20 PA and the Pennsylvania Small Water and Sewer Programs was announced by State Rep. Gerald Mullery. It was one of three approved for Luzerne County by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

"The residents and officials of Rice Township have faced numerous challenges and setbacks over the past five years to get the Ice Lakes Dam repaired," Mullery said. "To be able to secure state funds which will fully cover the cost of the repairs will end this nightmare and return the beauty and tranquility of the Ice Lakes for residents and visitors to enjoy."

Bob Pipech, Chairman of the township board of supervisors, shared Mullery's sentiment. "This funding will help us put the Ice Lakes dam project to bed," Pipech said. "On behalf of myself and Rice Township, we can't thank Rep. Mullery enough in assisting us through this process these past five years. I know the residents around the Ice Lakes will be grateful and all those who use the Ice Lakes recreationally will be happy as well." The township applied for the grant last December.

Township officials have been dealing with the Ice Lakes dam issue for over four years. In late summer of 2015, property owners around the lake notified the township, which owns the lake, that the water level was dropping. At the time, engineers determined the problem was a valve in a drainpipe in the dam.

After several delays beyond

their control, in December 2017 supervisors awarded A.R. Popple a \$179,500 contract for repairs to the dam. However, in mid-May, the contractor halted work on the project, leaving behind a muddy lakebed. The township subsequently hired attorney Raymond Wendelowski to negotiate a settlement with Popple's bonding company. That negotiation did not bring about an agreement, prompting supervisors to vote to file a lawsuit against A.R. Popple and its bond company, Philadelphia Indemnity Insurance Co. to recover costs associated with project.

To get the project completed, supervisors advertised for bids on the project in March of 2019, but none were received.

A second advertisement in June resulted in four bids. Latona Trucking was the lowest of the four bidders at \$490,833. Other bidders were James T. O'Hara, \$591,760; Ken Rauch Excavating, \$621,709; and Linde Corp., \$864,805. The township previously received a Local Shares Account (gaming) grant and a grant from the state Department of Community and Economic Development to be used for the project. Township secretary/ treasurer Jeff Beck said in June that \$135,000 remained from those grants.

Mullery added, "I want to thank the Department of Community and Economic Development for recognizing the importance and necessity of all three projects."

The other grants were \$391,000 for Hazle Township for the Hollywood Area Sewer Rehabilitation and Replacement project and \$78,341 for White Haven Borough for improvements to the storm sewer system along Pine and Berwick Streets.

Revenue down in Fairview Township

Fairview Township supervisors learned at their August 4 meeting that township rev-

enues are down approximately \$93,000 compared to the same time in 2019.

"You need to be careful what you buy and do over the next quarter," township secretary/treasurer Barbara Wasiakowski stated as part of her monthly financial report. As of July 31, the township had \$285,201.86 in its general fund and \$195,119.40 in its state aid fund (Liquid Fuels). The township had \$93,535 income in July and paid bills totaling \$154,996. The bulk

of the township's income for July was \$41,505 from earned income tax.

Supervisors did vote to spend \$8,695 to update the current township code of ordinances. General Code Co. will update the code to include all ordinances and amendments adopted since 2008. Supervisors said the work will provide better access to the code for staff and residents.

They also voted a \$1 an hour wage increase to Edward Kresge who works at the Mountain Top Council of Governments (COG) compost site.

After hearing a plea from Michael Hanlon of South Hill Court for paving of his street, supervisors promised to look into funding the project. The resident told supervisors he has lived on South Hill Court for 30 years and in that time the road has not been repaved. He noted snowplows push the loose and crumbling pavement onto his property. "The street is falling apart," he commented.

Township road master Tim McGinnis told supervisors the township has applied for a gaming grant of approximately \$300,000 for drainage work and paving of Park Lane North, which intersects with South Hill Court, and nearby Deer Path Drive. Supervisors decided if the township gets the gaming grant, it will pave South Hill Court with township funds.

In other business ...

On the recommendation of zoning officer Carl Alber, supervisors voted to terminate the township's contract with Code Inspections, the township's third-party inspection firm. Solicitor Donald Karpowich was authorized to negotiate

a contract with BHW Inspections. Alber noted BHW is a local company, which Code Inspections is not. Code Inspections is headquartered in Horsham. Its nearest offices, according to its web site, are in Wyalusing and Dushore. BHW is located in Plains Township.

