

# **Crestwood presents inaugural Distinguished Alumni Awards**

A challenge to take up "your space" in every relationship.

Advice to do something in life about which you are passionate.

And a lesson in the importance of perseverance.


Those were three of the messages Crestwood High School students received from the recipients of the inaugural Distinguished Alumni Awards presented at a student assembly held on October 20.

The recipients were Louis Fouché, Crestwood Class of 2003; James Harvey, Fairview High School Class of 1942; and Marcie Turney, Crestwood Class of 1988.

Crestwood High School senior Shannon Griffiths who designed the cover for the program booklet for the Distinguished Alumni Awards presentation thought the pro-

gram was valuable and said she found the messages delivered by the recipients important

"I think that it's a great idea to not only recognize the accomplishments of the hardworking alumni, but also to have them as role models for Crestwood students," she commented. "It's encouraging to know that such highly decorated people are from this little town."

Fouché currently is a saxophonist and music producer on The Late Show with Stephen Colbert for the house band Jon Batiste & Stay Human. He has performed in 27 countries on six continents and has composed or performed music appearing on Grammy-nominated (USA) and Edison Awardwinning (Netherlands) albums. Fouché graduated from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) in 2007 with degrees in physics and chemical engineering.

He was introduced by Crestwood High School English teacher Bill Reznak who nominated him for the award and who described him as Crestwood's Renaissance Man.

Fouché told the audience his family moved to Mountain Top when he was five years old when his mother received a promotion at her job. He described his relationship with Mountain Top as complex. He pointed out that the ceremony was the first time he was in the high school since graduating in 2003. He acknowledged the award committee for its work, in particular chairman Tom Benz and committee member Barry Boone, who he described as one of his favorite teachers. Boone, a member of the Crestwood Board of Education, is a retired math teacher

Fouché said one of his first

memories in life was being called a racial slur while in kindergarten at Fairview Elementary. "As a five-year-old, I didn't know what it meant," he related. As the only black/ Latino member of his class throughout his time at Crestwood, Fouché said he decided not to worry about fitting in. "I decided to take up 'my space'," he said. "To be myself."

The musician explained that he learned through therapy that in all person relationships, everyone deserves the right to 50 percent of the "space." "Nothing more, nothing less," he noted.

"At the end of the day, you deserve to be yourself," he told the students. "I challenge you to take up your space in any interaction."

He urged the students to think about what they can do to make Mountain Top a better place where everyone can take up their space. "Start by changing Mountain Top. Make Mountain Top a more welcoming, loving place to



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



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# Rice Township hosts informational session on proposed community center

The Rice Township recreation board and township supervisors hosted an informational session on October 20 to share their ideas and get public input on a proposed community center.

About a dozen people turned out for the session which included a power point presentation by representatives of Williams, Kinsman, Lewis Architecture of Wilkes-Barre, which prepared some conceptual renderings of what the center might look like.

Supervisors and some members of the recreation board have proposed an idea to build a community center on the site of the former Rice Township Fire Department hall, located on Willoughby Street, just off Nuangola Road. The parcel is 3.58 acres, and township officials said they have an option for an additional approximately two acres just north of the township-owned property.

The center, officials said, would include an indoor recreation area and meeting spaces for senior citizens and veterans. While the plans are in the very preliminary stages, the design showed indoor multi-purpose courts, meeting areas and a small kitchen area. Officials emphasized they are looking for input on what the community would like in the building and how it should be designed.

Questions from audience

members included how the construction of the center would be funded; how and by whom it would be run and maintained; and what types of recreation activities the center would accommodate.

Supervisor Rick Arnold, vice president of the recreation board, told residents the township would seek public and private grants and donations from citizens and businesses to fund its construction. "We're going to have the building paid for, or we're not moving forward," Arnold promised. He said the township is proactively pursuing funding sources. "Something like this doesn't happen

overnight," he cautioned.

John Rodgers, chairman of the recreation board, outlined some of the potential funding sources for the project. He said they are looking at grant money from the state's Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program (RCAP), a portion of the Luzerne County's federal CARES money, Luzerne County Tourism Office, private sponsorship and possibly some of the township's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) money.

The Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program is administered by the state's Office of the Budget for the acquisition and construction of regional economic, cultural, civic, recreational, and historical improvement projects. According to its website, RACP that have a regional or multijurisdictional impact and generate substantial increases or maintain current levels of employment, tax revenues, or other measures of economic activity. RACP projects are state-funded projects that cannot obtain primary funding under other state programs.

grants are intended for projects

Rodgers said private foundations grants would be used as seed money for the project. He also mentioned possible sponsorships from businesses such as banks.

Asked about plans for maintenance and sustaining the operation of the center, Rodgers said that would be part of the plan that needs to be worked out. "We don't want it to be like the ice rink in Wright Township that was built and is not used," he commented.

