

#### Steps taken to stop loud noise in Fairview Township

Since last summer, residents of the Bow Creek development in Fairview Township have been plagued off and on by a loud noise stemming from the Crestwood Industrial Park. Over recent months, the noise has been almost nightly, disrupting their sleep to the point some residents are considering selling their homes.

While some residents have

discussed and complained about the noise on several Facebook sites, they realized that solving the problem would require more than social media posts. So, using social media to marshal support and develop a plan, they took the issue to Fairview Township supervisors last month. Acknowledging the source of the noise is in adjacent Wright Township, the residents, through their spokesperson Gene Vivalda, laid out the problem to supervisors and asked for their help.

They didn't scream or yell or make threats. They very efficiently explained the problem and asked for help.

Fairview Township supervisors acknowledged their concerns and promised to reach out to Wright Township officials about the problem, which they did. At this month's meeting, when residents reported the problem persists, they promised to stay on top of the problem.

Their efforts appear to have had success, or at least on the road to a resolution.

At last week's Wright Township supervisors meeting, attended by several Bow Creek residents, as well as Fairview Township supervisor Michael Iorio, solicitor Jack Dean

reported the township zoning officer has investigated the issue and narrowed the source to one or two companies. Dean said the township plans to send letters to all companies in the industrial park asking for their cooperation in addressing noise issues. "We are actively looking into this," Dean stated. "We have an idea who it is."

The solicitor also reported police have worked out a plan to deal with complaints. He said residents awakened or bothered by the noise should contact Luzerne County 911. Fairview Township police will respond to the residence and Wright Township will go to the industrial park to identify its source. If appropriate, he

said, police will file citations against the company for violation of the township nuisance ordinance. Vivalda plans to use social media to inform residents of the plan.

Vivalda also said he has learned a company believed to be the source of the noise has agreed to put a muffler on equipment causing the problem.

"This is a more than adequate solution," Vivalda said of the plan. He thanked township officials, especially supervisor Matt Howton, for their efforts.

Residents and municipal leaders working together to solve a problem and using social media positively! Everyone involved should be proud of the part they played.

# Fairview approves zoning application

The Fairview Township zoning hearing board approved an application by JAZD Enterprises, Inc. for dimensional variances for property at 123 N. Mountain Blvd. where it plans to build a bagel shop. The company requested variances for required lot size (.69 acres where minimal lot size is 1 acre); width of property of (187 feet, where 200 feet is required); side yard buffer (11 feet where 30 feet is required); and parking lot set back from building (4 feet where 10 feet is required). The property previously was the site of a sub shop and later a physician's office.

see their options for playing the fast-growing sport increase trifold by summer's end.

Wright Township supervisors voted at their May meeting to allocate \$2,000 toward creation of three pickleball courts on the township's ice rink. The township funds will supplement a \$3,000 donation the township received to build the courts. That donation has been deposited in the recreation board's 501c3 account.

Board chairman Matthew Howton told supervisors after receipt of the donation, he contacted Bill Eydler, who applied the surface to the Rice Township pickleball court, about the cost of creating courts on the ice rink. Howton said Eydler, who has run the tennis courts at Kirby Park for decades, told him he could provide three complete pickleball courts on the rink for \$5,000.

Howton, in his pitch to fellow supervisors during the supervisors work session to allocate the additional \$2,000, pointed out the ice rink currently gets minimal use. "It's only being used on those few days when it's cold enough," Howton offered. "Over at Rice Township, people are being turned away because the pickleball court is so busy," he noted.

During the board's regular meeting, supervisors approved appropriation of up to \$2,000 for the pickleball courts, on the condition that Eydler provide a guarantee that the courts would have to be re-painted after the winter ice skating season. Supervisor Don Zampetti, while supporting the construction of pickleball courts, expressed concern that creating them on the ice rink would mean recurring costs for the township.

Two years ago, Rice Township received a state grant to construct a pickleball court adjacent to its tennis courts. The court, which is lighted and fenced, is used heavily, even during cold weather. Township secretary/treasurer Jeffrey Beck said he even received requests during a period in January when the temperature was in the upper 30s for the

township to turn on the lights at the court. He said he feels three additional courts would lighten the burden on the Rice Township court and would also be heavily used. "We have people coming from as far away as Bloomsburg to use the court," Beck related.

