# **Crestwood Menu**

Crestwood School District operates "Offer vs. Serve" meal programs following the guidance of the National School Breakfast and Lunch Programs overseen and regulated by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the PA Department of Education.

Due to the recent Covid pandemic, Crestwood School District is providing a reimbursable breakfast and lunch at no charge for all students, regardless of family income. This benefit is set to expire June 30, 2022.

While meals are currently free of charge during the 2021-22 school year, parents/ guardians are encouraged to apply for meals benefits. This confidential information is used by both CSD and state agencies to determine funding for a variety of programs. Failure to apply for benefits could disqualify your student/ family from additional benefits that may be available.

In order to qualify for a reimbursable free breakfast or free lunch, students must take all necessary meal components per USDA guidelines.

For lunch, each plate must have at least three components and one component must be a fruit or vegetable to be counted as reimbursable. If the plate does not contain these items, the student will be charged ala carte pricing.


Eight of the school's scholastic sports teams raised money for the project and volunteered members to participate in the Polar Pop as well.



#### Zoning change will not happen in Wright **Township**

It appears a parcel of land in the Crestwood Industrial Park which owner Joseph Thomas wants to re-zone and sell to developer Rob Mericle won't get that zone change.

A public hearing on a request by Thomas, president of Maple Hill Holdings, to change the zoning of the approximately 33.5-acre property he owns from R-1 (residential) to I-1 (industrial) was held on November 15. During that hearing, after hearing concerns of neighbors, Thomas amended his application to exclude approximately 10 acres of wetlands abutting neighboring residential properties.

The parcel fronts on Elmwood Avenue in the Crestwood Industrial Park and extends west, bordering residential properties along Crestwood Drive and South Mountain Boulevard.

At the township's December meeting, an ordinance approving the change was on the supervisors' agenda. However, that approval never came, despite language in the proposed ordinance that stated the board of supervisors "determined that the best use of the land in considering the surrounding area is to rezone it from R-1 to I-1."

In fact, when it came time to address the zoning change request, board chairman Matt Howton asked for a motion to deny they change. None of the five supervisors made the motion and it died.

Solicitor Jack Dean explained that supervisors had 45 days to act on the change and if no action was taken by December 30. it would be considered denied.

Supervisors held a special meeting on December 20 to approve the township's 2022 budget, but the zone change was not on the agenda and was not mentioned. With no further meetings scheduled, action on Thomas' request is not likely.


More than a dozen neighbors expressed their opposition to the proposed zoning change at the November 15 hearing. They expressed concerns about noise, pollution, increased

traffic, the impact on wildlife and the effect of the change in zoning on their property values. They noted the township ordinance requires only a 50-foot buffer from industrial use property to their homes.

After hearing the concerns of residents, Mericle, who wants to build a "flex building" for light industrial use, offered to exclude an approximately 10-acre piece of the property from the zoning change, leaving it residential. The par-

cel is primarily wetlands and extends from a power line to the rear and side of existing homes. He also offered to stipulate there would be a 200-foot buffer instead of the 50-foot required in the ordinance. Thomas amended his application to reflect the changes proposed by Mericle.

# Wright supervisors approve budget


Wright Township supervisors did approve the township's 2022 budget at the December 20 meeting. The fiscal plan calls for general fund operating expenses and revenue totaling \$2,255,487; Liquid Fuels revenue and expenses of \$183,174; and capital fund revenue and expenses totaling \$2,176,994. Property tax will remain at one mill which includes .8 mill for the general fund and .2 mill fire tax.

#### Litter problem near Crestwood Drive addressed

At their December 13 meeting, Wright Township supervisors heard from some residents of Crestwood Drive about a littering problem near their homes. Residents said truckers often park on Crestwood Drive and regularly throw debris from their vehicles. "We're getting tire of cleaning up their litter," one residents commented.

Police Chief Royce Engler noted there are "no parking" signs along sections of the road and urged the residents to call police when they see illegally parked trucks. Truckers sometimes park their vehicles along the road, and Elmwood Avenue, while

Dorrance Township supervisors at their December meeting approved the township's 2022 budget. Revenue and expenditures total \$852,145. There is no tax increase. The property tax rate remains as .75 mills.

Dorrance Township solicitor Donald Karpowich told supervisors the only item still missing to complete the Pennsy Quarry inspection report is a current certificate of insurance. His office sent the company a copy of the expired 2018 insurance certificate to clarify what is needed.


