

Senior Farmers Market Nutrition vouchers still available

The Area Agency on Aging for Luzerne/Wyoming Counties still has Senior Farmers Market vouchers available for seniors who have not picked up their vouchers yet this year.

The Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program, developed by the Federal and State Dept. of Agriculture, provides each eligible senior with four \$6 vouchers (\$24) which can only be used to purchase Pennsylvania grown fresh fruits and vegetables from a participating farmer's market stand.

Applications will be accepted until Friday, September 24, 2021.

To be eligible for program an individual is required to meet these three requirements:

- 1.) Be at least 60 years old or turn 60 before December 31, 2021
- 2.) Live in Luzerne or Wyoming County
- 3.) Meet the 2021 household total income requirements:

one person: \$23,828 two people: \$32,227

Only one set of vouchers (\$24) per person, per year is allowed.

Seniors residing in an assisted living facility, nursing home or convent where meals are provided, do not qualify for the program

Any senior who has not received vouchers yet this program year and qualifies for the program, can pick up an application at any of the Active Adult Centers.

The centers in our area are: Butler Township Active Adult Center, 411 West Butler Drive, Drums; Freeland Active Adult Center, 701 Chestnut Street, Freeland; Mountain Top Active Adult Center, Wright Manor Apartments, South Main Road, Mountain Top.



Ice rink named in remembrance of Madry, Kahlau

It's official. The ice rink at Wright Township Municipal Park is now the Madry Kahlau Memorial Rink.

Township supervisors voted at their August 9 meeting to name the rink after the late Brian Madry and Tanner Kahlau. The 5-0 vote came after Butch Kahlau, father of Tanner Kahlau, asked the rink to be named in memory of the two men. Supervisor Colleen Macko made the motion to name the rink, seconded by Michael Marshall.

Tanner Kahlau was killed earlier this year in a skiing accident in New York, and Brian Madry died in a 2011 car crash. Both were former Crestwood High School ice hockey stars who frequently played at the rink.

Last January, within hours of the death of the 27-yearold Kahlau, his friends, teammates, and classmates gathered at the rink to not only remember him, but to begin the process of restoring the ice rink which had fallen into disrepair.

Jared McCune, a friend, and former Crestwood ice hockey teammate of Kahlau, led the restoration project and organized a GoFundMe to help finance cost of further restoration the rink. The effort raised approximately \$48,000.

The facility was built by the township in 2008 at a cost of approximately \$650,000. The rink hadn't been used for ice skating or ice hockey since 2014 when it was not opened that year due to warm weather. It since developed leaks in the concrete floor seams, and

along the perimeter, making it unusable for ice skating.

At the board's August 9 work session, Butch Kahlau, along with Susan Kahlau, Tanner's mother, told supervisors a nonprofit foundation was formed to oversee use of the money raised by the GoFundMe and to hopefully secure additional funding to restore and maintain the rink. "Our goal is to work with all those in the community for whom the rink would be of use," Susan Kahlau

Butch Kahlau explained the group has begun an assessment of the rink and feels a

pavilion-style roof would not only help extend the ice-skating season, but also create a

multi-use facility that would benefit many people in the community. Kahlau, who is in the construction business, said preliminary estimates put the cost of a roof at \$340,000. "That's huge. It's because of the inflationary pricing of steel," he related. "This project is not going to start tomorrow," he emphasized. "We're working to bring down that cost," he added. He discussed the possibility of obtaining grants to



fund the work.

Butch Kahlau explained a roof not only would help solve the problem of ice melting from winter sun but make the rink attractive for other uses. "It opens up so many other things over the other nine and one-half other months," he suggested. He emphasized he feels there is no conflict with using the rink for pickleball or street hockey. "There is a great opportunity to do a lot of different things," he said. "We're open to discussions," he added.

During the supervisors regular meeting, McCune asked about the status of pickleball courts on the rink. Supervisor Matthew Howton said the plan is for the township temporarily to paint pickleball court lines on the rink and allow the use of portable, weighted nets for pickleball play.

Responding to a suggestion by supervisor Louis Welebob Jr., Butch Kahlau promised to keep township officials informed of any steps along the way. "We can't go anywhere by ourselves," he assured the board. He also asked them for patience as the work to revitalize the rink moves along. "It's not an easy box for us to open," he said, wiping away tears. "It's difficult. Some days I just can't look at it," he explained.

Susan and Butch Kahlau previously addressed the July 7 meeting of the township recreation board which is in the process of developing a master plan for the township park. The township received a state Department of Community and Natural Resources grant to hire a consultant for the master plan and will soon advertise for a request for proposals for

that work. Susan and Butch Kahlau said the foundation board wants to be part of the planning process. In order to incorporate the foundation's ideas into the master plan, recreation board chairperson Laurel Prohaska said Susan Kahlau has been added to the planning committee.

Sunshine Law amendment requires transparency

An amendment to Pennsylvania's Sunshine Law (Act 65 of 2001), approved by the General Assembly in June and signed into law by Gov. Tom Wolf on June 30, will require municipal governments and school districts to make their meeting agenda available to the public.

