

Ice Lakes dam project may not be complete until close to winter

It looks like it may be close to winter before the five-yearold Ice Lakes dam project is completed.

Rice Township engineer Andrew Pasonick told supervisors at their June meeting that recent conversations he had with Kirk Kreider of the state Department of Environmental protection (DEP) dam safety

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CRYSTALS FOSSILS division led him to believe that the agency's review process could drag on for months.

The good news, the engineer reported, is that the contractor may be able to use the existing sluice gate in the dam, but capacity calculations must be rerun to ensure that the sluice and pipe meet the legal dewatering requirements. Pasonick said he would deliver the conceptual design to Kreider and if it is approved, the engineer will work on the extensive amendment to its original application and operations and maintenance manual for the dam.

Pasonick reported Kreider told him that the DEP review process may take several rounds. He said because DEP is short-staffed and with new, inexperienced employees, the review process could last into the fall. At that point, the lake would be dewatered again for the final construction.

In response to a question by township planning com-

mission member Tom Romanyshyn, Pasonick said that the necessary gate and lifting mechanism for the sluice could take time to receive after the order was placed. While the actual dam construction might be only three to four weeks, the review process and gate order and delivery could drive the project into the winter, Pasonick reported.

Last November, the township awarded a \$427,695 contract to FABCOR, Inc. of Jessup to repair the pipe in the dam wall. Last summer, the township was awarded a \$508,833 grant funded by the H20 PA and the Pennsylvania Small Water and Sewer Program to repair the dam.

to begin work on construction of a new multi-purpose field, parking lot changes and signage which will be funded by grants from the state Greenways, Trails and Recreation Program and the state Department of Community and Natural Resources. Supervisors voted to enter into an agreement with Barry Isett and Associates for design of the multi-purpose field, construction, permitting, bidding and construction administration.

In other news

Supervisors voted to purchase 2021-2022 recycling stickers at a cost of \$1,345.50 for 230 stickers. Cost of the stickers will be offset by a \$500 donation from First Keystone Community Bank. Once they are available, the non-transferrable stickers will be available free of charge for township residents. The stickers must be displayed on the vehicle windshield on the driver's side for anyone using the recycling center.

Townships contribute to fireworks display

Rice and Fairview Township supervisors voted to contribute \$250 from each municipality to the Wright Recreation and Environmental. Inc. for the 2021 fireworks. The event is scheduled for July 3 with a rain date of July 5.

In other news ...

A proposal by the Wright Township Volunteer Fire Co. for the Dorrance Township ambulance to become the first responder for basic life support (BLS) calls in Wright Township remains an open issue. Last month, the fire company told supervisors it wants to house the Dorrance Township ambulance at Wright's fire headquarters and staff it around the clock with paid staff. The Dorrance ambulance has been out of service for nearly two years due to lack of volunteers.

Fire department president Gary Price last month asked supervisors to designate the Dorrance/Wright ambulance as first responder for BLS calls in Wright Township. Mountain Top Community Ambulance would remain first responder for advanced life support calls in the township, according to the proposal.

A motion at last month's supervisors meeting by supervisor Mike Marshall to designate Wright Township Volunteer Fire Department, in conjunction with Dorrance Township Ambulance Association, as the BLS provider for Wright Township failed. Marshall's motion was seconded by supervisor Colleen Macko. The motion failed when supervisors Donald Zampetti and Louis Welebob Jr. abstained, and Matt Howton voted no. Welebob and Zampetti said they just learned of the plan and needed more time to consider it. Howton said he wanted to give Wright Township Volunteer Fire Department and Mountaintop Community Ambulance Association time to discuss the acquisition in detail.


Dorrance supervisors ask PennDOT to conduct site survey







property. The crashes required emergency response to remove the vehicle and assist occupants.

Cornelius told supervisors he contacted state Rep. Tarah Toohil's office regarding the crashes and was told the township would have to request that PennDOT complete a survey to see what can be done to improve the safety of the road approaching the curve and the pond. Supervisors directed township secretary/treasurer Patricia Davis to write a letter to PennDOT requesting the survey.

In other news ...

Supervisors voted to apply for the maximum allowance of \$232,889 for the township from the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021. Funds may be used to support public health expenditures, address negative impacts caused by the public health emergency, replace lost public sector revenue, provide premium pay for essential workers, invest in water, sewer and broadband infrastructure.

Supervisors acknowledged receipt of a letter from Atlantic Broadband regarding expanded availability of broadband internet. The internet provider said it is working with local, state and federal funding programs that help subsidize the cost of extending broadband networks into areas that are currently unserved or underserved.

Police chief reminds residents of fireworks restrictions

The celebration of America's Independence on July 4 is just

over a week away. That means a parade, family outings, backyard cookouts and of course fireworks.

Fireworks are common in many neighborhoods throughout Mountain Top. Wright Township police chief Royce Engler reminds residents there are restrictions on which fireworks are legal to purchase and use as well as where and how they can be discharged.

