


Comets earn way to D2 tourney, fall to top seed

Crestwood worked its way into the last spot in the District 2 Class 3A Dual Meet Wrestling Championships by winning its final two matches before the district deadline.

The Comets, however, were unable to take advantage of the opportunity they earned.

Crestwood drew the top seed and fell to host Abington Heights, 62-7, in Monday's quarterfinals on a night when the Lackawanna League Division 1 champions' coach said his team was particularly tough.

"We were a little sharper than we've been in the last several matches," Abington Heights coach Greg Theony said. "We were a little rusty due to the pause. "... We came out with some fire." Sam Jeckell and Magnus Bibla, who have Crestwood's best season records, came up with the wins at Abington Heights.

Jeckell held on for a 1-0 decision at 113 pounds in the second bout to cut the early deficit to 6-3. The sophomore, who is no stranger to tense, low-scoring decisions, improved to 19-9. Jeckell's last four bouts have ended in shutouts, two wins and two losses, and he came out on each side of 1-0 decisions.

Abington Heights won the next nine bouts before Bibla dominated the next-to-last bout, winning a major decision at 215 pounds.

Bibla, a junior, improved to 29-4 while



Mountaintop Pub and Eatery takes over old Shalimar building

With a blessing and an "Amen," Mountain Top's newest hot spot opened its doors to the public.

The Mountaintop Pub and Eatery held its grand opening last month. Before that owner Dean Kline II welcomed Christ United Methodist Church pastor JP Bohanan to bless the new establishment and its employees ahead of the pub's grand opening.

The new pub opened in the spot of the former Shalimar

Motel and Lounge, a popular area establishment for a number of years.

"The Shalimar was the hot spot around here," said Carrie Kline, Dean's wife. "That's our goal, to keep that same energy and be a place for the community to come together."

The Klines just bought the bar a few months ago, but the Shalimar has been a part of their lives for much longer. In fact, the old bar holds a very special place in the hearts of Carrie and Dean.

Simply Sensational Sweets set to move into new home

Sandi Amandola may not be from the area, but she's found home here. She's been operating Simply Sensational Sweets out of her home, but on February 12, the new store at 427 N. Hunter Highway will have its grand opening.

Sandi Amandola has worn many hats throughout her life. She's a Navy veteran, she holds a master's degree, she worked as a behavioral therapist for children with autism, and now she's the owner of Simply Sensational Sweets.

She's been running the business out of her home, but at 11 a.m. on February 12, that will change as she opens her new store at 427 N. Hunter Highway in Drums.

It's been quite a journey to say the least.

She started baking, planning and coordinating parttime while she was stationed in Hampton Roads, VA. While many may think taking on a side hustle as an active duty service member might be overwhelming, Sandi just chuckles, "I was at a shore command, so it was basically like a regular nine to five, and then I baked cakes on the side."

In 2010, she was honorably discharged, and began attending college in Texas. Her husband, who was a nuclear elec-



tronics technician, was offered a job at the Berwick power plant while they were living in Houston, so they packed up and headed for Northeastern Pennsylvania, settling in Drums in 2013.

She continued to work in her degree field, however, she says "it got to be a little much." So, she started her event planning business, although that would soon change.

"But in my first year as an event planner, I made more money on the side baking cookies for people," she said. So, she got licensed through the Commonwealth of PA Department of Agriculture and continued on with baking and event planning. The event planning would soon be dropped, and Amandola would be baking full time and amassing what she calls, "a pretty loyal following."

Over the course of the pandemic, things really picked up, to the point where she says she had to start turning people down on custom orders.

"And I was like you know, if we just had a storefront, people

could just come in and get what they need instead of having to custom order it and me having to turn them down," and so they started looking. When they found the 427 N. Hunter location, she knew her business had found a new home.

"We went and looked at it and it was everything that we had wanted, so we just kind of jumped on the grenade," she said of the place. Most importantly, it had a second space which she intends on using as a party room, as well as teaching decorating classes and other kinds of communal events.



Park Master Plan surveys returned

More than 1,000 people have responded to the Wright Township park master plan survey since it was posted online in December, more than twice the number than members of the township's master plan committee and its consultant had anticipated.

As of last week, 1,039 completed surveys were submitted. The improvement most people want to see in the park is new restrooms.

The survey was developed with the help of Thomas McLane Associates of Scranton, the firm hired by the township to assist with development of the park master plan. The master plan is funded by a \$19,000 grant from the state Department of Community and Natural Resources (DCNR) under its Community Recreation and Conservation Planning program. There is a 50 percent township match.

Christopher Madden, a member of the township recreation board and the master plan committee, said the original goal was 500 completed responses.

"The more surveys, the better picture you get of what the community wants (in the park)," Madden said. "This great turnout will help us moving forward," he added.