It appears a few Mountain Top municipalities already are in compliance with the new law while others are set to meet the regulations that go into effect August 29.

The amendment, introduced by Sen. Patrick J. Stefano (R-Westmoreland), requires municipalities and school districts that have websites available to the public to post the agenda at least 24 hours in advance of scheduled meetings.

The agenda must include a

listing of each matter of business that will be or may be the subject of deliberation or official action at the meeting. The municipality also must post the agenda at the meeting location and provide copies to individuals in attendance.

The senator pointed out the intent of the Sunshine Act is to ensure that the public can be fully informed when following governmental proceedings.

Wright Township secretary/treasurer Pamela Heard said the township already is in compliance with the new regulations.

Rice Township secretary/ treasurer Jeff Beck said that in response to the amendment, the township created a new page on its website. Beck will upload the draft meeting agenda on the day before the meeting and post it on the front door of the municipal building.

Nuangola Borough council president Joseph Tucker said the borough currently does not have a website, so he does not know if the amendments to the Sunshine Act apply with regard to posting an agenda. He said he will be looking into whether the borough must create a website.

Dorrance Township has posted its agenda on its website for a while and has provided written copies of its agenda to attendees for several years.

Fairview Township provides copies of its agenda as well as financial reports at its meetings. Supervisors at their August 2 meeting discussed steps to post the agenda on its website.

Slocum Township supervisor Charles Herring said the township does not have a website and has no current plans to create one.

Pennsylvania Supreme Court rejects Dorrance Township's request

The Pennsylvania Supreme Court has rejected Dorrance Township's request to allow the municipality to appeal Commonwealth Court's rejection of its challenge to the Preserve at Blue Ridge, LLC's application for a planned residential development (PRD) around the Blue Ridge Trail golf course.

The Preserve at Blue Ridge wants to develop approximately 135 acres of its more than 500-acre parcel as single-family dwellings on one acre lots.

Dorrance Township held numerous hearings over multiple years before it initially denied the Preserve's application in December of 2018. The developer appealed that decision to Luzerne County Court of Common Pleas which reversed the supervisors' decision and ordered that the matter be remanded to the board for approval of the tentative PRD application.

The township appealed the Luzerne County Court decision to Commonwealth Court which heard arguments on November 12, 2020. After hearing from both sides, the court entered an opinion rejecting Dorrance Township's decision and thus allowing land use approval to the Preserve as originally determined by the Luzerne County Court of Common Pleas. Dorrance Township sought re-argument which the Commonwealth Court dismissed in February. On March 5, Dorrance Township asked the state Supreme

Court to review the Commonwealth court decision. That request was denied this week.

Jack Dean, counsel for the Preserve, previously described the continued challenge by Dorrance Township as "frivolous."

Dean said he has asked the township and its individual supervisors to place their municipal and personal insurance carriers on notice of potential claims by the Preserve due to the municipal officials' actions in this matter.

Attorney Michael G. Crotty of the Siani Law firm, which represented the township in the appeals through its insurance carrier, confirmed that the Supreme Court had entered the decision, but had no further comment.

Dorrance Township to inspect quarry

Dorrance Township supervisors want to take a look at the operation of Pennsy Supply's quarry. A 2013 memorandum that established conditions for operation of the quarry includes inspections of

the facility at the township's request. The township asked that the meeting be held on a Saturday by the end of September.

In other news ...

They also reported a letter was sent to PennDOT's, Dunmore office requesting a review of the area of 1075 to 1082 South Main Road where there is a sharp curve in the roadway. The township asked PennDOT to look into adding more signs, pavement markings, or rumble strips that might improve safety.

Last month, South Main Road resident Dan Cornelius told supervisors that twice within a 48-hour period vehicles left the roadway as they rounded the curve and wound up in a pond on his property. The crashes required emergency response to remove the vehicle and assist occupants.

Fairview dealing with road problems

Fairview Township supervisors at their August 3 meeting heard requests for help with water problems and a

renewed plea from a resident who wants his road paved.

They also discussed ways the township's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) money can and cannot be used. Supervisors reported the township recently received \$236,238.41, the first of two ARPA installments.

Jerry Kline of Shady Tree Drive told supervisors water has been collecting on the road in front of his home for several years. He said he hoped the problem would be alleviated when the road was paved, but it has only gotten worse.

Road master Tim McGinnis told supervisors when the paving was done, a storm water collection box was supposed to have been installed near the Kline's residence. However, the collection box was not includ-

ed in the bid specifications and was never built. Supervisors directed McGinnis to contact the township engineer to get an estimate on correcting the problem.

Terry Smith of Long Meadow Lane in the Highland Woods development told supervisors a drainage ditch that runs through her property is causing water to pond. She said she has spent \$10,000 attempting to correct the problem since she purchased the home last year without success.

Supervisors explained the drainage ditch was not installed by the township, nor is it maintained by the township. They said the problem is a private civil matter between her and the person from whom she purchased the property.

Michael Hanlon of South Hill Court, who appeared before supervisors at their August 2020 meeting, was back before them wanting to know when his street will be paved.

