

Townships finally receives grant money to fix roads Rice Township

When Rice Township supervisor Bob Pipech got the news that the Commonwealth Financing Authority (CFA) had finally awarded Local Shares Account (LSA) grants for 2019 and 2020, he was thrilled. In fact, the veteran supervisor said he was 'tickled pink."

The township was awarded a total of \$560,172 for road improvements, part of nearly \$1.8 million in gaming grant money to be distributed to Mountain Top communities. The grants were announced recently after a two-year delay by the CFA in disbursement of the revenue collected from casino operations.

"We can get a lot of roads

done with that money," said Pipech, who is also the township's road master. "We're looking forward to it."

Pipech noted the township awarded a \$258,701 contract to New Enterprise Stone & Gravel in June for base repair of Ice Harvest Drive, Lakeview Drive, and Wilderness Drive. Pipech said supervisors decided to use Liquid Fuels and general fund money for the much-needed paving work.

State Rep. Eddie Pashinski, whose district includes Fairview Township said that because of the delay by the CFA in awarding the grants, for this round of awards only, the state will allow municipalities the flexibility to use the money for other needs if the projects for which they submitted the grant applications already have been completed.

However, Pipech said he expects all of Rice Township's gaming grant money will be used for road repairs. "All municipalities are hurting when it comes to roads," Pipech commented. "Take a ride around, you'll see," he added. The supervisor said he and township engineer Andrew Pasonick will survey township roads in coming weeks to determine which are in most need of repair.

Wright Township

Wright Township received \$382,412 in gaming grant money, all of which was designated for road repairs. The township received \$182,412 for drainage and road work in the Maplewood development and another \$200,000 for road work in the Deerfield development.

Township supervisors at

their June meeting voted to advertise for bids to pave Spring Mill Road, Westbrook Drive and Broookfield Way in the Maplewood development. They had put off a decision on the 2021 paving project, hoping to hear about the township's Local Shares Account (gaming) grant application, but decided to move forward using other funds. A contract for that work has not been awarded.

Matthew Howton, chairman of the board of supervisors, said that since neither the Maplewood nor the Deerfield projects have been awarded, he expects the township will use the gaming money for those projects.

Fairview Township

Fairview Township's 2019 award included \$200,000 for repairs to Park Lane North and Deer Path Drive, both of which are badly in need of repair. The township also received \$47,513 for purchase of a police department SUV. For 2020, the township received \$120,000 for repairs to the Dale Drive cul-

vert which spans Big Wapwallopen Creek. The township had asked for \$471,000 for the Dale Drive culvert replacement and about \$400,000 for the Park Lane and Deer Path road work. The township is looking into whether American Recovery Act funds can be used for repair of the culvert which was ordered closed by PennDOT over a year ago.

Nuangola Borough

Nuangola Borough received two grants for milling and resurfacing of 1.5 miles of Nuangola Avenue. The borough received \$115,753 in the 2019 LSA award and \$126,000 in 2020 for the same project. Nuangola Borough council president Joseph Tucker said when the 2019 grant applications were put on hold, the municipality was told to re-apply in 2020 which the municipality did.

Tucker said he has been in contact with Department of Economic and Community Development (DCED) officials in Harrisburg to determine if the money can be used for other projects.

Other LSA grants awarded were: Dorrance Township, \$48,990 for a mini paver; Dennison Township, \$64,500 to renovate two restrooms in the municipal building to make them ADA compliant; Slocum Township, \$125,000 for renovations and upgrades to the municipal park on Schmid Road in Wapwallopen.

Toohil announces local state grants

Twenty-six fire and EMS organizations in the 116th Legislative District were awarded more than \$305,000 in fund-

ing support through the 2020-21 Pennsylvania Fire Company and Emergency Medical Service Grant Program, Rep. Tarah Toohil (R-Luzerne) announced recently.

Projects eligible for funding include construction or renovation of a fire or ambulance company facility, purchase or repair of equipment, training and education, recruitment and retention, or debt reduction. This year, funds may also be used to supplement operational expenses incurred by the lack of fundraising opportunities resulting from the pandemic.

Following is a list of area fire and EMS organizations that received grants and the amount of the awards:

Dorrance Township Volunteer Fire Department - \$12,590; Hazle Township Volunteer Fire and Rescue Company - \$15,000; Hobbie Volunteer Fire Company No. 1 (fire) - \$12,055; Hobbie Volunteer Fire Company No. 1 (EMS) - \$8,993; Pond Hill-Lily Lake Ambulance Association - \$8.993: Pond Hill-Lilv Lake Volunteer Fire Company -\$11,698; Sugarloaf Fire Company - \$11,877; Sugarloaf Fire Company (EMS) - \$8,993; Valley Regional Fire and Rescue Inc. (fire) - \$13,481; Valley Regional Fire and Rescue Inc. (EMS) - \$8,993.

All grants are generated from slot machine gaming proceeds, and not General Fund tax revenue. The ongoing funding program was created by the Legislature.

Wright Township supervisors put off decision on BLS service

Wright Township supervisors at their July meeting put off until August a decision on whether to approve the Wright Township Volunteer Fire Company's request to provide basic life support (BLS) ambulance

service for the township.