"This time every year the Wright Township Police Department receives many complaints about residents shooting off fireworks," Engler said. He pointed out that only Class C or "Consumer Grade" fireworks are legal to purchase and use in Pennsylvania. Consumer grade fireworks include firecrackers, Roman candles, bottle rockets and similar fireworks that contain a maximum of 50 milligrams of explosive

material.

"Display fireworks," Engler explained, which are classified as including salutes that contain more than two grains or 130 milligrams of explosive materials, and professional grade aerial shells containing more than 60 grams of pyrotechnic compositions may only to be used by professionals with a permit from the municipality.

The chief noted that the state law regarding fireworks places several other restrictions on their use. The law requires that persons must be at least 18 years old to purchase fireworks. They cannot be ignited or discharged on public or private property without permission of the property owner. Fireworks cannot be discharged from, or within, a motor vehicle or building nor discharged toward a motor vehicle or building.

Very importantly, fireworks may not be discharged from 150 feet of an occupied structure, regardless of whether a person is actually present. And they cannot be discharged while the person is under the influence of alcohol, a controlled substance or another drug.

"We find most complaints are residents shooting off fireworks in their back yards in developments," Engler noted. He recommends people using fireworks keep in mind the following:

When shooting a firework into the air, it must come down. Where will it land? Be respectful of neighbors' young children (the loud noise) as well as their pets. Also be aware of the Township noise ordinance. No

Chief Engler gets new 3 year contract

Less than six months after scores of Wright Township residents rallied in front of the municipal building to tell township officials they wanted them to renew the contract of police chief Royce Engler, supervisors last week voted unanimously to extend the veteran chief's contract another three years.

A few days after that rally, which came about after reports surfaced that township supervisors were not going to renew Engler's contract, supervisors voted unanimously to award Engler a new pact that expires at the end of 2021.

The new agreement, also approved by unanimous vote will extend to December 31, 2024.

"I'm very grateful to the township supervisors for their confidence in me to lead the department," Engler said of the contract. Engler has been a member of the department for 43 years. He was appointed chief in June of 2012, succeeding long-time chief Joe Jacob. Like Jacob, he is a graduate of the FBI National Academy.

Engler's contract wasn't the only personnel matter supervisors addressed at their meeting.

David O'Brien was hired as a full-time police officer. His salary will be set by the terms of the collective bargaining agreement with the Wright Township Police officers Association. O'Brien is a 2011 graduate of the Allentown Police Academy and last worked for the Fairview Township police department. Eric Swerdon was hired as a full-time worker in the public works department at a rate of \$18.50 per hour plus benefits. Additionally, Kyle Price was hired as a seasonal part-time park maintenance worker at \$12 per hour and Bob Patrick was appointed substitute park maintenance worker at the same rate. In other news ...

Supervisor Matthew Howton reported the splash pad in the township park will not be operable this summer. Howton said the splash pad has not functioned in five years and parts to repair it simply are not available.

Howton also reported he is waiting on quotes for the installation of pickle ball courts on the ice rink. The township received a \$3,000 donation toward the courts and last month approved an additional \$2,000 for the project. Howton \$2,000 in return for naming rights for the courts. Supervisors did not take any action on his offer.

Building projects in Fairview getting closer to construction

Two projects planned along the Route 309 corridor in Fairview Township took a step closer to construction last week. The township planning commission conditionally accepted final draft plans for a new Dunkin Donuts to be built at 43 S. Mountain Boulevard, site of the current Chalet

Restaurant. The commission also gave its approval to consolidation of four lots on the


kosky previously was located.

Officials had put off a decision on the 2021 paving project, hoping to hear about the township's Local Shares Account (gaming) grant application. They made the decision

to pave the Maplewood roads with other funds after hearing from solicitor Jack Dean that the gaming grants will not be awarded again this year.

Road foreman Matt Howton said the roads are prepped for paving with drainage work completed along with natural gas and water line upgrades.

They also approved a resolution authorizing the township secretary/treasurer to apply for a \$189,640 Luzerne County Dirt and Gravel Road grant that would be used to extend Elbe Road between N. Sunset Road and S. Sunset Road. Residents of North and South Sunset Roads have been after supervisors for several years to improve Elbe Road. Both roads are currently dead end, forcing delivery trucks, snowplows and other vehicles to turn around on residents' properties to return to Route

Supervisors announced the township received a \$114,000 grant from the Luzerne County Community Development office to be used for Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) infrastructure improvements to the parking lot near the playground where new equipment recently was installed.

The township's Environmental Advisory Council, in its report to supervisors, pointed out a littering problem which they said is a concern to the group. They fear debris, if not addressed, will wind up in streams and retention ponds. They pointed out that several commercial properties have dumpsters that are uncovered and open to wildlife. They also expressed concern about litter in the Crestwood Industrial Park including hairnets and other personal protective board. equipment.

Council members suggested supervisors issue a public statement of concern about the problem followed by enforcement if needed. They also recommended Luzerne County be contacted about litter control on its roads and the Chamber of Commerce be informed about the problem in the industrial park. Supervisors did not address the EAC's report at their meeting.

The township public works department was provided with Lyme Disease warning signs. Three signs will be posted in the township park with two held in reserve.