Initially, Madden noted, most


of the responses were from adults so the committee enlisted the help of the Crestwood School District which sent out the link to students across the district. He said the district's cooperation was a big help in getting responses from young people.

Madden said studies show having a master plan for a public park greatly increases the

chances of obtaining grants for the park. "That's the reason we went after a grant to develop a master plan," he noted.

The surveys are just the first

step in the process. The surveys will be followed up by public meetings.

"The process is heavily weighted on community involvement," Madden noted. That will be followed by interviews with key people in the community. Madden explained that those are people who may have a specific insight into the needs of the park. They can include school and daycare officials, for example.

"We will take the results of the surveys and interviews and develop a consensus of what the public needs and wants," Madden said. "From that, we will develop a master plan. He said it is anticipated the master plan will be completed in time for the township to apply for grants during 2022.

Reflecting on the large number of responses which cited a need for better restrooms, Madden said recreation board members have been aware of that need for a couple years. Tied for second on the list of features the public would like to see added or improved are a splash pad and a sledding hill, both with 13 percent of the votes.

The park's splash pad has been out of order most of the last couple summers due to the inability to get parts for it.

What did surprise Madden is the frequency of requests for a sledding hill in the park.

Nine percent of the respondents expressed a need for improvements to the ice/roller hockey rink. Other responses to additions or improvements included addition of mountain bike trails (7 percent); improvements to the multi-purpose fields (7 percent); pickleball courts (6 percent); a skate park (5 percent); outdoor classrooms (5 percent); disc golf (4 percent); and improved/additional parking (4 percent).

Most respondents did not feel there is an issue with handicap accessibility to the park. Asked about how well they feel the park is maintained, 65 percent said "good." Tops among maintenance problems cited by respondents were broken playground equipment (20 percent) and poor landscaping (dead trees and leaf litter) 22

Road construction, stormwater bids advertised

Fairview Township recently advertised for bids for its 2022 road reconstruction and stormwater improvements project.

The work includes regrading grass and rock-lined swales, piping, inlets and complete restoration of Deerpath Drive between Valley View Drive and Park Lane North; milling and paving of Deerpath Drive between Park Lane North and Park Lane East. It also involves installation of stormwater pipes under existing driveways and rock linesswales, milling, and paving of Park Lane North; and overlay, saw cutting and milling of existing driveways to blend into new pavement on South Hill Court.

Bids opened on February 1.

Last August, the township received a \$200,000, 2019 Local Share Account (LSA) gaming grant for work on Park Lane North and Deerpath Drive, both of which are badly in need of repair. The township had asked for about \$400.000 for the Park Lane and Deerpath Road work.

Plans for mini-golf course in Wright Township move forward

Plans for the miniature golf course adjacent to Malacari's ice cream moved forward last week.

The Wright Township planning commission approved the project's preliminary land development plan along with five waivers.

The 18-hole miniature golf course previously received waivers from the township planning commission. The commission also approved preliminary land development plans for Rob & Melissa Holdings/Mountain Express Truck-

ing to be located on Route 309
at the site of the former Deets Trucking.

Bloomin' Bagels gets final ok from Fairview Township

Mountain Top Bloomin' Bagels has cleared the final obstacle it faced to move forward with construction of its new location.

Township supervisors at their February meeting approved the final plans for the Bloomin' Bagels shop. The township planning commission gave its stamp of approval at its January 19 meeting.

JAZD Enterprises plans to build a bagel shop at 123 North Mountain Blvd., opposite 10X Fitness. The company operates Buddy's Bagels on Route 93 in West Hazleton as well as Bloomin' Bagels in Bloomsburg. *In other business:*

Township supervisors also awarded a contract to Stell Enterprises for much-needed repairs to Deerpath Drive, Park Lane East and Park Lane North. The Plains Township firm was the low bidder at \$253,103.5.

The work includes regrading grass and rock-lined swales, piping, inlets and complete restoration of Deerpath Drive between Valley View Drive and Park Lane North; milling and paving of Deerpath Drive between Park Lane North and Park Lane East. It also involves installation of stormwater pipes under existing driveways and rock linesswales, milling and paving of Park Lane North; and overlay, saw cutting and milling of existing driveways to blend into new pavement on South Hill Court.

The township plans to use a Local Shares Account grant to fund the project. Last summer it received a \$200,000 LSA grant for improvements to Park Lane North and Deer Path.

Township engineer Dennis Peters along with township officials met recently with state Department of Transportation officials to discuss grant opportunities for repair or replacement of a culvert on Dale Drive at the end of Valley View Drive. The township received a \$120,000 LSA grant for the project.

Township officials estimate the cost of the project at nearly four times the grant amount. PennDOT ordered the bridge closed over almost two years ago year ago following an inspection.