Police Chief Phil Holbrook reported township police investigated four motor vehicle crashes in July, issued 47 traffic citations and 14 warnings. He reported the department borrowed the speed warning trailer from the district attorney's office and has placed it at problem areas throughout the township along with conducting speed enforcement.

Supervisors also noted work

has begin on the refurbishing of the basketball court in Memorial Park. The work includes resurfacing of the court, new support poles, backboards and rims.

Police purchase tactical shields

The Fairview Township police department was able to purchase two tactical shields thanks to donations from three township businesses. Police Chief Phil Holbrook reported Twin City Builders recently purchased one shield while Carone's Market and Triangle Pharmacy split the cost of a second. The department now has the shields in all three of its cruisers.

Will Crestwood build a garage for buses?

Last Month, Wright Township supervisors received a letter asking if Crestwood School District plans to park school buses on the secondary campus and possibly build a garage there. Supervisors stated they had no knowledge of such a plan.

However, reports that such a plan is in the offing continue to circulate. Superintendent Robert Mehalick was asked if there is any merit to the reports.

"At this time, we have had one very preliminary discussion about staging our buses somewhere on the secondary campus," Mehalick said in an email. "There has been nothing more than one short discussion and there has been no follow up to that discussion," he added.



Health and the State Department of Education issued new guidelines for return to school.

Previously, the district gave parents two options for their students' return to school. They could send children back full-time for in-person instruction or enroll them in the Crestwood Cyber Academy and learn from home.

Mehalick said in his August 10 announcement that students enrolled in the Crestwood Cyber Academy will continue to use that platform. Students who were planning to return for in-person instruction will be taught through a "distance learning" platform.

The Department of Health and Department of Education on August 10 released an analysis showing the seven-day rate of transmission of the coronavirus in each county and grouped those rates into three categories: low, moderate and substantial. The department's recommendation on how to reopen is based on those categories.

Districts that are in areas with a low transmission rate could adopt a partly remote or a full in-person instruction model. For areas with a moderate transmission rate, districts can use a blended approach or a fully remote model. The state recommends a fully remote model for districts in communities with a substantial transmission rate.

At a school board work session on August 13, Mehalick said the decision to return virtually was based on what he described as "significant changes" in Department of Health and Department of Education guidelines. Luzerne County, at the time of the announcement, was in the moderate category.

At that board meeting, Mehalick told school directors and members of the public listening online that trusted medical professionals on whom he was

relying for advice had told him that Luzerne County was not far from moving into the substantial category.

"These are strong recommendations from the Department of Health and Department of Education. Only a fool would not adhere to them," Mehalick stated.

St. Jude School had planned to resume classes on August 31. However, on Friday the Scranton Diocese announced that the opening date would be pushed back to September 8. Mehalick said Crestwood School District will provide transportation for St. Jude's students.

Parents of students in St.

Jude School have the option of enrolling their students for full-time in person instruction or in the Diocese of Scranton Virtual Academy. The online classes will be taught by diocesan teachers. Sister Ellen Fischer, SCC, school principal said students who attend school in person will have their temperatures checked daily upon entering school. Students will be required to wear masks throughout the school day. She said desks have been placed six feet apart and hand sanitizer will be available throughout the building. Students will eat lunch in their classroom.

Fee for batteries is \$3 each and all white appliances \$10 each. All freon must be removed from refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners and dehumidifiers or they will not be accepted. Tires will be accepted at the following charges: \$2 each for 13, 14, and 15-inch tires, no rims; \$5 for 16-inch and larger tires no rims; \$5 for truck tires, no rims. Tractor trailer tires will not be accepted.

The following will not be accepted: electronic devices, asbestos, shingles, wood, paint cans, propane tanks, household garbage or any hazardous materials.

Anyone caught dumping items at any other time will be prosecuted.

The township volunteer fire company will be available to assist residents who need a truck. A reasonable donation is requested. To arrange for a truck through the fire company, call the township garage at 570-868-2005 and leave your name, phone, and address prior to Friday, September 4.