#### Rice and Wright Townships to apply for grants

Rice Township supervisors recently voted to apply for a \$202,640 state Greenways,



The project is meant to improve the park by providing a modern safe play structure with a safe surface for children. Funding was received from DCNR. The play equipment is the first step of a larger





# Toohil's Living Donor Protection legislation now law

Legislation sponsored by Rep. Tarah Toohil (R-Luzerne) that protects living organ donors in Pennsylvania was signed into law by Gov. Tom Wolf as Act 11 of 2021 today.


Act 11, or the Living Donor Protection Act, prohibits a life or health insurance company from discriminating against an organ or tissue donor. It also ensures family and medical leave is provided for an eligible employee for the preparation and recovery necessary for donation surgery. In addition, the proposal requires the Department of Health to develop informational materials relating to living donors and the benefits of live organ and tissue donation.

Toohil donated a kidney to her late mother in 2003 and has been a strong advocate for organ donation during her House tenure.


The new law will take effect in 60 days.

# **Historical Society moves Keystone** Marker to land it recently acquired

The Mountain Top Historical Society is doing its part to preserve a part of Pennsylvania's history that dates back more than a century.

Society members, with the permission of Fairview Township, recently moved a Mountain Top Keystone Marker from a spot along Route 309 near Roberts Street to a much more visible location about one-quarter north along the highway to land the society

recently acquired near Route

The sign, in a keystone shape with blue and gold colors, reads "Mountain Top - So Named From Location on Mountain Top. Founded 1798."

Historical society members Eric Aigeldinger, Steve McGinnis and John Kirn moved the sign and planted flowers around it at its new location.

Aigeldinger said the society wanted to move the sign to a

more visible location along the busy highway. "People drove by it down there and never noticed it," he said of the Roberts Street location. He noted the sign at one time was located at the top of the mountain near the Broadway Tavern but was moved to its more recent location several years ago after being knocked over.

Aigeldinger emphasized that the sign is not a historical marker, rather a road sign, part of a system of roadside signage developed by the Pennsylvania Department of Highways, predecessor to PennDOT, just after World War I.

Markers for towns indicated the name of the town, the reason why the town was given that name, and the date founded. Many town Keystone Markers indicated the distance to the next town in the upper part of the sign. Thus, each marker for a given town was unique.

At the top of the Mountain Top sign, it reads "Ashley-3." McGinnis explained that was meant to advise motorists that

the next town, Ashley, was three miles away. "The signs were erected at a time when most people didn't have road maps," Aigeldinger noted. "These markers were the 'road maps' for many people."

According to the Keystone Marker Trust, an organization is dedicated to preserving and re-creating the markers, the iconic Keystone Markers at one time could be found at the entrance to every Pennsylvania town, borough, and city. Variations of the marker could be found at highway crossings of creeks, rivers, trails, borough lines, and other points of interest.

The Keystone Markers, according to the Keystone Marker Trust, were products of the height of the "Good Roads" movement that opened highway travel to the masses. They were the signature project of

the highway department, the second oldest of its kind in the nation. The proliferation of the familiar blue and yellow, cast iron Keystone Markers popularized Pennsylvania's reputation as the "Keystone State."

While Pennsylvania once

claimed thousands of Keystone Markers, approximately 600 remain, according to the Keystone Marker Trust. The loss of the markers prompted Preservation Pennsylvania, the Commonwealth's statewide heritage preservation advocacy

organization, to include the Keystone Markers among their most endangered resources in 2011.

Jack Graham of the Keystone Marker Trust points out on its website that the Department of Highways Biennial Report for the 1926 to 1928 period discusses the program. "The Department also makes a practice of marking the limits of boroughs with cast iron signs on which are a few facts as to the date the community was

founded and the derivation of its name," the report notes. Highway Department documents as late as 1943 continue to refer to the markers. After that, no such references are found, indicating the program was discontinued around that time. Thus the "newest" of these markers are at least 80 years old. The Mountain Top Historical Society members estimate the local sign was erected sometime in the 1930s.






