Fairview adopts ordinance to withdraw from COG

Fairview Township supervisors voted at their December 1 meeting to adopt an ordinance to withdraw from the Mountain Top Council of Governments (COG) as of January 1, 2022.

Only a handful of residents attended the session and there was no opposition to the ordinance expressed by any members of the public present. Nor was there any opposition to the township's 2021 budget which calls for a .6 mill property tax increase.

The only comment came from a resident who asked supervisors for an explanation of why the township wants to leave the COG. Board chairman Michael Iorio responded by describing the COG as a drain on the township. "We don't get much out of it," he stated.

The supervisor, as he has in the past, was critical of what he

described as a lack of cooperation from Wright Township in the operation of the compost facility the Crestwood Industrial Park. Iorio pointed out that a few years ago the COG got a grant to erect a building at the compost facility in the Crestwood Industrial Park. He said Fairview Township wound up handling the grant and overseeing construction since Wright Township failed to do so because officials there were "too busy." He went on to point out that Wright Township was supposed to handle getting water and electrical service to the building, which it has not done. As a result, he said, the building lacks both utilities.

"To add insult to injury, without letting us know, they (Wright Township) decided to store salt in a steel building," he added. At the November 16 COG meeting, members voted to direct Wright Township to remove its salt from the structure by January 1, 2021.

Wright, Fairview, and Dor-

rance Townships are members of the COG, but only Fairview and Wright participate in operation of the compost facility. Iorio predicted the facility would still be open after Fairview leaves the organization. The COG's by-laws require a member organization to provide 12 months notice of its intention to withdraw from membership.

Supervisor Barry Jacob said if the compost facility closes

Toohil announces safety grants for schools in 116th District

and two non-public school in the 116th Legislative District recently were awarded Safe Schools Targeted Grants to

Two public school districts improve safety and security measures, according to Rep. Tarah Toohil (R-Luzerne).

> "Creating a safe and secure learning environment for our

students, faculty and staff is one of my top priorities," said Toohil. "This program continues to support the necessary enhancements to help ensure

we accomplish that goal in schools locally and across the Commonwealth."

The following school districts/schools in the 116th Leg-

islative District received funding:

 Crestwood School District - \$25,000 equipment grant.

• Holy Family Academy -\$24,885 equipment grant.

• Immanuel Christian School - \$17,388.40.

• Northwest Area School District - \$35,600 school police officer grant.

Equipment grants can be used to purchase securityrelated equipment including identification systems; metal detectors; protective lighting; surveillance equipment; special emergency communications equipment; electronic locksets; deadbolts and theft control devices; and training in the use of the security-related technology.

School police officer (SPO) grants fund programs which address school violence by establishing or enhancing school security, including costs associated with the training and compensation of SPOs.

"Although the learning environment has shifted for students, educators and families, the importance of maintaining safe school communities has not changed," Acting Education Secretary Noe Ortega said. "The Safe Schools Targeted Grant program provides schools with resources to create, support and enhance programs that address the current needs of school communities, such as creating traumainformed practices and developing equity and inclusion methods."

The Safe Schools Targeted Grant Program is administered by the Pennsylvania Department of Education and funded by the General Assembly in the 2020-21 state budget. More than \$9 million in grant funding was awarded to schools statewide.

or is not open to township residents, supervisors will work on some means for residents to dispose of yard waste.

The township's \$1,786,580 general fund budget passed unanimously without public opposition. The property tax increase to support the budget is the first in 11 years, although the township did enact a .3 mill fire tax in 2018 to help with the operation of Mountain Top Hose Company No. 1. The increase brings the general fund property tax to 1.45 mills. Adding the fire tax brings total tax on township properties to 1.75 mills which equals \$175 for every \$100,000 of assessed valuation.

The Rice Township supervisors adopted the township's 2021 budget at their December 1 meeting. The general fund budget shows \$2,304.830 in expenses and holds property taxes at .26 mills.

In other business ...