Gardening has been in the blood of Albert and Florence Drum for many years

have lived in their home in Mountain Top since 1972, and before that the home belonged to Albert's parents who moved there in 1935 when Albert was only five years old.

The old homestead has had gorgeous flower beds since 1935 when Albert's parents started building the beds and planting flowers. Albert says of his dad, "My father went down the road and found some good black dirt and hauled it up to the house and searched the property for all the round stones lining all the flower beds." There are some old apple trees from an old orchard and a small vegetable garden besides the flower beds.

The flower beds are all annuals that are from seeds

Albert and Florence Drum from the previous year and started in pots to be planted when the weather is exactly right in the spring. Some of the large asters are from purchased seeds.

> The seeds are planted in pots on the living room floor on blankets spread out to protect the floors by both Albert and Florence. When asked how long it takes to plant the largest flower bed Florence says, "It takes several days to plan out and plant the gorgeous 85-foot-long flower bed alongside the driveway." The couple prefers to plant annuals because they can plant them in straight lines and patterns etc. This year the large garden is made up of mainly marigolds, asters, petunias, and ageratum plus in another garden there can be found gladiolas.

parents first began planting flowers there.

The poppys that do come up every year are from plants planted many, many years ago and some have double poppy flowers. Many of the original

gardens are grass now, but the ones that the Drums continue to plant and maintain are spectacular.

The Drums have been mar-

ried for 66 years and together enjoy the gardens and the apples from their trees, which Florence cans for apple pies and apple sauce.





made an error in its decision regarding the case. The judge sent the matter back to the zoning hearing board.

Mullery bill to provide relief to restaurant, bar and club workers

A bill introduced by state Rep.

Gerald Mullery, D-Luzerne, has been included in a legislative package announced on July 28 by House Democrats to provide relief to owners and workers of Pennsylvania restaurants, bars and clubs impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic.

for any bar, restaurant or club that suffered more than a 25 % downturn in business due to the virus. The other bills in the package include:

• Earmarking CARES grant funding from the federal government to be directed to small, community restaurants

instead of national chains to ensure those dollars are invested back into the region.

• Earmarking CARES grant funding from the federal government for Pennsylvania breweries, distilleries and wineries forced to reduce capacity to protect patrons. Most of these businesses are small and family-operated and help support multiple community efforts, and this funding will help keep them in operation.

• Expanding access to outdoor dining for restaurants and diners, including removing limitations concerning public thoroughfares, fees and delays in approval. Scientific evidence is growing that outdoor activity is a much lower risk than indoor dining, and helping restaurants add space outdoors can help them stay open while giving people an opportunity to get out and enjoy themselves.

• Increasing the discount for restaurants and bars holding liquor licenses when they purchase wholesale alcohol from 10% to 15%, putting more

money back in the pockets of operators to keep their doors open and staff employed.

Eliminating the \$500 offpremise catering permit fee to allow more restaurants to safely cook food in kitchens and deliver it to safe outdoor locations, as well as remove the

Ivan Hoyt helps to restore Johnny Ott's PA Dutch folk art in Lenhartsville Hotel

Wapwallopen folk artist, Ivan E. Hoyt in collaboration with Steve Stetzler, the owner and chef at the Deitsch Eck Restaurant located in the historic Lenhartsville Hotel has recently begun the task of restoring the Pennsylvania Dutch folk art paintings of the late self described hexologist, Johnny Ott on the walls of the restaurant's dining room. Ott was the owner, proprietor, and resident folk artist at the Lenhartsville Hotel through the late 1940s until his death in 1964. In addition to his responsibilities as the hotel keeper, Ott was also a very talented self-taught artist. He painted Pennsylvania Dutch hex signs, in traditional and his own original motifs that he

sold at the hotel to the many tourists that traveled the then heavily used Old Route 22, as well as venues like the early Kutztown Folk Festival. In the early 1950s Ott decorated the dining area of the hotel with his charming folk art which he painted directly on the walls. Some of the paintings represent the daily life of the Pennsylvania Dutch and some just illustrated the whimsy of Ott's creation.