As he did a year ago, Hanlon told supervisors he has lived on South Hill Court for 30 years and in that time the road has not been repaved. He said parts are crumbling. He wanted to know why Spruce Street and Bow Creek Drive were paved, but his street was not. He said he was promised last year if the township got a grant for which it applied, his street would be paved.

McGinnis explained that Spruce Street was paved by a utility and Bow Creek with a previous grant. He explained the township applied for a \$400,000 Local Shares Account (gaming) grant for paving and drainage work on Park Lane North and Deer Path but received only \$200,000, which is not nearly enough to complete the job. While the ARPA money cannot be used for paving, supervisors are looking into whether it can be used for drainage work on Deer Path and Park Lane North.

Supervisors told Hanlon if money is available, they would try to pave his street, but did not make any promises.

The township also received \$120,000 for replacement of the Dale Drive culvert which was ordered closed by PennDOT over a year. The township asked for \$471,000 for the project and said the \$120,000 will not nearly cover the cost of replacement of the span.

Rice receives first installment of ARPA

Rice Township supervisors

reported at their August 3 meeting the township received its first installment of its American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) in the amount of \$185,578.51 and took steps to make sure the money is spent according to federal guidelines.

They pointed out the federal program limits how the money can be used and emphasized they have not yet determined how the money will be spent.

They also voted to enter into a contract with Zelenkofske Axelrod LLC to provide the township will assistance with the management of ARPA funds. Cost of the contract is \$11,000 payable in 2021 and 2022 in two \$5,500 payments. Supervisors explained they hired the firm to avoid fund expenditures that might not comply with ARPA. The company is a Pennsylvania-based CPA firm that specializes in providing auditing, accounting and consulting services to non-profits and government agencies.

Supervisors opened a township general fund ARPA interest-bearing account as recommended as a best practice for the grant and approved a resolution which raises the micro-purchase amount associated with ARPA funds from the federal level of \$10,000 to the state level of \$11,500.

In other news

Supervisors approved a contract with R.A.T.T., Inc (an independent franchise of Orkin Systems, Inc.) to apply herbicide to selected sections of the park at a COSTARS price of \$1,025

Ecological Solutions completed its first application of herbicide on the lower Ice Lake to control the lily pads, supervisors reported. They said the company reported when it arrived to begin its application employees found some aquatic plants had died. Supervisors


emphasized the Ice Lakes are part of the township park system and unauthorized application of any chemical within the park system is prohibited. They said application of any chemical to the lakes violates PA Department of Environmental Protection and PA Fish and Boat regulations. Unauthorized applications of chemicals can harm the delicate ecology of the lakes.

The Ice Lake Park has reopened for the summer until dam construction resumes when the state Department of Environmental Protection grants permission to complete the project. They noted there is new signage at the park and boats must stay away from the dam construction site.

The 2021-2022 recycling stickers have arrived. Residents may obtain their sticker by turning in their 2020 recycling permit to the office. Call 570-868-6400 option 1 with any questions.

More dead trees to be cut in Wright Township park

Wright Township supervisors decided to move forward with removal of additional dead trees in the municipal park. The township budgeted \$5,000 for the ongoing removal of dead trees. They also gave township secretary/treasurer Pamela Heard permission to begin preparation of a 2021 Local Shares Account (LSA) grant proposal. Among the projects being considered are additional road paving, purchase of a new police vehicle, purchase of a new snowplow, a new roof on the municipal building and the township's



ambulance services.

Township supervisors at their August meeting approved a proposal presented back in May by the Wright Township Volunteer Fire Company (WTVFD) to revitalize the neighboring Dorrance Township ambulance to provide BLS to Wright and Dorrance Townships. In order for the fire company to respond to BLS ambulance calls in Wright Township, supervisors had to designate it as the first responder.

Since May, supervisors had put off making a decision to give the fire company and Mountain Top Community Ambulance Association the opportunity to work out an agreement on which organization would provide ambulance services. Previously, Mountain Top Community Ambulance Association provided both BLS and advanced life sup-

port (ALS) response to Fairview, Rice, and Wright Townships, as well as Nuangola Borough.

At the August meeting, WTVFD chief Dave Pettit told supervisors the two organizations had worked out an agreement with regard to response.

Only a billing agreement needed to be resolved, he said. Candace Smith, president of the ambulance association, confirmed there was an agreement in principle in place. The Ambulance Association will continue to provide ALS

response to all communities it serves as well as BLS to Fairview and Rice Townships and Nuangola Borough.

Supervisor Donald Zampetti suggested any motion to approve the change in

response include a provision that the parties submit a written agreement to the township and that agreement be reviewed by township solicitor Jack Dean. A motion to approve the fire company proposal was approved, effective August 9, with Zampetti's stipulation included. Attorney Dean noted that if a written agreement is not submitted, the resolution can be rescinded at the September meeting.

Duane Seltzer, Dorrance Township fire chief, told Wright supervisors it is his understanding Dorrance Township supervisors do not have a problem with the plan, but also want to see a written agreement.

Pettit told supervisors work on a written agreement would begin within a week of the meeting.