Township engineer Andrew

Pasonick reported he is working to set up a pre-construction meeting with Fabcor Corp. of Jessup which was awarded a \$427,695 contract for the Ice Pond dam outlet repair project at the supervisors' November 4 meeting. Pasonick said all required documents have been received from the firm and he hopes to work out a construction schedule at that meeting.

Township secretary/treasurer Jeffrey Beck reported the township received the final

bill of \$6,490 for installation of lights at the pickle ball court.

Financially, Beck reported the township's real estate transfer tax revenue was higher than expected for 2020 and earned income tax was good. He said the township's Nov. 30 balance was about \$80,000 higher than was projected in the 2020 budget.

Supervisors approved a \$50 holiday bonus for all full-time

township employees as a thank you for their dedicated service. They also approved a resolution eliminating deductions from police department members pay for their pension fund.

Board chairman Bob Pipech thanked residents for their

cooperation and participation in the fall leaf collection program. Pipech said three dumpsters were filled with leaves. He estimated that by having residents bring leaves to the public works recycling center, rather than township employees collecting them from residences, the township saved about \$30,000. He noted that township public works crews were able to focus on patching roads and preparing trucks for inclement weather.

Supervisors approved purchase of a Fire King fourdrawer fireproof lateral file cabinet at a cost of \$5,488.49. They also approved purchase of a Microsoft Surface Pro 7 computer with accessories for Zoom meeting management at a cost of up to \$3,000. The township will seek Covid-19 reimbursement from Luzerne County.

WHACL closes

Effective immediately, the White Haven Area Community Library will be suspending library services until further notice. This decision is in response to the increasing numbers of Covid related illnesses.

All materials being enjoyed by patrons can be returned in the outside book drop.

School lunches will continue to be distributed by the Crestwood School District in the library's parking lot.





of Hazleton families living below the poverty line, these statistics scare me because I know this demographic is getting hit the hardest. Nearly half of my student body represents this demographic. And this is where the gratitude comes in for the step of faith my team took to implement a hybrid instructional model that we weren't sure would work. Yet, with 100% attendance, it is.

At Immanuel Christian School, our vision is to dramatically impact the city of Hazleton by empowering generations of diverse students, through Christcentered education, to love God, serve others, and bless the world. Like the majority of public schools, this pandemic hit us hard. We don't have enough space to accommodate in-person learning, while adhering to needed safety protocols that protect students, staff and teachers. Yet, unlike public schools, we had greater flexibility with our response. We chose a hybrid model that has allowed every student to be in-person twice a week and fully remote, with direct instruction, three days a week. It has worked so well that we are now evaluating the possibility of moving to three days of in-person instruction a week after the holidays. Here are a few lessons learned:

Kids need connection. They need connection with their teacher and their peers. The hybrid model allows the teacher and the child to have a real relationship through in-person learning, which then adds value and significant effectiveness to the online days. Honestly, this correlation came as a surprise. Given how much work

the Hybrid model has been for our teachers and staff. I questioned if such limited time of in-person learning would be worth the effort. Yet, the evidence is telling me that with 100% attendance in remote and in hybrid, without loss to the learning, it is working. When our team thinks about the vision behind WHY we do

education, we know these connections matter. Our city. Our country. We all need these kids to thrive and not fall further behind. They are our future.

Kids need calm. In a time of unrest in our own country, exacerbated by the pandemic, our children need to have some form of stability. Many of our families at ICS have parents who are working two jobs, or third shift, or are single parent households. Given how many

under-resourced kids there are in the greater Hazleton area, I can only imagine the stress that fully remote learning has placed on parents. Our children need the calm and order that being in school, even if for two days a week, can provide.

Kids need compassion. Families need compassion. This pandemic has stretched my own family. I know it is stretching everyone. The hybrid model allows us to look a child in the eyes, even socially-distanced and behind a mask, to say, "You are safe. We are here for you. We understand how scary this is, but you're not alone and we will get through this together." I know that level of compassion from teachers has made a huge difference in my own children's lives. My kids can't hide behind the camera when they're in the classroom.

Immanuel Christian School

is fortunate to have the freedom as a non-public institution to respond to the needs of our community in a quick and flexible way. We will not let the achievement gap widen for our students. My hope is that the incredible administra-