Peters said the township's 2021 MS4 report was accepted by the state Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). Peters said DEP's comments on the report will be addressed in the 2022.

Township solicitor Sean Logsdon reported the township received a proposed inter-

Pizza Bella to host Mayson Girton Day

On February 5 Pizza Bella in Mountain Top will host Mayson Girton Day.

Mayson Girton, a student at Crestwood High School, was diagnosed with a rare form of a life-threatening pediatric cancer, myxoid liposarcoma, after suffering an injury at a Berwick JV football game last year.

Girton's injury was initially treated as a shifted patella but after six weeks of therapy his knee pain remained, which caused the doctors to order a MRI. The MRI showed an incidental finding, which was a mass tumor in the most distal part of his femur so more imaging was ordered and finally a biopsy.

After the biopsy came in, the doctors diagnosed Girton on November 11, 2021, with an

extremely rare form of a lifethreatening pediatric cancer. He then underwent surgery on January 5 at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia to remove the tumor, which was between his main vessels, nerve and near his femur bone, making the surgery more difficult.

Girton's surgical team was able to remove the tumor and repair his gracilis muscle by creating a flap. As of now, Girton is unable to walk without assistance; however, he is in good spirits and is on the mend mentally and physically.

He and his family are awaiting final pathology to determine future treatment, which may be radiation, chemotherapy or a combination of both. Treatment will depend on the margins obtained and the grade of the tumor.

Not only will Mayson Girton Day at Pizza Bella celebrate Girton's birthday early but 100 percent of the proceeds above food costs are going to him and his family to help with medical bills. People are able to participate by eating in, taking out or having their food delivered.

Physical therapist: Don't let Covid keep you from therapy

For one Mountain Top resident, taking care of yourself throughout Covid-19 is important to longevity, wellness and mental and physical health.

Kevin Barno, MPT, is a physical therapist and owner of Pinnacle Rehabilitation Associates with offices in Kingston. Pittston and Avoca. Over the course of the ongoing pandemic, he says a large number of referred patients have not scheduled their appointments, citing Covid-19 fears as a reason. While he understands the apprehension many may have, he encourages people to follow through with their physical therapy.

Telehealth, of course, is a newer option, however, it's just not the same, particularly in Barno's field. He says he "couldn't justify" charging patients their \$40 co-pay for treatment via telehealth, as he is not able to provide the "hands on" manual therapy that is necessary for patients with particular issues.

As an example, he illustrated treating a patient with balance problems. "If somebody has a balance problem, you've got to challenge them but you also have to be there to guard them and keep them safe while they work through it." He also mentions that if manual therapy is not incorporated to achieve proper range of motion, certain exercises may cause an increase in symptoms and cause a person to be further from wellness.

"Yes, I can give somebody some exercises. But at the same time, there is manual one-onone therapy that needs to be included in treatment or the patient is just not going to get better." He also remarks that

people who choose not to come to therapy — especially those who have been prescribed physical therapy by their doctor can make things worse simply by staying home and being less active. "People who already have range of motion problems and weakness who don't attend their prescribed physical therapy could potentially have a fall or fracture which can result in an extended hospital stay." This runs the risk of being around even more people than they would encounter by simply attending outpatient physical therapy.

"Pinnacle Rehab follows all the protocols. We are required to be vaccinated as per Medicare. We are masking in the office and patients are required to wear masks - any patient - even if they're vaccinated. We also clean all the treatment tables and equipment after use. We have the space to keep patients socially distanced and schedule in such a way that there are not too many people there at once."

These practices, he says, have always been standard at Pinnacle Rehabilitation, and the safety of all involved is paramount.

"We want to make it a safe atmosphere not only for patients, but for my staff as well. I don't want my staff to get sick. We want it to be safe for everybody, and I think we're doing our best to do that. We're probably exceeding what maybe needs to be done sometimes."

He encourages those who might be on the fence to call the office and speak to Shannon, the office manager, about cleanliness and protocols or just stop down and see for themselves. Pinnacle Rehab, Barno



With the amount of cleaning and disinfecting that takes place, Barno says he may have to have some beds reupholstered, however he notes that it's worth it to keep his staff and patients safe.

says, is a "family atmosphere", and all are welcome. And while there are a litany of physical therapy centers to choose from, Barno hopes anyone in need of therapy will seek treatment for whatever is ailing them.

"Six weeks of physical therapy is much better than an injury getting worse."

And, some time out of the house and off the couch is good for everyone.

Barno has been in practice for 25 years, holding degrees from Wilkes University and Temple University. He went into private practice about 15 years ago and Pinnacle Rehab has three locations: 520 Third Avenue in Kingston, 201 S Main Street in Pittston, and 650 Main Street in Avoca. Parking and evening appointments are available at all locations.