With the passage of time, seventy years at this point, several of the paintings were beginning to show their age and Stetzler felt their legacy should be continued. After several conversations with contemporary folk artist, Ivan E. Hoyt of Wapwallopen, it was

determined that Hoyt could reproduce the original Johnny Ott paintings on thin substrate panels that could be affixed over the damaged paintings thus keeping them historically intact as well as improving the dining experience for Stetzler's patrons. Stetzler commissioned Hoyt to do the project early in 2020 and it has recently been completed.

Hoyt, with the help of his wife Dorothy, researched photographs that they had taken of the Ott paintings in the early 1980s prior to any of the damage taking place. One of the three paintings reproduced had been painted over prior to Stetzler owning the restau-

rant so it is quite fortunate that the Hoyt's had an image of the original paintings.

Folk artist, Ivan E. Hoyt has been painting Pennsylvania Dutch folk art for 48 years and has exhibited his work at the Kutztown Folk Festival for 37 vears. He is retired from the Crestwood School District after 33 years of teaching elementary and middle school art. He is a life member of the Pennsylvania State Education Association, National Education Association, and currently holds Master Artisan status with the Pennsylvania Guild of Craftsmen and its Reading-Berks Chapter. He is also a member of the Pennsylvania German Society and in the Pennsylvania German Heritage Center in Kutztown, PA.

March deadline to submit an application to do off-premise catering, and end the 52-eventper-year cap.

• Eliminating sales tax late payment penalties on restaurants and bars purchasing alcohol from wholesalers and allowing for a repayment grace period when the industry has recovered.

• Requiring business insurance policies to pay damages and benefits when a disaster emergency is declared. An insurance policy that doesn't pay the holder when emergencies arise is worse than no coverage at all - it is money that could have been used to reinvest in the business thrown away. When the pandemic hit,

many policies invoked an "Act of God" loophole to not pay damages, and businesses have suffered.

• Allowing license holders with licenses in safekeeping relief from paying the license renewal or validation fee for one year. Just a few months ago, many of these businesses were making renovations and improvements that would have put them in a position to remove their license from safekeeping and start operating — the virus delay shouldn't stop these entrepreneurs from reinvesting in their communi-

Mullery said quick action is needed on the bills to help mitigate the financial burdens faced by these small business-

chase a guaranteed maintenance agreement for the township telephone system from Guyette Communications at an annual cost of \$324, payable quarterly.

Dorrance closes recycling center

Dorrance Township supervisors announced at their August 10 meeting that the township's recycling center is closed until further notice.

Officials explained the step was taken because of the large amount of trash and unacceptable recycling materials being thrown into the bins. They pointed out the cost of disposal of recyclables has increased

significantly and the program is not working as intended.

In other business ...

Supervisors will hold a public hearing before their September 14 meeting on a proposed amendment to the township code of ordinances dealing with unattached accessory structures. The amendment will increase the maximum height of accessory structures.

The township's annual cleanup will be held Saturday, September 12 from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. behind the municipal garage. The cleanup will be limited to residents only and proof of residency will be required. There will be a \$15 fee for each carload; \$20 each for small pickup trucks and pull behind trailer loads; and \$50 each for trucks over three-

quarter ton.

Fee for batteries is \$3 each and all white appliances \$10 each. All freon must be removed from refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners and dehumidifiers or they will not be accepted. Tires will be accepted at the following charges: \$2 each for 13, 14, and 15-inch tires, no rims; \$5 for 16-inch and larger tires no rims; \$5 for truck tires, no rims. Tractor trailer tires will not be accepted.

The following will not be accepted: electronic devices, asbestos, shingles, wood, paint cans, propane tanks, household garbage or any hazardous materials.

Anyone caught dumping items at any other time will be prosecuted.

The township volunteer fire company will be available to assist residents who need a truck. A reasonable donation is requested. To arrange for a truck through the fire company, call the township garage at 570-868-2005 and leave your name, phone, and address prior to Friday, September 4.

As in the past, anyone wishing to clean up any township road is asked to call the township garage for bags. The bags can be placed on the side of the road and will be picked up by the road crew.

Wright Township accepts retirement of two employees

Wright Township supervisors at their August 10 meeting

accepted the retirement letters of two long-time employees, both of whom are eligible for the voluntary employment separation plan approved at the township's July meeting.

Veteran police officer Brian Macko submitted his retirement effective July 31 while long-time public works department employee Chris Kania will retire at the end of October.