"If we get it, this could

ously evolving. "Right now, I am not sure that is something we can do," Dean said at that time.

the private sector. "It's sound public policy," he commented. "The most vulnerable in our society are the very young and the very old. I hope the board would see to it not to let people fall through the cracks." He urged them to consider providing premium pay to workers in nursing homes and daycares

located in the township.

Dean noted that his research has shown there are numerous eligible uses for the funds, including that which Gothreau suggested. Board chairman Matt Howton pointed out the board does not want to rush into spending the money. "We want to be thoughtful on our approach (to spending the money)," Howton offered.

November meeting he would like to appoint a committee to come up with a plan on how to spend the funds.

Supervisors tabled a draft short-term rental ordinance for review. Dean drafted the ordinance which is based on one in use in nearby Penn Lake Park. Dean pointed out that ordinance has been in effect for about one year and seems

Howton reported ZY Pyrotechnics, which has put on the July 4 fireworks display the last few years, notified the township there will be a price increase for 2022. Howton said the company indicated the cost will jump by \$30 per case but did not indicate what the total cost would be for next year. Howton will follow up to get a better cost estimate as the company wants a deposit by the beginning of the year.

A request from secretary/ treasurer Pamela Heard to purchase five updated township code books (hard copy) at a cost of \$664 was approved. They tabled a request from the planning commission to hire Jack Varaly to update the township zoning map at a cost of \$2,650. Supervisors said they want more information on what the end product will be.

Supervisors approved an intergovernmental agreement with the Crestwood School District to allow township police to enforce school bus stop violations supported by evidence from a school bus signal arm camera. Dean said a statute enacted last year gives police the authority to cite motorists for school bus violations based on evidence from the cameras mounted on buses.

## **Recycling center** open to nonresidents

Wright township's recycling center will be open to nonresidents and businesses again in 2022, for a fee.

Supervisors passed a resolution at their October meeting establishing a \$25 annual permit fee for non-residents and a \$100 annual fee for small businesses located in the township. A small business is defined as having fewer than 10 employees and less than \$250,000 in



teacher that will mean a lot," she said of her mentor, now retired.

Turney said on graduation from Crestwood she enrolled at Temple University to study art and play field hockey. After her second year, she became disenchanted with how computers were introduced into the curriculum at Temple's Tyler School of Art and Architecture. She turned to working in restaurants which eventually became her profession and her passion.

Turney admitted she's had some failures in her professional career, but she was determined to learn from her failures, just like she and her teammates learned from losses on the field hockey field. "My ego doesn't come into play. It's how do we fix it," she explained.

The award recipient encouraged students to look for a career they find fulfilling. "It doesn't have to be about



money or success," she said. "Do something you're passionate about.

Harvey, 98 years old, was class president and valedictorian of his graduating class from Fairview High School. He went on to become a member of the Tuskegee Airmen, who were the nation's first all African American group of military pilots.

The retired Lieutenant Colonel fought in WWII and Korean Conflict and was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross along with multiple Air Medals.

Harvey was born in Montclair, NJ and in 1937 he and his family moved to Nuangola Station. Though he was the only African American in his school, Harvey said he did not experience any segregation or discrimination. A selfdescribed perfectionist, he

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became captain of the school's basketball team and anchor on its tumbling team. He was drafted into the Army in April of 1943 and at this time, he said, was first introduced to prejudice and discrimination.

Harvey wanted to become a pilot and was assigned to the Army Air Corps, but as an engineer, rather than a pilot.

The biggest obstacle Harvey faced in his quest to become a pilot, he said, was the color of his skin. He pointed out that many Army officers believed in the stereotypes perpetuated by the Army War College Studies of the Negro produced in the previous decade. Harvey said the study described African American soldiers in a negative light, using such terms as child-like, careless, shiftless, irresponsible, unmoral and untruthful. The African American soldier was branded as a

comic, emotionally unstable, musically inclined with good rhythm" and "if fed, loyal and compliant."

"Since every white commander had a copy of this report this is how they perceived us," Harvey explained. Despite the obstacles, he persisted and eventually was accepted for flight training at Tuskegee, Alabama. Harvey finished his training as a pilot in April 1945 and as he was preparing to head to Europe, the war on that continent ended. "Hitler gave up the following month. And I can tell you why," Harvey quipped. "He knew I was coming."

During the Korean Conflict, he flew 126 missions and was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross.

Between World War II and Korea, Harvey and other members of his unit were selected to go to Nevada to participate in a competition now known as Top Gun. Though his team won the competition, Air Force records for years listed the 1949 winner as "unknown." It was through his persistence that the record was changed in 1995, 46 years later, to reflect the team of black airmen finished on top.



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


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## Barry Lu Davis 1943-2021