The issue already has been before supervisors at three consecutive meetings with no action, but board chairman Matthew Howton promised a decision on the proposal will not drag on for months like that of the July 4 parade. He pledged a decision will be made at the board's August 9 meeting.

Fire company officials at the supervisors May meeting presented a proposal to revitalize the neighboring Dorrance Township ambulance to provide basic life support services (BLS) to Wright and Dorrance Townships.

Fire company president Gary Price stated at that meeting that the fire department had discussions with officials of Dorrance Township Fire and Ambulance Department to resume its BLS ambulance service. He pointed out that Dorrance's ambulance has been out of service the last two years due to lack of volunteers. The fire company plans to staff the ambulance with paid emergency medical technicians (EMT).

Mountain Top Community Ambulance Association currently provides BLS and advanced life support (ALS) response to both Fairview and Wright Townships. For the fire company's proposal to proceed, the township would need to designate the Wright/Dorrance ambulance as Wright Township's primary BLS responder.

At the May supervisors meeting. Price told supervisors the fire department has discussed the plan with the manager of Mountain Top Community Ambulance. However, Candace Smith, president of Mountain Top Community Ambulance, who was present for the supervisors meeting, said the fire

department has not discussed its plan with the board of directors of the ambulance association. While she did not object to the plan, Smith said she felt the board should be apprised of the details before it is put into effect.

After hearing Smith's concerns, supervisors decided to table any action on the request so they could get more information and input.

In June, following a presentation by Chris Woolfolk, operations manager for the Mountain Top Community Ambulance Association, supervisors again put off a decision and recommended the fire department and ambulance association meet to work out issues brought up by Woolfolk.

This month, Price told supervisors a meeting was held with three members of the ambulance association board along with Woolfolk and that an agreement had been reached. Price said it was agreed that in

cases where both ambulances respond to a call, the Mountain Top Ambulance Association would transport any ALS calls to the hospital and the fire department unit would remain in service in Wright Township. If both respond to a BLS call, the fire department ambulance will transport, and the ambulance association would remain in service at its headquarters in Fairview Township. Price said the association and fire department would work together on billing issues.

However, Smith told supervisors that the association's entire 12-member board had not discussed nor made a decision on the proposed agreement. She said she did not attend the meeting because she was on vacation, as were several other board members. Fire chief Dave Pettit pointed out the ambulance association set the date for the meeting

with the fire department.

Supervisor Louis Welebob Jr. suggested supervisors wait until the ambulance association board have the opportunity to meet and discuss the proposed agreement. "What if the other people don't go along?" Welebob stated. "I'd rather see the ambulance association (board) vote on this. Three people do not constitute a majority."

After a back and forth over why the ambulance association board did not meet to discuss the agreement and when it would meet, Howton issued an ultimatum. "This is not going to drag out like a decision on the parade," Howton warned. "This board will make a decision at its August meeting."

Dorrance Township will be looking for a new zoning officer

Dorrance Township supervisors at their July meeting reported they received a letter from Andrew Holter of Strategic Municipal Group advising them that effective August 30 his firm no longer will be able to provide in-person zoning and code enforcement services for the township.

Holter told supervisors that due to changes in the company since the onset of Covid-19, his availability with new work constraints and the recent birth of his daughter, he is "no longer able to provide the quality service I initially guaranteed to the Township and taxpayers at large."

Holter offered to assist the township in its transition to a new zoning officer. Supervisors are expected to act on

Holter's letter at their August meeting and appoint a new zoning officer.

In other news ...

Atty. Sean Logsdon reported a letter was sent to Pennsy Supply requesting an inspection of its quarry by the end of September. A 2013 memorandum that established conditions for operation of the quarry includes inspections of the facility at the township's request. The township requested the meeting be held on a Saturday.

Supervisors reported a Talen Energy/EMA drill will be held at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, August 10, at the municipal building.

They also reported a letter was sent to PennDOT's, Dunmore office requesting a review of the area of 1075 to 1082 South Main Road where there is a sharp curve in the roadway. The township asked PennDOT to look into adding more signs, pavement markings, or rumble strips that might improve safety.

Last month, South Main Road resident Dan Cornelius told supervisors that twice within 48-hour period vehicles left the roadway as they rounded the curve and wound up in a pond on his property. The crashes required emergency response to remove the vehicle and assist occupants.

Cornelius told supervisors he contacted state Rep. Tarah Toohil's office regarding the crashes and was told the township would have to request PennDOT complete a survey to see what can be done to improve the safety of the road approaching the curve and the pond. Cornelius thanked supervisors for their efforts.

Labor Day parade may come to Mountain Top

The Wright Township board gave conditional approval of an application by Mountain Top on the Move (MTOTM) to hold a Labor Day parade. The approval was conditioned on the organization correcting an error in its application.

In other news ...

Wright Township supervisors accepted the resignation of part-time police officer Brandyn Cole and part-time parks employee Kyle Price. Police Chief Royce Engler was given approval to advertise for a part-time officer to replace Cole.



Residents sat in their boats or on their docks or grass to enjoy the music.