The voluntary employment separation plan provides employees who meet certain criteria a \$20,000 incentive if they retire by December 31, 2020. To be eligible, employees must have 25 years of full-time employment in the township or be age 60 or older with a minimum of five

years employment. Employees who want to participate must submit a notice of separation by October 1 and retire by December 31. A \$10,000 incentive will be paid to the employee on their separation and a second \$10,000 on the one-year anniversary of their leaving.

Both Macko and Kania qualify for the incentive. Kania recently completed his forty-seventh year with public works while Macko has served on the police department for 28 years.

Before Macko can receive the incentive, however, a memorandum of understanding (MOU) between the township and the Wright Township Police Officers Association must be approved. Solicitor Jack Dean said the township has approved the MOU and it is awaiting approval of the police union.

Police Chief Royce Engler submitted a request to hire a full-time officer to replace Macko, but supervisors voted to advertise for a part-time police officer at a rate of \$18 an hour not to exceed 30 hours a week.

In other business ...

Supervisors voted to apply for up to \$750,000 in grants for two road improvement projects. They authorized an application for a gaming grant not to exceed \$400,000 for paving of Deer Run Drive. The second

grant proposal is for a Multimodal Transportation Fund grant of up to \$350,000 for Park Road. Secretary/treasurer Pam Heard and supervisor Matthew Howton explained the purpose of multimodal grants is to make roads safer for motorists, pedestrians, and bicyclists. She said the grant money will be used to make the road safer for pedestrians using the park as well as bicyclists. The road through the township park frequently is used by motorists as a shortcut from Route 309 to South Main Road.

On the recommendation of Heard, supervisors voted to seek an intern through the SLIP program offered by the Luzerne/Schuylkill Workforce Investment Board. Heard explained the program will allow the township to hire a paid intern for an eight-week period to assist her office in various projects. The township would be reimbursed for costs.

Supervisors approved a proposal from township resident Joseph Otero to erect a bench in front of the township building near the memorial stone as part of his Eagle Scout project. Otero is a student at Crestwood High School.

Supervisor also reported that Dean has clarified the authority of the Mountain Top Council of Governments (COG) to set the rate for permit fees for the compost facility. Earlier this year, the COG set the fee for annual permits at \$25. Wright Township supervisors voted to charge residents \$10 and no cost for senior citizens. Fairview Township collects the \$25 rate for its residents.

At the July work session there was a question as to whether which body set the rate and if the township had to reimburse the COG for the difference. Howton said Dean determined the COG has the authority to set the rate and bills from the COG have been paid.



permit for its new field house if all went well at last Tuesday night's meeting of the Wright Township planning commission.

Representatives of the school district and its engineering firm attended a past planning commission work session at which the project engineer by Martin Moucha of Quad3 Land Planning & Utilities addressed outstanding engineering and legal issues. Also attending from the school district were Robert F. Mehalick, superintendent, Scott Brumagin, supervisor of facilities, and school board members Lauren McCurdy and Barry

Boone. Participants attended in person and by Zoom.

Both planning commission chairman Dr. Thomas Urosevich and Mehalick emphasized the importance that the occupancy of the field house will play in supporting the health and safety of the students during the current pandemic. But they did clarify, however, that all Wright Township codes, and ordinance requirements must be met before the building can be utilized by the students.

After Moucha addressed all the current project issues and concerns, planning commission members voted unanimously to grant conditional approval for the project, provided that certain outstanding engineering tasks are com-

pleted prior to the commission's August 18 meeting. If the project was approved, the township's former third-party inspector, Code Inspections, Inc., will issue the occupancy permit. While Code Inspections no longer is the third-party inspector for the township, the firm is still responsible for the project which was presented during its tenure.

If district failed to meet the requirements for plan approval by last Tuesday's meeting, it will have to wait until the commission's September 15 meeting to get approval.

"I can't over emphasize how critical it is for the school to have this additional space for proper distancing of the students, to include the ability to employ the extra restrooms, that the field house provides," Dr. Urosevich commented following the meeting. "Use of this facility has a direct bearing on keeping our children safe during this true public health crisis, and I do commend Mr. Mehalick for efforts to get the project completed in accordance with our township," he added.
